FALL BRINGS ALL SAINTS DAY

All Saints' Day, also known as All Hallows' Day, Hallowmas, the Feast of All Saints, or Solemnity of All Saints, is a Christian feast day celebrated in honor of all the saints. Its intent is to celebrate all the saints, including those who are no longer celebrated, or are not celebrated individually, either because the number of saints has become so great or because they were celebrated in groups, after suffering martyrdom collectively. In our case, we choose to celebrate and honor all those who have gone before us.

In Western Christianity it is celebrated on November 1. Since October 31 is the Sunday closest to All Saints Day, we have chosen to celebrate our saints on that day.

Traditionally we honor our loved ones by writing their names on ribbons. After all the names are read by the pastor and a bell rung for each name, these ribbons join those from past All Saints Days in a long garland stretching around the sanctuary. In that way we not only honor our "saints" but are surrounded by them. The ribbons will remain around the sanctuary for several weeks to remind us of our loved ones.

We have our former Interim Pastor, Katherine Griffis, to thank for making All Saints Sunday an important day on our church calendar. She started the tradition of writing names of the departed on ribbons which encircle the sanctuary and we have continued the practice for the past 10 or more years.

The Christian celebration of All Saints' Day and All Souls' Day stems from a belief that there is a powerful spiritual bond between those in heaven and the living.

Protestants generally commemorate all Christians, living and deceased, on All Saints' Day and they use it to remember all Christians both past and present.

While the dead are solemnly remembered during worship on All Saints' Sunday, the festival is ultimately a celebration of Christ's victory over death.

All Saints Sunday marks the close of the Paschal season. The Paschal season consists of the forty days from Pascha (Easter) to the Ascension. We consider this the time our risen Lord spent with his disciples, preparing them for the tasks which lay ahead, after our Lord's return to heaven. We also commemorate several miracles of the Messiah's earthly ministry during this time.

BACKPACK PROGRAM DEEMED A SUCCESS

The recent backpack giveaway sponsored by Valley Vineyard Church netted 1,000 backpacks filled with school supplies for the start of the Fall semester. In addition, more than 20 volunteers helped pack and distribute the backpacks.

MISSION PROGRAMS CONTINUE

Although most of our efforts are focused on local mission projects, every year we participate in the denomination-wide mission programs sponsored by the One Great Hour of Sharing and the Pentecost offering.

This year we donated \$410 for One Great Hour of sharing and \$282.50 for the Pentecost offering.

The next big offering will be the Peace and Global Witness Offering which will wind up the first Sunday of October. We plan to add the \$75 raised at the August Noisy Sunday to the portion from the Peace and Global Witness program that stays in Chippewa Falls. This money will go to the Family Support Center.

PRESBYTERY SETS FALL MEETING

The next stated meeting of the Presbytery of Northern Waters to which we belong will be October 9. As in the recent past, this meeting will be held by Zoom.

It was originally planned that this meeting would take place in person at Clearwater Forest with those who could not attend in person joining on Zoom, however, because of the surge in Covid-19 cases, it was decided that the entire meeting would be held virtually.

The purpose of the meeting will be to elect officers for 2021, hear reports and worship.

PEACE & GLOBAL WITNESS SPECIAL OFFERING...

We will be dedicating the Peace and Global Witness Offering on World Communion Sunday, October 3. This offering is dedicated to programs that support mental health and suicide prevention; programs that work to further "efforts for peace, justice, and reconciliation in places of conflict, injustice and oppression, and other programs to "help people process violence and crisisrelated trauma through creative expression."

TO VACCINATE OR NOT TO VACCINATE

The Rev. Keith Marshall, a Lutheran minister from Washington State asks:

"What does my faith in Jesus Christ exempt me from?"

Many people are claiming religious exemption from getting the Covid vaccine.

Here are some things that belief in Christ exempts us from:

- Putting my wants above the needs of others.
 Philippians 2: 3-4, "Be humble, thinking of others as better than yourself. Don't look out for your own interests, but take an interest in others too."
- Claiming my freedom in Christ as a liberty to act without responsibility. Galatians 5: 13-14, "Don't use your freedom to satisfy your sinful nature. Instead use your freedom to serve one another in love. For the whole law can be summed up in this one commandment: Love your neighbor as yourself."
- You are exempt from refusing to protect the most vulnerable in your midst. Matthew 25: 40, "I tell you the truth, when you did it to one of the least of these my brothers and sisters, you were doing it to me."

Therefore, my "religious exemption" REQUIRES ME to receive the Covid vaccine to safeguard life and to wear a mask to care for others.

Claiming the Christian faith is no justification to refuse these measures.

By invoking the name of Jesus Christ to claim exemption is using the name of the Lord in vain.

You may have political or personal reasons to not get the vaccine, but please stop using your faith in Jesus Christ as justification.
