## Talking About Wisconsin History...and Jonathan Clark


News from Clark House Historian Reed Perkins

Over the last year or so I've been giving illustrated historical presentations on topics related to the research I do for the Jonathan Clark House. This September, I got to talk about some very interesting topics, to some very enthusiastic and attentive audiences.



JCH Historian Reed Perkins at WSDAR, Oshkosh, 2024


The first of these events was my September 13, 2024, after-dinner presentation at the Fall Workshop of the Wisconsin Society, Daughters of the American Revolution (WSDAR). My topic was “Building the Military Road, Wisconsin Territory’s First Federal Road.” Clark House visitors may remember that Jonathan Clark first arrived in Wisconsin in October, 1833, as a new recruit to the U.S. Army’s 5th infantry regiment, stationed at Fort Howard (Green Bay). JMC served his three-year enlistment at Ft. Howard, and spent much of the summer and fall of 1835 and 1836 building the eastern portion of the territory’s “Old Military Road” from Ft. Howard

toward the south end of Lake Winnebago and then, ultimately, to Ft. Winnebago (Portage) and Ft. Crawford (Prairie du Chien).

My talk incorporated some of the 1830s and '40s U.S. Army and road-building information that I've discussed on my Clark House Historian blog, plus new primary source materials, all enhanced by period maps, photographs and illustrations. By the end of the presentation I was able to connect JMC—and our museum—to the era of Wisconsin's earliest white settlement and the subsequent burst of federal and civilian road-building activity, in which our Jonathan Clark played an active and important role. And in the process, I introduced the Jonathan Clark House Museum to 150 new history-loving friends from the WSDAR.





### Returning the Land to its Roots


Program presenters will be Kristin Thiel, Executive Director of Mequon Nature Preserve, and Christine Nuernberg, former City of Mequon Mayor and MNP Champion. They will trace the time from when European settlers first came to the area, to the development of family farms, and to the implementation of a 150- year land restoration program that re-establishes wetlands, prairies, forests. You will hear about the end of a farming community and the emergence of a unique outdoor educational setting where students of all ages are learning and conducting research on how to restore the land to a time prior to the European Settlement.


# “Rolling Land, Swamps and Second Rate Timber...”

## New Historic Maps in the JCH Collection



One of the most intriguing features on the plat maps is a study of 1860 township farms and farmers. A side bar along the maps is a collection of notes on the nature of the land itself in 1860, such as *rolling land*, *swamps* and *second rate timber*.

JCH co-curators Fred Derr and Nina Look recently took a trip to the Wisconsin Historical Society Archives in Madison where the staff uncovered a collection of township maps that had been created in the 1920s and used to write the book *Four Wisconsin Counties: Prairie and Forest*. The book, published in 1927, is an account of Kenosha, Racine, Milwaukee and Ozaukee Counties from the time before white settlement until the 1920s, with an emphasis on the first decades of settlement circa 1830-1860.

The author was Joseph Schafer, superintendent of the Wisconsin Historical Society. *Four Wisconsin Counties* was Volume II of a multi-volume project that Schafer devised and called *The Wisconsin Domesday Book*, modeled after the epic 11th-century first census of England and Wales, the *Domesday Book*. Fred and Nina were excited to learn that Volume I of Schafer's project consisted of a folder of historic township plat maps.

Volume II of the Wisconsin Domesday Book project, *Four Wisconsin Counties: Prairie and Forest* itself is an intensive early study of this region of Wisconsin. A copy of the book is in the JCH library and is available to read at the museum. Contact Fred to schedule a viewing of the maps for your personal study of 1860.

Through Fred and Nina's efforts JCH has acquired the *Wisconsin Domesday Book's* reconstructed 1860 plat maps for Mequon Township and Cedarburg Township that show who owned (or occupied) which properties in these towns circa 1860. In addition, they purchased a map of the Wisconsin Military Road. The title of the undated map is "Map of the Route of the Military Road from Fort Crawford to Fort Howard via Fort Winnebago."

The goal is to have the maps framed and on display in the JCH Library. A \$500 grant from the Pink Llama Gallery in Cedarburg is a welcome sponsorship and investment in the continued research about our early settlers. Thank you, Tammie Strause!
