CONGREGATION ELECTS LEADERS, APPROVES BY-LAW CHANGES, CONFIRMS DISSOLUTION OF PASTOR'S CALL

At the annual congregational meeting held on December 16, new leaders were elected as follows:

Nominated for Elder were Jon Beighley and Larry Annett. They will join Elders Erik Anderson, Lynda Butek, Kevin Litten, and Mitch Mandelert on Session.

Nominated for Deacons were Anne Welke, Barbara Meredith and Chuck Norseng. They join Deacons Corine Boos, Elizabeth Cripe, Margi Kohl, Kathi Mandelert and Mary Jo Reemtsma.

Gwen Bauman was nominated to serve a second term on the Endowment Fund Board of Trustees. She joins Vance Kohl, Chuck Norseng and Gary Reich.

Don Babbitt was nominated to serve on the Financial Review Team along with Kevin Litten and Carmi Simonson.

These new leaders will assume their roles following their installation/ordination early in January.

Changes to the church by-laws involved reducing the number of Session members to between five and seven and the number of Deacons to eight.

These changes seemed appropriate due to the reduced size of our membership.

In addition to the election, the dissolution of the pastor's call was confirmed.

Because of the resignation of Pastor Karel and the necessity to hire a new called pastor, the 2019 budget was not presented at this meeting and will be deferred until the decision concerning our new minister and his terms of call have been made.

WHERE ARE WE GOING AND HOW ARE WE GOING TO GET THERE?

By now you have had time to absorb and reflect on Pastor Karel's resignation and all it means to our church. There is no doubt his resignation means a lot of work for our entire congregation in the months to come but we are ready and able to do that work. The tasks ahead will certainly involve the Session and Deacons but the work will be more than those 14 people can do alone. Rest assured that you will undoubtedly be asked to assist them in keeping our church going.

We have already begun to formulate plans for our future. The Session will be meeting with a member of the Committee on Ministry (COM) on January 7 to make some important decisions about our future. They have to decide if they will follow the recommendation of the Presbytery to hire an interim pastor to handle the day-to-day activities of the church after Karel leaves.

If they do decide to seek an interim pastor, they will have to form an Interim Pastor Nominating Committee to find and hire that person for a specific length of time - probably no more than nine to 12 months.

They will also have to decide on the terms of the interim pastor's call and ultimately what they will recommend to the entire congregation concerning the called-pastor's terms of call. This task is made more difficult because our income for 2019 is unknown. We do know we have received some pledges but in the past, unplanned giving or contributions have exceeded those pledges. While that is wonderful, it doesn't help Session and your finance team determine our income for the coming year. Since the pastor's term of call has to be based, at least in part, on our income, you can see that we are somewhat flying blind.

Early in January, the COM will meet and appoint a moderator for our church who will lead Session meetings. This moderator will not necessarily preach on Sunday but will conduct the monthly Session meetings as required by the Book of Order.

We have already lined up pulpit supply for the Sundays in February after Pastor Karel leaves and for all of March. We will welcome to the pulpit our own Erik Anderson, Rev. Mark Schwinn who is the hospice chaplain at St. Joseph's Hospital and retired Methodist minister Rev. Richard Estrom-Fuller, who has preached from our pulpit in the past.

Still further in the future, with the help of the Presbytery, we will have to form a Pastor Nominating Committee (PNC) to seek a new called-pastor for our congregation. This committee will be nominated by the current Nominating Committee with your help and guidance. The PNC is a committee representative of and elected by the entire congregation. You will hear more about the PNC in coming months.

You will be hearing more from me too in the future because it is important that you know what is going on and have input on our future. If you have any comments or questions, please let me know.
