Elizabeth Hickman was Jonathan and Mary
Clark's 2nd great-granddaughter. Elizabeth
"Liz" Hickman, was a direct descendant of the
Clark family. Liz went to school at the
University of Wisconsin, and obtained a degree
in Education.

After teaching Geology in the Lab at UW
Oshkosh she sailed to New Zealand, and taught
Science in Wellington, and then to Australia
where she taught Geology in Melbourne.
After teaching in Australia, Liz moved back to

the U.S. where she met her husband Bob.

After traveling for her career, she settled back in Madison, Wisconsin and raised her family. Liz is fondly remembered for her love of traveling, her family, geneology and celebrating life.

Liz valued her time visiting the Clark house with her family, immersing herself in the 175 years of heritage and history. Liz will be missed here at the Jonathan Clark House and we are grateful for her time spent with us.

PRESERVATION PROJECT

This summer, after many years of searching for an experienced contractor, the Jonathan Clark House Museum was able to procure the talents of Brookwater Creations Contracting Group, owned by Anna and Jeff Burns. The all encompassing preservation project included the restoration and preservation of the exterior fascia, eves, mortar repair, period appropriate hand crafted gutters and hand hewn windows, as well as window repair and replacement to increase uniformity and historic interpretation.

This summer and fall were a bustling time at the Jonathan Clark House Museum, with two heritage days, Pie on the Patio, and exterior preservation/restorative work being completed. A celebratory commemoration marked a momentous occasion.

On a breezy and warm Saturday in September, the Jonathan Clark House hosted a Rope Cutting Ceremony to celebrate the long-awaited completion of the Museum Preservation Projects. Culminating many years of planning, fundraising for the Jonathan Clark House's exterior, including gutters, windows, and masonry, was completed.

Special guests such as Dr. Sandy Custer, the last owner and dentist of the Jonathan Clark House, and representatives from the Mequon-Thiensville Chamber of Commerce as well as the Mequon Thiensville Community Foundation attended to mark the occasion. The Clark Houses' very own Young Historians not only cut the rope, but, with the assistance of Fred Derr, also made the rope. The celebration was well attended, with volunteers past and present, board members, and generous community supporters. The beautiful event was celebrated with cold cider, coffee generously donated by Collectivo Coffee, and delicious carrot cake from Outpost

Foods.

Celebrating Heritage and History at the Clark



The Jonathan Clark House Museum hosted its annual Potato Harvesting Event, reflecting on the Clark House's past as a working farm. The Potato Harvesting event was well attended by guests and community members alike. The Museums younger guests especially enjoyed digging up the potatoes and suggested recipes were shared for root vegetable.

Planting and harvesting practices were discussed and showcased by Fred Derr, Preservation Manager showing how plantings were done in the 19th Century. As potato recipes were a fairly new addition to the settlers fare, dishes such as boiled potatos, and mashed potatos with milk or cream and salt and pepper were influenced by Irish Immigrants, the Clark family would have likely served one of these dishes at dinner.

Each guest was able to take home what they harvested, with the Museums youngest guests having the most success in their potato yields. 19th century yard games were played by all, and adults had the opportunity to try their hand at hoop games, checkers and pin and ball knock down games too!





The Jonathan Clark House Museum celebrated its Heritage Days this summer; bathed in warm summer sun the museum celebrated its rich history and provided an immersive experience for community members and guests alike.

The Heritage Days Celebrations were spread out over two days and provided a beautiful walk back in time; complete with adorable farm animals such as calves, chickens, kittens, goats and ducks

No farmstead gathering would be complete without snacks, Museum guests were treated to fresh bread, herbed butter, chocolate milk and cheese.


