PFC TO PARTICIPATE IN LOVE CHIPPEWA FREE EVENT

As we have done in the past, we'll be joining area churches in holding a one-day free clinic at which anyone can receive medical care, eye care, dental care, chiropractic care, haircuts, and oil changes. Everything is free of charge on a first-come-first-served basis. A free hot meal will be served and clothing and groceries will be available to take.

This event will be held at the Chippewa Falls Senior High School, as it was last year. It offers us a lot of room to spread out and offer more services. It will be held on September 28 from 9am-noon.

Last year 62 Volunteers served 55 Families (approx 150 people) doing 14 oil changes, 40 haircuts, 23 vision checks, 10 dental checks, 2 health checks, 20 massages, 35 family pictures, and 14 chiropractic adjustments! The need out there is real!

Once again, First Presbyterian Church Community Food Pantry and Valley Vineyard Church will be donating 25 bags of non-perishable food items each. MESSAGE OF THANKS FROM HOPE VILLAGE

We're thrilled to have celebrated our progress with a groundbreaking ceremony for the new affordable and workforce housing development that was held on August 26! Your dedication over the past eight years has brought us to this exciting moment, made possible by our \$2.7 million capital campaign and a \$2.5 million federal grant passed through the State of Wisconsin.

We will start construction of 10 housing units this summer. We're building two duplexes that will provide four one bedroom units, and one six-plex that will provide two, two bedroom units and four three bedroom units. This is the start of our affordable housing.

We will be adding 18 more units once we have raised additional money. All of these units are being built on our village site at 1825 Kennedy Road in Chippewa Falls. All of the units will be offered to low income households and the rents will be kept affordable for them.

Whether you've mentored, fundraised, or worked on any of our volunteer teams, your efforts have significantly impacted our community. We're also proud to announce that the "Green Team," three high school students, secured a grant to install solar panels on our community center, making us more sustainable. Thank you for being an integral part of Hope Village.

<u>Peace and Global Witness Offering—Sowing the Seeds of Peace:</u>
