

Plot Synopsis

The wealthy Buoso Donati has just died at home in Florence and his relatives are somewhat exaggerating in their mourning of his passing away; in reality they all expect to be amply consoled by their inheritance. Betto, the poorest of them all, has heard rumors that Buoso may have left a large amount of money to the church. Suspicious and worried, the relatives start looking for the will; when they finally uncover it, they find their worst fears have come true: Buoso Donati has left his entire inheritance to the catholic church. The inauthentic grief for the loss of their dear one turns into an authentic lament for the loss of their inheritance. The young Rinnuccio is upset, for whom the money would have meant permission to marry the sweet Lauretta (daughter of the commoner Gianni Schicchi) who possesses no dowry.

In vain, Buoso's relatives turn to the wise Simone for advice. Rinuccio calls upon Gianni Schicchi, well known for his shrewdness, to come help the family with their predicament. The other family members do not initially want to accept Schicchi's help, as the Donati family sees themselves as above dealing with commoners, but by now Gianni and his daughter Lauretta have already arrived. Chaos ensues as the proud Zita announces her refusal of Rinuccio and Lauretta's marriage, this refusal offends Schicchi and he attempts to storm out. Lauretta, stopping her father, sings the well-known aria "Oh Mio Babbino Caro"; she attempts to persuade him for his help so she can marry her beloved Rinuccio. Moved by his daughter's lament, Schicchi agrees to help.

Gianni quickly devises a plan, he hides in the bed of the deceased and imitates his voice to interact with the doctor who comes to check on Buoso. He claims that he feels better and sends the doctor away. Schicchi's plan is now put into practice: dressed as Buoso, he lies on his bed and summons the public notary and witness, in front of whom he dictates a new will. He distributes the cash and properties fairly among the relatives, but the most valuable assets (the mansion in Florence, the mills in Signa, and the car) he keeps for himself. The relatives can't do anything about this "robbery" without revealing their fraud, for which the penalty is the cutting-off of a hand and exile from Florence. Once the notary and witness have left, Gianni chases the enraged relatives out of the house as they plunder the home that is now Schicchi's property. Rinuccio and Lauretta return, happily embracing as they look towards their future.


LA-based soprano Chandler E. Cummings (she/her)

friendly demeanor, Landmark always has stress free rehearsals and love Haka so much for that. At St. A's he recently sang the baritone solo in Vaughan Williams Five Mystical Songs, and also arranged/conducted the work for a small orchestral ensemble.





As one of the founders of Landmark Opera, Carol Lande (La Ciesca) is an experienced soprano with a very kind and generous heart. Also a die-hard Mozart fan, a few of his favorite roles include Ottavio in Don Giovanni, Tamino in Die Zauberflöte, and Basilio in Le nozze di Figaro. He is also an accomplished choral singer, and his dad says he is "the best one in his row." He is currently pursuing his Master's in Music at CSUN under the tutelage of Hugo Vera. In his rare free time, he enjoys hiking and relaxing on the beach, often in that order.

Jeremy Taylor (Gherardino) is a friend of many opera companies in SoCal. He is the son of Shawn and Laura Taylor (Shawn is in this production) He appeared in Mission Opera's "Thirteen Clocks." His vibrant personality has given him the opportunity to make many friends when he attends rehearsals. Jeremy, born 1992, was in a tragic wreck in 2010, just weeks after high school graduation, which left him with Traumatic Brain Injury. His career goal was to race motorcycles then eventually become a mechanic for off road vehicles and motorcycles. We continue to pray this dream will be fulfilled one day. Until then, enjoy his bright personality in this production.





Shawn Taylor (Gherardo) — has an MM from CSU Long Beach. He has performed roles with Long Beach Opera, Mission Opera, Landmark Opera, Repertory Opera Theatre, Pacific Lyric Association, Riverside Lyric Opera, Celestial Opera, Capitol Opera and LA Met l'Opera. He has performed in many musicals and Gilbert and Sullivan Shows and is a board member for Mission Opera. Shawn sings in several churches throughout So Cal, and is a staff singer and soloist for the Santa Clarita Master Chorale, Cal Phil and GSPO. Shawn has been a Choral Teacher since 1986 in Elementary, Junior High, High School and was a Vocal Instructor at Cal Baptist University. He also taught theatre and was the vocal coach for the All American Boys Choir.



Baritone **Dr. Joshua R. Wentz** (**Gianni Schicchi**) has had the privilege of singing for two decades throughout the United States and abroad in over a dozen countries. He has worked with Cleveland Opera, Florida Grand Opera, Opera Carolina, Dayton Opera (Ohio), Harrower Opera, Festival Internaccional d'Opera Americas, Rome Festival Opera, Darmstadt Festspiel, and various other venues. Recent engagements include Lindorf/Crespel in Tales of Hoffmann and Baron Zeta in The Merry Widow, both in São Paolo, Brazil with the Festival Internacional de Opera Americas. In 2013, he debuted the role of Sam in the world premiere of Bambino by Richard Maltz. He performed Count Almaviva in Le Nozze di Figaro and Pistola in Falstaff with the Rome Festival Orchestra in Rome, Italy, and Papageno in Die Zauberflöte in Darmstadt, Germany. Favorite roles include Giovanni, Figaro, Top in Copland's The Tender Land, and Pangloss in Bernstein's Candide.

Soprano Carol Winston (La Ciesca) is a familiar face to southland audiences, she sang "First Lady" in Die Zauberflöte with Landmark Opera and "Mrs. Hayes" in Mission Opera's production of Susannah in summer 2023. Other recent roles include "Miss Pinkerton" in The Old Maid and the Thief with Mission Opera and with Opera a la Mode. Pre-pandemic, she performed "Violetta" in La Traviata, "Adele" in Die Fledermaus, "Diana" in Orpheus in the Underworld, "Susanna" in Le Nozze di Figaro, "Frasquita" in Carmen, and "Zerlina" in Don Giovanni.
