Ending 50 Years of Mass Incarceration: Urgent Reform Needed to Protect Future Generations

The United States has seen a modest decline in its prison population since its peak in 2009, but it still maintains an extremely high incarceration rate, far surpassing other developed nations. At the current rate of decline, it would take 75 years to return to 1972 prison population levels. The report emphasizes the urgent need for significant reforms to address mass incarceration, including reducing prison admissions and shortening sentences, particularly for violent offenses. Some states, like Connecticut, New Jersey, and New York, have reduced their prison populations by over 50% since their peaks. 25 states have outpaced the national average in decarceration, achieving over 25% reduction However, some states, like Alabama and Tennessee are moving in the opposite direction, planning to expand prison infrastructure or implement harsher sentencing laws.

Parental incarceration is considered an adverse childhood experience (ACE) with long-term negative consequences on a child's development and life. It often leads to foster care placements. housing instability, and financial struggles for the children left behind. The separation weakens or even destroys the parent-child bond, leaving lasting emotional scars, Amanda Hall, who experienced her mother's arrest as a child, shared how it fueled her own cycle of trauma, substance abuse, and eventual incarceration. Her son, Javden Spence, recounted the fear and longing he felt witnessing his mother's arrest at five, impacting his trust in the justice system. Both Hall and Spence along with Kentucky Youth Advocates urge lawmakers to consider a caregiver's role durir sentencing to mitigate the harm on families. While accountability for crimes is crucial, finding a balance between consequences and the impact on children is equally important.
