PASTOR'S PERSPECTIVE ON VIOLENCE

Good day and God's blessings upon you. What a drastic change in our country in just two months! Sometimes it makes your head spin at how fast these things happen. This has been weighing on my heart so I felt I should share it with you.

I talked on July 21 in church about what had happened on the evening of July 22 with former President Trump. I pointed out that it was unacceptable for any violence in any form to happen in our country, especially violence toward any public official, current or previous. I also reminded the congregation that all government officials, current and former, need to be prayed for and wished good health and safety. Paul told us all in his letter to the Romans 13:1-2; "Let every person be subject to the governing authorities, for there is no authority except from God, and those authorities that exist have been instituted by God. Therefore, whoever resists authority resists what God has appointed, and those who resist will incur judgment." His protégé, Timothy, also told us in 1Timothy 2:1-4 that "supplications, prayers, intercessions and thanksgivings be made for everyone, for kings and all who are in high positions…"

The discourse in our country goes against everything that Jesus told us to do in Mark 12:29-31. When he was asked which commandment is the first of all, "Jesus answered, 'The first is, "Hear, O Israel: the Lord our God, the Lord is one; you shall love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your mind and with all your strength." "The second is this, 'You shall love your neighbor as yourself.' There is no other commandment greater than these."

Kathryn M. Schifferdecker offered this at the end of her commentary on Jeremiah 23:1-6 from last week, "As we in the United States enter into a contentious election season, we pray for leaders of integrity to be chosen, shepherds who serve their people, who practice justice (*mishpat*) and righteousness (*tsedakah*). And we pray for such leaders in nations around the world, shepherds who will usher in God's *shalom*, so that their people 'shall not fear any longer, or be dismayed, nor shall any be missing.' May it be so for us and for our global neighbors."

Once again, please pray for our country and please pray for the anger that seems to be running through our country to stop and for Jesus' guidance to permeate our hearts.

PURE WATER DAYS SERVICE TO BE AUGUST 11

The ecumenical service that Chippewa Falls hosts during the Pure Water Days Festival is perhaps one of the most delightful examples of Wisconsin culture in the state. It is held in Irvine Park at the gazebo built to honor those who served in World War One. All are welcome.

The service will be held beginning at 9:00 AM on Sunday, August 11 and will include pastors and congregations from Trinity United Methodist, Our Saviour's Lutheran, First Presbyterian, Central Lutheran, Christ Episcopal, Zion Methodist and Lake Hallie Methodist churches making it a truly ecumenical service.

This year Pastor Eddie Crise of Trinity United Methodist Church will deliver the sermon. All the other duties of the service are divided equally. A collection is held which goes to an agreed upon community service

Early in the service water will be poured in keeping with the theme of Pure Water Days and attendees are encouraged to bring bottles of water collected from the river, creek or a lake to add to the water being poured. There will be traditional music provided by an ecumenical choir directed by Ron Buckles of Our Saviour's Lutheran Church.

There are benches at the band shell but many people choose to bring folding chairs or blankets to sit on the hill. The earlier than usual schedule should mean than the sun won't shine as brightly on worshippers making for a more pleasant morning. The service usually sees about 200 attendees.

In case of rain the service will move to Our Saviour's parking lot where they are already set up for services by car radio.

There will be no regular service at FPC that Sunday.

STARGAZING IN THE NORTHERN SKY

(Editor's Note: Now that summer has set in with warm nights, you may want to do a bit of star-gazing. The following article by FPC member Kevin Litten appeared in the July 19 issue of the Eau Claire Leader Telegram.)

Most people can point out the Big Dipper. The Big Dipper is an asterism, a smaller part of the constellation Ursa Major – the Big Bear. The two outside stars of the ladle, not the handle, point towards Polaris, the North Star. We say point towards because it misses the star by a proverbial mile yet it gets your eyes looking in the correct direction. Once you find Polaris, you know which way is North.

Polaris is in the constellation Ursa Minor or the little bear. Polaris is the last star on the end of the bear's tail or the handle of the little dipper.

Here in Wisconsin, the Big Dipper is up all night, all year long. If you are overwintering in Florida the Big Dipper will scoot beneath the trees. The constellation Cassiopeia, the queen, has a bright W shaped asterism that is easy to spot. Between Cassiopeia and the Little Dipper where Polaris lies is the constellation Cepheus, the king. The five brightest stars of Cepheus form the shape of a steep roofed house. If you take the top roof star of Cepheus, known as Errai, and the brightest star on the end of Cassiopeia's W, known as Caph, draw a line along those two stars, and it will take you very nicely to Polaris, but not exactly either.

The handle of the Big Dipper forms a nice arc. If you follow that arc about twice as long as the arc itself, it will take you to a bright star known as Arcturus. Out of that comes the rhyme "Take the arc to Arcturus". You were wondering how astronomers find their way around? Sometimes we use rhymes.

Arcturus is the brightest star in the constellation Bootes, the herdsman. Bootes looks like a kite with tiny feet. There are many notable things to look at in Bootes yet it is also notable for having a void. This gives cosmologists something to write papers about. So maybe it is a good thing.

From Arcturus, you can "Spike to Spica", the brightest star in the constellation Virgo, the virgin. Virgo contains a high number of galaxies. Possibly keeping the cosmos in balance? More papers to write.
