Health Risks:

Females (Spaying):

Eliminates the risk of uterine infections (pyometra, a potentially deadly infection). Eliminates the risk of uterine and ovarian cancer, and significantly reduces the risk of mammary cancer.

Males (Neutering):
Prevents testicular cancer and reduces the risk of prostate problems.

Healthier Lives:

By eliminating the risk of certain cancers and infections of the reproductive system, spayed and neutered pets often live longer and healthier lives.

More Cost-Effective in the Long Run:

While there is an initial cost for the surgery, it can save you money in the long run by preventing expenses associated with pregnancy, birth complications, caring for a litter, and treating certain reproductive health issues.

Other Advantages:

Rabies tag licensing can be less expensive if patient is spayed/neutered and microchipped.
