## KRTA Representative Report

The KRTA Executive Council met on August 22, 2022 at the KRTA Office.

Hank Hensley of Henry Hensley & Associates, Inc. reviewed a handout with the council and summarized KRTA investments.

Debby Murrell, Membership Co-Chair, reported the membership goal set in July was 31,122 as of today we are at 31,180. She stated that we would add 100 each month for a new goal since we have already met the goal for the year. Debby asked for each local chapter to add one new member each month. Make sure the county is on the back of each white card to get credit for the \$5 returned to the Local Association each March. A new Membership Handbook has been developed. You can access the Handbook on the KRTA website.

Debby also mentioned that we should not just give out the green sheets (membership enhancement form), members receive a copy when they join. Non-members have been getting the numbers of our partners without paying dues. Vendors have been instructed to ask for proof of membership.

Margaret Sims, Health & Insurance Chair, mentioned concerns with the Kimbler account, that money helps provide scholarships to students. There are not enough donations coming in to help sustain that account. Margaret also discussed the Bourgard foundation as well and that money is used to help KRTA members that have had tragedy occur in their life. KRTA paid out \$22,000 in the fall for the tornados in Western Kentucky and now we have the floods in Eastern Kentucky.

Later in the meeting, Executive Director Tim Abrams discussed the plans for Eastern Kentucky Flood Relief. He recommended that we do the same thing in Eastern Kentucky as we did for the Western Kentucky Tornado Relief. Each KRTA member who is Medicare eligible and whose house is uninhabitable from the floods should receive \$1,000. At the time of the meeting, it was still unknown how large this number would be because they were still collecting the names. The Executive Council approved this recommendation.

Allen Schuler, Legislative Co-Chair presented legislative issues. Allen referenced the Legislative Priorities List. He said that the first four have been priorities of KRTA for a long time and we don't anticipate them changing any time soon. Allen re-iterated that KRTA as an organization is and must remain non-partisan. As an individual, you can be partisan but must be careful to clarify that position to Legislators and other non-members. He encouraged us all to meet with our legislators and especially talk with those running in your district about legislative priorities. Allen reviewed the Priorities with the committee and emphasized the last one: Oppose any legislation that would result in higher prescription costs for Kentucky's retired teachers. Allen also discussed efforts to get changes made to the reduction we used to receive in exemption of the first \$41,000 when it was moved to \$31,000 by our legislators a few years ago.

At this point, Tim mentioned WEP and GPO is still not making any progress at the Federal level. There will need to be an overhaul of all Social Security. Tim stated that we need to be careful what we ask for because teachers could be required to start paying into Social Security, and that would be detrimental to our system. The recommendation from the Legislative Committee was to use these priorities for the 2022-2023 year. Motion was approved and passed unanimously.

Cebert Gilbert, Jr., AARP/KRTA Specialist said that there will be a few changes with the Grandparent's Essay forms. He mentioned the importance of working with our local 5th grade teachers to do the Essay. AARP donated 1 million dollars to Eastern Kentucky. Cebert mentioned that AARP is non-partisan as well. There are 38 million AARP members across the nation and half are democrats and half are republicans. Their main mission his helping retired members.

Golden Hale, President discussed his theme about the importance of Membership, which was his focus at the Fall Workshops.

Tim mentioned the Retired Teachers Week Proclamation, October 17-21,2022. It occurs the third week of October each year.

Tim referenced the KRTA annual budget and mentioned that if and when money gets low, he has Hank move funds from the operating account to the general fund as needed. There was some discussion related to the Local scholarship that is given out at each Community College for Education Majors. There was a motion made to increase the giving to the Kimbler and Bourgard foundations for Locals to \$40 and \$25 each and the points received toward participation would be graduated. District increase to \$50 per fund. Motion carried unanimously.

Tim clarified that in the final budget, there was no change from what was passed in June. Tim did state he was a little concerned about spending and this may be the last year that we can continue without making some changes. Our dues have been the same since 2008. He is not asking for a motion at this point, but that we will need to make a decision on spending in the coming years. Costs all around have gone up and in the future, we need to either increase the dues or decrease the spending. An ad-hoc committee was recommended to review dues and spending. The motion made to approve the budget passed unanimously.

Tim Abrams discussed the updated Council Handbook in the packet. This handbook is the same as the District President’s handbook .

## Insurance Update

### Teachers' Retirement System (TRS) Insurance

(To access the October 17th KTRS Health and Insurance Committee Meeting Minutes, PowerPoint, and KRTA Membership Enhancements, go to <https://jcrt.org> and scroll down to the bottom of the Home Page to access.)

TRS (800-618-1687, 502-848-8500, [info@trs.ky.gov](mailto:info@trs.ky.gov)) **offers two health plans for retirees:**

- **MEHP** (Medicare Eligible Health Plan) Medicare-eligible or 65 & over, TRS members, one plan,
- **KEHP** (Kentucky Employees' Health Plan) under 65 and not Medicare eligible, same fund as active teachers and state employees, coverage options

#### MEHP 2023 (Age 65 and over)

- Open enrollment to participate in TRS MEHP during 2023 is Oct. 15-Dec. 7. For those already enrolled, no action is needed.
- The 2023 monthly premium will be \$217, up from \$211 in 2022. TRS pays all or a portion of the premium based on retiree's entry date into TRS and years of service at retirement. Spouses of TRS retirees pay the full premium.
- The Medicare Part B monthly premium will be \$164.90, down from \$170.10 in 2022, and is paid by retirees and spouses to Social Security.
- Yearly: Low deductible (\$150); Low out of pocket (\$1,200)
- Emergency Room copayment (\$120); Urgent Care copayments (\$25)

**MEHP** consists of:

- **Medicare Advantage Plan** through **United Health Care**. United Health Care (1-844-518-5877 or <https://www.uhcretiree.com/trs/home.html>)
- **Medicare Part D Prescription Drug Plan** through **Express Scripts**.
  - ▶ Express Scripts Mail Order-Alternatives (generic) per 90 days at Express Scripts mail Order (1-877-866-5834 or [www.Express-Scripts.com](http://www.Express-Scripts.com))
- **Coriell Life Sciences** (1-888-454-9024) DNA testing – Genetic testing wellness program with over 8,000 members participating. **Know Your Rx Coalition Pharm-Assist** (1-855-218-5979) Direct access to **pharmacists** to help with: Prescription questions, Answer question about MEHP coverage. Both programs work to make sure the health care our MEHP members receive is the best for them.
- Effective January 1, **Renew Active**, a new fitness program that includes a free gym membership, replaces **SilverSneakers**. To learn more call United Health Care or visit [UHCRenewActive.com](http://UHCRenewActive.com).

(No Re-enrollment for 2023 for those currently participating in the KTRS MEHP. Members are automatically enrolled January 1, 2023, unless the member needs to make changes.)

#### KEHP 2023 (Under-65 retirees who are not Medicare-Eligible)

- Members are not required to reenroll in the health plan option they have selected. Members should use the annual open enrollment period to review their options to ensure the plan they currently have is still available and will still meet their needs for the upcoming year.

**KEHP** consists of

- Anthem BlueCross BlueShield
- CVS Caremark Pharmacy Benefit Manager and Know Your Rx Coalition
- SmartShopper – Cash for using cost-effective options for certain procedures
- Staywell/Web MD – Earn up to \$200 in rewards for well-being activities that encourage healthy behaviors
- LiveHealth Online – video chat with doctors and therapists
- Complete the **Living Well Promise** each year by July 1 and earn \$480 (\$40 per month); be sure to spend by Dec. 31, they do not rollover
- Wageworks – For members on the LivingWell CDHP and LivingWell Basic CDHP, you should have received a HealthEquity VISA card that can be used to pay for eligible healthcare expenses.

(Before you move from the KEHP to Medicare, remember that Staywell points and WageWorks HRA account funds do not continue to Medicare and the TRS MEHP - so use them before you switch.)

**Legislative Report**

We were very fortunate that during the 2022 legislative session the state approved the biennial budget to include funding for our pension and for contributions to our health insurance plans. We should remember to thank our state legislators for their votes.

As the new year approaches, we should remember our legislative priorities for 2023. The first is that we need to remind our legislators that there should be no changes to the governing of our Board of Trustees. We would find those changes to be unacceptable. We also need to follow HB 451, a bill that may affect the cost of prescription drugs for our members. We will be paying close attention to this and will keep our membership informed as to its status when the legislature convenes in January.

As always, we should show our support for current educators by paying attention to issues that affect them such as the calculation and usage of sick days. There are several bills that could affect current educators that remain in committee. We will keep our membership informed with any new updates as they become available.
