THE EVENT OF <u>OUR</u> CENTURY

The JCH Bonniwell Bible event was a day charged with excitement, and a general atmosphere of a joy in being together. Bonniwells came from within and beyond the state line, with many of these relations meeting for the first time. This in itself illustrates the great importance of the Bible coming back to it's roots, because it literally brought family and the community closer together. As the Jonathan Clark House Museum strives to serve it's community and interpret how people lived in this area in the mid 19th century we are now much better equipped to do so with the Bonniwell Bible in our permanent collection and our current century. Museums utilize their collections and cultural objects to show tangible evidence of our shared history. With the bible on display inside the historic Jonathan Clark House we can now more fully share our story and hopefully inspire awe and wonder to those who visit and support the Jonathan Clark House Museum.

THE HISTORIC BONNIWELL FAMILY BIBLE BY REED PERKINS, CLARK HOUSE HISTORIAN

Since its acquisition by the Friends in 2012, the Jonathan Clark House has been brought to life with a beautiful collection of period furnishings and accessories. Yet very few of these artifacts actually belonged to the Clarks or their neighbors. The Bonniwell Family Bible is a notable exception. Early this spring, following up on clues from an old newspaper article, family chronicler George B. Bonniwell and I were able to locate the "lost" Bonniwell family Bible. And after a series of emails and phone conversations, the Bible's current owner, Bonniwell descendant Kenadlyne Gentile, graciously agreed that the Jonathan Clark House Museum would be an ideal permanent home for the historic Bible and other related Bonniwell documents.

This Bible, in the Geneva translation, was printed in London circa 1579–1620, and has been in the family since at least 1697. It came to Meguon with the Bonniwells in 1839, and contains birth, marriage. death, and other unique handwritten records of the family dating from the late-1600s through the early-1900s. For many years it belonged to Alfred and Sarah (Turck) Bonniwell. Sarah was Mary (Turck) Clark's youngest sister; Alfred was the Clarks' brother-in-law. It's likely that this Bible accompanied the Bonniwell family throughout the 1840s and '50s as they worshiped with members of the Clark, Turck and other neighbor families at the nearby Bonniwell School. The Bonniwell Family Bible is a unique and irreplaceable part of Bonniwell—and Mequon—history. We are deeply grateful to the Bible's current owner, Kendalyne Gentile, and her family for their generous donation of this very special piece of local history, and we look forward to displaying and interpreting the Bonniwell Bible for generations of interested history lovers.
