LAST CALL FOR BACKPACK GIVEAWAY!

Believe it or not, school will be starting soon and the annual Backpack Giveaway will be ending even sooner. We only have until August 4 to get our donations of money or materials to Valley Vineyard Church so they can put the backpacks together and distribute them before school starts.

The list of needed materials is long but all of the items are easily obtained from local stores.

Elementary school grades need scissors, glue sticks, glue bottles, pencils, crayons, notebooks, folders, markers, erasers and pens (both black and red).

Middle school backpacks include loose leaf paper, rulers, folders of different colors, notebooks of different colors, black and red pens, color pencils, erasers, glue sticks, compass/protractors, highlighters, binders and scientific calculators.

For the highschoolers, include notebooks, folders, black and red pens, pencils and loose leaf paper.

Add to all of these items, the backpacks themselves and you have a complete list.

THE INTERIM PASTOR SEARCH BEGINS

The search for an interim pastor for FPC has begun.

The interim search committee, comprised of members of Session, has started its search for an interim pastor to lead us until we find a called-pastor.

The search began with preparation of our Ministry Information Form (MIF), which lists what we are and what we are seeking in a pastor. This MIF was sent to the Church Leadership Connection (CLC) which keeps track of churches in need of personnel and personnel seeking a church.

The CLC matched our MIFs with Personal Information Forms (PIF) from pastors looking for a position. To date we have nine candidates who have had either interim training or actual interim experience and are seeking part time work.

The Session has met to discuss these candidates and review the PIFs. The next step will be to narrow our search and interview the selected candidates.

You will be hearing more about this search in coming weeks. In the meantime, prayers are in order.

ECUMENICAL SERVICE IN THE PARK

As in past years, FPC will be participating in the Pure Water Days ecumenical service in Irvine Park on August 11.

The Sunday service on that day will begin at 10 AM when we will join other protestant churches for this special service. **There will be no service at the church that day.** We will join the congregations from Trinity United Methodist, Zion Methodist, Our Saviour's Lutheran, Central Lutheran and Christ Episcopal Churches in this special service.

Rev. Aaron Zook from the Episcopal Church will deliver the sermon and the music will be provided by Our Saviour's Lutheran Church. First Presbyterian Church will provide the communion elements but another ordained pastor will officiate at the table.

In addition to communion servers, we will need at least two ushers who will also take the collection and 50 to 75 bars to serve after the service. We are loaning several of our smaller tables for the service. If you have a pickup truck to help haul them to the park, or if you can help, please contact Lynda Butek.

You can purchase the cards on Sunday mornings, Monday from 9-10AM, and during regular office hours, Tuesday through Thursday, from 9 to 2. These cards are in addition to the Kwik Trip cards we have carried for some time. In the future, we may be adding additional cards to our stock as you indicate where you shop.

LATEST TINY HOUSE SOON TO BE FINISHED

The latest in the string of tiny houses nears completion at Christ Episcopal Church here in Chippewa.

Many man-hours of work go into each tiny house and even though we don't have the physical space to have one of our own, some of our men have been helping build the latest house. Gene Peissig and Al Wolfe (who is a licensed electrician) have installed the electrical connections needed for the house.

In addition, as we have in the past, we continue to collect and store the materials and things needed to complete the houses. These include sheets, blankets, dishes, cutlery, etc. The list goes on and on. We may not have the outside room for a house but we certainly have room in our basement to store what is needed to make a tiny house a home.

If you want to see the fruits of the labors of the many churches involved, one of the tiny houses will be at the National Night Out at the Fairgrounds on August 6.

Since the project began, the tiny house project has provided over 1,000 nights of housing to those who would otherwise not have a roof over their heads.

Each of the residents of the tiny houses has his own story to tell. They are heart-breaking but show us the good we are doing in Chippewa.

Sara had a string of unfortunate events happen to her that brought her to a tiny house. She lost a teenage daughter to cancer during the winter of 2015 and in 2016 her significant other had health conditions that kept him from working.

On top of those two things, her vehicle just wore out from the many trips to medical clinics. Sara was able to find a job while living in a tiny house and pay off some past bills. A car was donated to her by a concerned volunteer from Our Saviour's Lutheran Church.

Sara is just one person helped by being able to call a tiny house home.

Editor's note: Our former interim pastor, Katherine Griffis, has been watching our progress since Karel left us. Here are her words for us.

"You as a congregation belong to Jesus Christ, who is your Head. (Also the Rock on which you are built.) He loves you; He calls you; He names you His friends; He has work for you.

What are the needs in Chippewa Falls and the world that Jesus is calling you to respond to in His name and for His sake? What are the resources He has given you? What does He want you to do with them?

And water bottles full of living water.)

STAINED GLASS WINDOWS IN FELLOWSHIP HALL

When you walk into our sanctuary or Fellowship Hall, you cannot help but notice our beautiful stained glass windows. The soft light flowing through the windows offers such a calming and welcoming feeling to all who enter.

As usual, we can thank those who came before us for these well-thought-out pieces of work. For some of us, the windows are some of the best things about FPC.

In 2006 we formed a "Stained Glass Committee". Members of this committee were: Barb Smith, George Abendroth, Verene Crane, Mike Tzanakis, Dave Cihasky, Jan Hilton-Koepke, Steve Playter, George Fleming, and Joe Mandelert.

It was their job to design the stained glass window in Fellowship Hall. They wanted a Celtic cross and/or the church building represented. They felt the glass should represent the mission statement of the church: Worship-Invite-Involve, Enrich-Extend.

In 1996 an abstract mosaic weaving titled, "Renewal" was created by Linda Franzel-Annett. It was dedicated in memory of Delores Boyer. You can appreciate it hanging on the east wall of Fellowship Hall. The weaving abstractly shows a landscape with greens at the bottom representing the earth, blues representing a flowing river, and upper colors representing a sunrise. Since the stained glass windows would be directly across from this large piece of work, the committee wanted it to include similar depictions.

Take a good look at the windows and you'll see this committee did a really great job incorporating and conveying the messages they wanted to. The beautiful windows have a stunning Celtic cross in the center. Below are people standing next to a river (perhaps the Chippewa River, perhaps the River Jordan) and looking up in awe at the brilliant cross radiating the welcoming colors of a sunrise.

Let us give thanks by appreciating the time and thoughtfulness that went into beautifying our building with these meaningful stained glass pieces of art.
