

SPIRITUAL READING A Year with Mary Daily Meditations on the Mother of God

It was fitting for Mary never to be a slave to Satan

Day 47

If Mary was to crush Satan's head, St. Alphonsus reasons, it was fitting that she would never have been first subject to him because of sin.

Great indeed was the injury imposed on Adam and all his posterity by his accursed sin. At the same time that he, to his own great misfortune, lost grace, he also forfeited all the other precious gifts with which he had originally been enriched, and drew down upon himself and all his descendants the enmity of God and an accumulation of evils. But from this general misfortune God was pleased to exempt that Blessed Virgin whom he had destined to be the mother of the Second Adam – Jesus Christ – who was to repair the evil done by the first Adam. Now let's see how becoming it was that God should in this way preserve her.

It was fitting that God should preserve Mary from original sin because he destined her to crush the head of that hellish serpent that, by seducing our first parents, brought death upon all men. This our Lord foretold to the serpent: "I will put enmity between you and the woman, and your seed and her seed. She shall crush your head" (see Gn 3:15). But if Mary was to be that valiant woman brought into the world to conquer Lucifer, certainly it was not fitting that he should first conquer her and make her his slave. Instead, it was reasonable that she should be preserved from all stain or even momentary subjection to her opponent. The proud spirit endeavored to infect the most pure soul of this virgin with his venom, as he had already infected the whole human race.

But praised and ever blessed be God! In his infinite goodness, he endowed Mary ahead of time for this purpose with such great grace that, remaining always free from any guilt of sin, she was always able to beat down and confound the Devil's pride.

Jubilee 2025-Pilgrims of Hope

The Universal Church is celebrating the Jubilee Year 2025 – 2,025th anniversary of the Incarnation of our Lord. The Jubilee Year offers the faithful opportunities to participate in various jubilee events at the Vatican and in local dioceses. The great tradition of opening the Holy Door began when Pope Francis opened the Holy Door of St. Peter's Basilica on December 24, 2024. Bishop Powers opened the Jubilee year on December 29, 2024 at Cathedral of Christ the King in Superior.

As a special focus in the Diocese of Superior, Cathedral of Christ the King in Superior and St. Joseph in La Pointe on Madeline Island are designated as holy sites to receive indulgences. Another special focus for the Jubilee Year is on celebrating the Consecrated Life that served our parishes in the past and the faithful sons and daughters of our diocese who committed themselves to Consecrated Life. What is a Mass Intention?

A family or an individual requests that Mass be celebrated for a particular intention. Requesting a mass intention means that you are asking the grace of Christ's sacrifice in his death and resurrection be applied for a particular purpose, for example, for a deceased person or a living person who is ill or in thanksgiving for a favor received.

In our cluster at either one of our parishes we celebrate single intention masses on Sunday and weekday. To request a mass intention, kindly call the parish offices.

Why do we Light a Votive prayer candle

Lighting a candle for your family and friends or for personal prayer is an important Catholic tradition and holds a deeper meaning. It is a form of devotion to the Lord for particular intentions. Lighting a candle illumines our heart toward experiencing the presence of God. As we light a candle it is an expression of spiritual submission and seeking God's guidance, like a prayer of the heart longing for light. It is an offering of sacrifice and praise to God, expressing our love for the people we pray for. Even as we leave the church, The flickering light continues to burn and say "Remember me, Lord, remember my prayer and those for whom I pray." It is a sacred space and time seeking communion with God and the loved ones who passed away. As you light a candle It feels quenching the thirst and experiencing consolation in life.
