General

Family origins and traditions.

According to tradition, the McCULLEY family originated in Scotland in the 12th or 13th century. The family was deeply religious, being Covenanters, but none was prominent in affairs of state. During the wars between church and state the family moved, or was driven, to Ireland. After one or more generations there, it is said that seven brothers migrated to America. Thus the McCULLEYS are Scots-Irisk, and came probably from the Lowlands - that portion of Scotland jutting out toward Ireland, and comprising the counties of Ayr and Galloway. The latter today consists of Kirkoudbright and Wigton.

Black, in his <u>Surnames</u> of <u>Scotland</u>, states that the names <u>Mac-</u>Cullie, MacCully and Macculie are softened forms of the name <u>Mac-</u>Culloch.

From Scots Kith and Kin it appears that McCullie is from Maca Culloch, geographically from Banffshire, associated with Clas Gunn. MacCulloche were also found in Galloway, the Stewartry (of Kirkcudhright), as early as the 11th century.

On a Map of Scotland of Old, by Sir Isia Moncreiffe of that Ilk and Don Pottinger, "Showing the lands and spheres of influence of the main class and names of Scotland including...these of Lowland and Border families about the time of King James VI... appear four regions labeled McCulloch. One is in the Stewartry(er County) of Kirkoudbright (pronounced "Kirkobray") between Fleet Bay and Moneypool Bay, with the symbol of a castle denoting the family seat at Cardeness. This region contains the parishes of Assoth and Kirkmahreck; adjoining regions are labeled with the family names Gordon, Muir and Lennox. Two other regions lie in the County of Wigton -Glasserten Parish, just east of Port William, where the map shows a castle labeled "Myreton", and Stoneykirk Parish, family seat at Ardwell, which is on the peninsula containing Portpatrick. The first of these adjoins spheres of influence of the families of Dunbar, Maxwell and Vaus; the second adjoins Adair and HcDowall (Mac-Dougall). An atlas map shows McCulloch's Point, located about two miles northwest of Strangaer, on Lach Ryan. The fourth region lies in the northern part of the County of Ross, on the Dornoch Firth, consisting of the parish of Tain and surrounded by Clan. Ross.

Mackerlie, in <u>History of the lands and their owners in Galloway</u>, vol. 1, p. 336, states,"In March 1622, Wm McCulle and his son had samine of the Barony of Wigtown." In Scots law, "samine" is the act of giving legal possession of feudal property, or the instrument by which the possession is acquired.



Gallaher moved into the house, and made a farm there. In 1806, James Gallaher came from Woodcock Valley, Huntingdon county, and opened out a farm on the bank of the Creek, about 2½ miles above Glen Hope. About the same period, Hugh Carson commenced an improvement above and near the property called "Beccaria Mills." In 1809, William Alexander, the ancestor of a large and worthy family, settled where he now lives, below the mouth of Muddy Run. He emigrated from Mifflin county. He is the oldest of the early settlers of that section now living. His appearance denotes not "the weight of years which is upon him." His activity and buoyancy of spirit are remarkable for one whose toil and endurance have been so great. Being very domestic in his habits, he is rarely seen from home; yet, be the weather fair or foul, one would as soon expect that the sun would forget to rise on the second Tuesday of October, as to hear that on that day William Alexander had neglected to vote for all the nominees of the Democratic party.

The next year, quite an addition was made to the population of this region, by the accession of the families of Smiley, Dillon, Goon, and Feltwell, whose improvements formed the nucleus of one of the most beautiful and best settled portions of the county, not inappropriately called "Mount Pleasant," which is situated south of, and about three miles from the Creek.

Other reasons than a mere desire to better one's condition, tended to swell the numbers in the Creek settlement. The Hegarty family, having been connected with the unfortunate struggles in Ireland, sought an asylum in our wilds. Prior to Robert's departure to this country, he was connected with the United Men, and on one occasion he and a few of his comrades, closely pursued, hid in the moss, their pursuers, vastly superior in number, touched their pikes as they passed them in the dark. Samuel had, during the troubles, fallen into the hands of the oppressors, but was rescued by his compatriots. The brothers first settled in Mifflin county. In 1810, they commenced clearings, opposite each other, on the Clearfield creek, at the mouth of Muddy Run. Three years afterwards they brought out their families. Mrs. Isabella McCully, then a widow, a sister of the Hegarty's who died in February last, at the age of 86 years, surrounded by over 100 descendants, settled near her brothers, in the year 1816. She left a portion of her family in Ireland when she emigrated, and directed her agent to dispose of her property and use a part of it in defraying the expenses of the remainder of her family in coming hither. decamped with the proceeds of the sale, and she with some difficulty obtained the means to gather her children all under the same roof. From these settlements have descended some of the best citizens of Beccaria and Woodward townships.

The war of 1812 induced quite a number of persons to leave New Jersey and other Eastern parts, and make this neighborhood their permanent home. Among the families that came in from 1812 to 1815, the most prominent was Wm. B. Wright's. Mr. Wright, at an advanced age, lives at his first home near Glen Hope. He is the father of Hon. A. K. Wright, one of our principal lumber merchants, formerly Sheriff of this county, and late an Associate Judge—of Benj. B. Wright, a man of probity and worth—of John W., who served one term as County Treasurer and is now officiating as Justice of the Peace—and of several other children. During this period, Dr. Keagy, a relative of Mr. Wright's, settled about a mile lower down the Creek; and Amasa Smith, a man of some note, but particulars of whose life we have been unable to glean, commenced clearing the farm now occupied by Israel Cooper. Smith soon after bought the property known as

James Edgar lived in England in the seventeenth century, and becoming dissatisified with the government, went to the county of Londonderry, Ireland. Here the family name was changed to Hegarty, whether through the local pronunciation or for some other reason, is not known. This ancestor raised a family of several sons and daughters, one of whom was named Joseph Hegarty. Joseph married at the age of twenty-two and became the father of four sons and three daughters. David, Samuel, Robert, Joseph, Isabella, Jane and Susanna. All at different times emigrated to America except Jane.

Samuel Hegarty (son of James) was born on May 13, 1764, and married in Ireland to Jane Whiteside. In 1808, with eight of their nine children, they came to America, landing at Philadelphia and settling temporarily in Mifflin Co. In 1811, Samuel came to Beccaria Twp. Clfd. Co., to view the prospects, and in 1813, brought his family to a new home. He died on Feb. 13, 1842.

- * In 1817, Isabella (Hegarty) McCully, widow of George McCully of the Co. of Londonderry, Ireland, emigrated with her eight children, the oldest about twenty-two years of age and the youngest, eighteen months. Their goal was Beccaria Twp. to be near Isabella's brother, Samuel. They set out to walk from Philadelphia to Clfd. Co. and in due course arrived safely. They established a home near the mouth of Muddy Run (where Madera is now established). Isabella was born in 1774 and died in 1859, buried in the Mt. Pleasant Cemetery near Utahville, Pa. 



McCRACKEN TO STRAW

James McCracken, Sr. was born on a ship coming to America from Derry, Northern Ireland in 1753. He fought in the Revolutionary War, and was one of the early settlers in Clfd. Co. in the early 1800's. James married Sarah Rebecca Greenwood, who was born in 1756. He and his family first settled on a farm above Curwensville, Pa. on or near the farm later owned by George Addleman. Later he moved on the ridge where Bloomington is now located. It is believed that he and his wife resided here until their deaths. (This move is open to question.) James died in Jan. 1813 and Sara's date of death is unknown. Both were buried in the McClure Cemetery at Curwensville, but like many other early settlers their graves are unmarked. James also helped to build the First Presbyterian Church which was located at this Cemetery. Their children were:

William, 1788-Greenwood Mary Margaret Nancy Sarah

Robert McCracken, son of James & Sarah, was born in 1777-died in 1852. He married Rachel Straw, daughter of Nicholas & Mary Catherine Straw. Rachel born 1785-1857. They lived on a ridge about one mile above New Millport in Knox Twp. They are buried at the Fruit Hill Cemetery near Ansonville, Pa. Their children were:

* William, 1807-1892 John Nicholas, 1808-James, 1810-David, 1811-Cornelius D., 1815-

Robert, 1817-George, 1819-Levi, 1822-Sarah, 1823-Catherine, 1826-

William, first born son of Robert & Rachel McCracken, was born in 1807-1892. Married to Mary Elizabeth Bell, daughter of Greenwood Bell. Mary Elizabeth born in 1812-died 1887. Both are buried at the Fruit Hill Cemetery. They lived on a farm between Kerrmoor and New Millport, later occupied by Harrison Norris. They sold the farm on June 2, 1872 and went to Va. for a few years. Came back and lived on a farm at Pine Grove, Lawrence Twp. Clfd. Co. Their children were:

Josephine, 1847- married James Sharp

Julian is the link between McCracken & Straw.

Ashley McCracken's daughter, Alice, married Harry Straw, son of Julian & Christian Jr. Straw. on Jan. 1, 1901. She lived one hundred nine years. B. 10/19/1877-D. 4/21/1986.

Sometime in 1751, Jost Stroh with his wife, left their home in Germany and sailed from Rotterdam for America, and landed at Philadelphia on Aug. 25, 1751. Later settled in Lancaster Co. for a few years and then went to what is now Westmoreland Co. Pa. Archives, Series 2, Vol. 17, page 444, Jost Stroh qualified as a new citizen. The name Stroh was changed to Straw sometine previous to the Revolution.

Jost Stroh's family consisted of five sons: Jacob. Michael, Nicholas, Philip, and Jost, Jr. Nicholas is the only one whose birthplace is known, but it is believed they were all born in America. All these sons served in the

Revolution.

Jacob settled in Crawford Co. Michael remained in Westmoreland Co. Philip joined Jacob in Crawford Co. Jost settled in Vermont.

*Nicholas Straw was born in Cacalico Twp., Lancaster Co. He went to the Buffalo Valley(Northumberland Co.) in 1774 and engaged in pottery making. Earthenware, as it was then called, was much used for cooking utensils, crockery,

Nicholas enlisted on Dec. 10, 1776 in the Company of Capt. William Gray, in the Regiment of Col. James Potter of the Penna. Line. Was engaged at Trenton and the battle at Princeton and discharged at Morristown, N. J. in the fall of 1776. Immediately re-enlisted in the Co. of Capt. Hawkins Booze, in the Regiment commanded by Col. Wiltner and served on the Penna. frontier for one full year. In the fall of 1778 again enlisted and served as Lieu. in the Co. commanded by Col. John Kelly. Again enlisted in the fall of 1779 in the Co. cammanded by Capt. James Thompson. in the Regiment of Col. John Kelly, and was discharged in the fall of 1780. Again enlisted in the same Co. and was finally discharged in 1782.

Revolutionary War pension claim - File # 23956. Revolutionary War Record- Pa. Archives, Series 3. Nicholas had married Mary Catherine, daughter of Christian and Rachel Dale of Buffalo Valley in 1775. After his final discharge from the Army, resided in Penn's Valley until 1803, when he moved to Clearfield Co., located on the banks of the Susquehanna River opposite what is known as Irwin Park, near Curwensville, Pa. At this time his family was complete:

*Christian, of whom more later.

Mary, 1782married ? Brown. Rachel, 1785-1857, married Robert McCracken. Nicholas Jr., 1791-1872, married Hannah White. Elizabeth, 1796- married Daniel Dale. Catherine, 1798-1877, married George Tubbs.

Nicholas and his son Christian, had purchased land and built a home. Here they found clay suitable for pottery and followed that trade until the death of Nicholas on Aug. 20, 1833, at the age of eighty years. He and his wife, Mary Catherine, rest in the McClure Cemetery south of Curwensville, but in unmarked graves.

Christian Straw, 1780-1870, came to Ferguson Twp. after his father, Nicholas, died. He cleared a farm and continued his trade in pottery making. Married twice, his first wife was Elizabeth Curry, daughter of John & Sarah Curry, of Centre Co. Their children were:

Joseph, 1805-1877, married Nancy Ann Thompson. Nicholas, 1810-1879, married Sarah Lytle.

Mary, 1811, died in childhood.

John. 1812-1901, married Mary Ann Smith.

Christian next married Jane Lytle, daughter of Charles Lytle of Lawrence Twp. Their children were: Hiram, 1822-1904, married Anna Margery Caldwell. George. 1825-1915. married Elizabeth Armstrong. William died in infancy. James, 1828-1894, unmarried. Elizabeth, 1829-Christian Jr., SEE BELOW Mary Jane, 1833-Rachel, 1835-Henry, 1837- married Emeline Bloom.

After an illness of ten weeks death intervened on Sunday evening and claimed the life of John L. McGinniss, prominent business man and one of the most popular citizens of Clearfield, who passed away at 7:30 o'clock at his home on South Front Street, from a heart

Impressive funeral services, marked by a large attendance of bereaved friends and the closing of all business, places during the burial hour, were conducted in St. Francis Catholic church here on Wednesday morning by Father Martin N. Glynn, followed by inter-

ment in Cavalry Cemebery.

Mr. McGinniss' elevation to business fame and personal popularity started when he came to Clearfield twenty-one years ago from DuBois. Naturally inclined toward salesmanship, the deceastd soon demonstrated his ability in the automobile field and entered the garage business with John W. Wrigley. From phenominal success, Mr. McGinnisa became a partner in the garage business with A. W. Lee, Jr., on Third Street.

In 1918 our subject and H. C. Mc-Cloud formed a partnership for automobile dealing and purchased the glass factory as a business location. In 1925 Mr. McCloud withdrew from the business and his interest was assumed by W. W. Wrigley, which partnership existed when Mr. McGinniss passed

Attesting his popularity is the fact that he was was desired fraternally by many organizations. He was a member of the Elks Lodge of Clearfield, the Rotary Club, the Commercial Club, a member of the Board of Directors of Crystal Springs Club, and a member of the Board of Directors of the Clear-

field Motor Club.

Had the deceased lived until Tuesday, November 21, he would have reached the age of flity three years. He was born in Wellsville, N. Frank H. McCully, fifteen years postmaster of Osceola Mills, died of complications following a long illness at his home in that city at 4:30 p. m. vesterday afternoon.

The deceased was born in Eamey on November 30, 1865, and moved with his mother and father to Osceola in 1879. WILLIAM A. HAGERTY

One of Clearfield's most eminent citizens and an elder attorney who was prominent throughout Central Pennsylvania was lost this week through the death of William A. Hagerty, which occurred at his home, 213 East Pine street, on Wednesday afternoon at 1:00 o'clock, following a long illness.

Death was caused by complications of diseases which were brought on by a stroke suffered in July of 1930, Mr. Hagerty recovered from this stroke sufficiently to be about again until July of last year, when failing health forced him to take to his bed, where

he remained until his death.

William Alexander Hagerty born at Glen Hope, the son of Joseph and Jane Alexander Hagerty, on Jan-uary 22, 1857, making his age 74 years, lour months, and one day at the time of his death. When he was three years of age he moved with his parents to Lumber City, where his father conducted a store until the family moved to Clearfield in 1865, at which time William was eight years

Mr. Hagerty's early education was gained in the schools of Clearfield and he was a member of the first graduating class of Clearfield High, 1876. After spending one year at Gettysburg College he returned to Clearfield and accepted a position in

the Clearfield County Bank. He was still a young man when he launched the career which he was to follow through life and attain such prominence as one of the ablest attorneys in this section. His first experience in law was when he entered the office of the Hon, J. B. McEnally. Always an ambitious young man, Mr. Hagerty learned the profession so rapidly he was ready for admittance to the bar in three years and in 1870 be-tame a full fledged member.

By vigorous work and constant application he rose rapidly in the ranks! until within a few years Mr. Hagerty was looked upon as one of the most skilled attorneys in this section of the State. His fiery demeanor and ag-gressiveness in the courts or other places where he was called upon to; act as an attorney gained for him a reputation that spread far beyond the borders of his home county, Later! in life Mr. Hagerty brought his powerful oratorical ability into play in behalf of many worthy civic and patriotic causes.

Always a staunch Democrat, Mr. Hagerty's fellow citizens chose him as such to the highest post in the Borough, that of Burgess. He was elected for the first time in 1925 and again in 1929, but ill health forced him to resign in 1931, before his second term was finished. So popular was Mr. Hagerty with the citizens of Clearfield that he was the nominee of both parties at his second election,

On October 24, 1893, Mr. Hagerty. was wed to Carrie Test, daughter of, Israel Test of Clearfield, and to that union three children were born. One daughter, Julia, died in 1899, at the age of four years, and two children, Mrs. Kenneth L. Thorn and William A., Jr., both of this place, survive, Mrs. Hagerty died in 1920 and five years later he was united in marriage again to Mrs. Jean Shaw Bailey of this place. His second wife died in June of 1927,

Mr. Hagerty was an ardent Chrisitian and a lifetong member of the Presbyterian Church. Before his health failed he took an active part. in social affairs, being a member of the Elks, Knights of Pythias, and Klwants. However, he resigned these orders and at the time of his death belonged only to the Manufacturers' and Bankers' Club of Philadelphia.

Funeral services were held at the Hagerty home this afternoon at 2:30 o'clock, in charge of the deceased's pastor, Rev. E. C. Reeve, The Bar Association attended the services their deceased member in a body, Interment in Hillcrest Cemetery.


Maynard Toot Passes Away

Sometime in 1751, Jost Stroh with his wife, left their home in Germany and sailed from Rotterdam for America, and landed at Philadelphia on Aug. 25, 1751. Later settled in Lancaster Co. for a few years and then went to what is now Westmoreland Co. Pa. Archives, Series 2, Vol. 17, page 444, Jost Stroh qualified as a new citizen. The name Stroh was changed to Straw sometime previous to the Revolution.

Jost Stroh's family consisted of five sons: Jacob, Michael, Nicholas, Philip, and Jost, Jr. Nicholas is the only one whose birthplace is known, but it is believed they were all born in America. All these sons served in the

Revolution.

Jacob settled in Crawford Co. Michael remained in Westmoreland Co. Philip joined Jacob in Crawford Co. Jost settled in Vermont.

*Nicholas Straw was born in Cacalico Twp., Lancaster Co. He went to the Buffalo Valley(Northumberland Co.) in 1774 and engaged in pottery making. Earthenware, as it was then called, was much used for cooking utensils, crockery, etc.

Nicholas enlisted on Dec. 10, 1776 in the Company of Capt. William Gray, in the Regiment of Col. James Potter of the Penna. Line. Was engaged at Trenton and the battle at Princeton and discharged at Morristown, N. J. in the fall of 1776. Immediately re-enlisted in the Co. of Capt. Hawkins Booze, in the Regiment commanded by Col. Wiltner and served on the Penna. frontier for one full year. In the fall of 1778 again enlisted and served as Lieu. in the Co. commanded by Col. John Kelly. Again enlisted in the fall of 1779 in the Co. commanded by Capt. James Thompson, in the Regiment of Col. John Kelly, and was discharged in the fall of 1780. Again enlisted in the same Co. and was finally discharged in 1782.

Nicholas had married Mary Catherine, daughter of

Irwin Park, near Curwensville, Pa. At this time his family

Nicholas and his son Christian, had purchased land and built a home. Here they found clay suitable for pottery and followed that trade until the death of Nicholas on Aug.20, 1833, at the age of eighty years. He and his wife, Mary Catherine, rest in the McClure Cemetery south of Curwensville, but in unmarked graves. Christian Straw, 1780-1870, came to Ferguson Twp. after his father, Nicholas, died. He cleared a farm and continued his trade in pottery making. Married twice, his first wife was Elizabeth Curry, daughter of John & Sarah Curry, of Centre Co. Their children were:
