Good day and God's blessings upon you. I hope this finds you doing well and having survived our few days of sweltering heat. I just returned to church after a two week vacation, which I thank you all for and was happy to be inside by last weekend and not driving on a road somewhere.

As I indicated last month, we have entered the season of what is called Ordinary time, the time between Pentecost and Christ the King Sunday in November, so this is a time in our scripture readings where we see a lot of Jesus' miracles and teachings before he goes to Jerusalem and confronts the religious leaders of his time. I personally enjoy it as it allows me to preach on verses that give us all the opportunity to contemplate what Jesus was really teaching his Apostles and ultimately us, on his way to Jerusalem.

The verses for the last Sunday in June provide one of those opportunities to think and wonder what Jesus is saying to us here in the 21st century. Our reading comes from the Gospel of Luke, Chapter 9: 52-62. I encourage you to read it in full but I would like to focus for a minute on the last part of those verses, 61-62. I took this translation from The Message Bible so it is a little different than our normal translation:

"Then another said, "I'm ready to follow you, Master, but first excuse me while I get things straightened out at home. Jesus said, "No procrastination. No backward looks. You can't put God's kingdom off till tomorrow. Seize the day."

When I read these verses, I feel like Jesus is pointing at me and telling me, "Ed, tradition is good at times, but Jesus Christ's church moves forward and if you get stuck where you are, that is where you will stay, and you will wither on the vine, and you know what comes next".

This time between gives all of us an opportunity to look at what we have done for years in our prayer life, scripture reading life and, yes, how we worship Jesus Christ, not only on Sundays but throughout our week. We may need to change a few things to keep pushing the word of Jesus Christ out to our community. And yes, we may have to make ourselves uncomfortable to do what Jesus Christ asks us to do. And what is that? I do not have the answer, but with prayer and discernment, I think this church, the Body of Christ, can think of ways that we can get our message out in a more digestible way for our community to want to come hear about Jesus Christ. I welcome your input and suggestions.

God Bless you during this "ordinary", in between season. I hope you have some time to rest and recharge before we get back to the grind in September.

And that just what our custodian, Colleen Audorff, did.

Colleen is a bus driver for Riteway, picking up and delivering our children before and after school and driving school busses. She has been doing this for years, long before she came to FPC.

While she has been driving school children to school and back for many years, she hadn't driven a motor coach filled with people for a long distance before. A motor coach is more like a Greyhound bus than a school bus and it is designed to carry adult passengers. Her "maiden trip" came on Friday, June 13 when she was scheduled to drive a group of law enforcement personnel from Wausau to Milwaukee for a Brewers game.

And so off she went. Or so she thought. Unfortunately she only got as far as Thorp when the coach broke down. After she crawled under the vehicle, Colleen determined it was a coolant leak and called for backup. She asked the bus company to send her a school bus so she could transport the waiting Brewers fans to where they could meet up with another motor coach.

After loading the waiting passengers onto the school bus (which they obviously hadn't been expecting), she was able to deliver them to the waiting backup coach and they were off to Milwaukee.

All's well that ends well. The group got to the game. The Brewers won and Colleen completed her first coach trip relatively unscathed. That's our gal!

LEO AND CHIP STUFFED TOYS AVAILABLE FOR PURCHASE

Over the years we have come to know our Chippewa Falls K9 dogs, Leo and Chip. Leo has been in our church doing drug and SWAT training and has been part of our Trunk or Treat event in past years. But the time has come that Leo will soon be retired and go to live with his handler, Sgt. Steve McMahon, which leaves a vacancy to be filled.

The cost of a new K9 dog, plus the purchase of a new vehicle to carry him on his rounds plus training for the dog and his handler comes to about \$100,000. Part of this cost will be offset by the sale of the current vehicle which has reached the end of its days with the police force. This cost doesn't include transportation, housing and food for the handler who will meet his new companion in New Mexico sometime next year. Leo will retire at the end of 2026 and it is hoped his replacement will be ready for duty by then.

In the meantime, the police department is conducting a fundraising event featuring Leo and Therapy Dog Chip, to help with the added expenses. The fundraiser includes two stuffed dog modeled after Leo and Chip. Samples of the plushies (as they are known) are in the church and are available for \$20 each from the police department. 
STATED CLERK BRAD CARLOSS SERIOUSLY INJURED

His recovery is going well but he is still dealing with a lot of pain and needs to be able to get around comfortably before going home.
