LATEST MISSION TRIP NEWS

As most of you will have heard by now, our PNW work crew is heading back to Black Mountain, NC to continue working on rebuilding after Hurricane Helene. The storm did a tremendous amount of damage to the area which will take years to recover from.

We'll be staying at Montreat, our Presbyterian College and Retreat Center. Presbytery response has been so good this year that our roster is already full, and we have a waiting list. But you can still help, and I'd encourage you to do so if possible.

We try to hold trip fees to \$200 per person. But the cost for the week is actually more like \$400 per person. Would you or your congregation be willing to contribute to help cover our volunteer's expenses?

In my opinion this is one of best mission projects we do together in the PNW. Even if you can't come with us, you can still make a difference and be part of the effort. CHRISTMAS JOY OFFERING FILLS REAL NEEDS

THE CHIPPEWA FALLS YEARS

Editor's note: Following is the fourth installment of Irene Robertson's letter about the years she and her husband, Rev. Wallace Robertson, spent in Chippewa Falls between 1938 and 1941. Mrs. Robertson's letter goes into detail about life in Chippewa Falls and at the church.

Due to the length of the letter, portions of it will appear in subsequent issues of the Bell.

The young people in the church played a very important and rewarding part of our lives. We started a Senior High group and had great fun with them. We met each week and had many fun outings such as hayrides, baseball games, dances, picnics. I remember when the kids tried to teach me to jitterbug – a popular and strenuous dance. One time we planned an ice-skating party. Wally didn't know how to ice skate so someone brought a kitchen chair to the rink for him to hang on to while they instructed him in the art. It didn't work. He never did learn to ice skate. Meetings were held in the Manse most of the time, and after hayrides the group came back to the Manse for refreshment. We also started a Junior High group and that became my responsibility. I'll never forget taking them on a hayride and bringing them back to the Manse for pea soup and rolls. Stella Crane offered to make a big kettle of pea soup and I made the rolls. We borrowed soup bowls from the church and spread newspapers on the living room floor and prayed there wouldn't be any spills. I had nightmares about cleaning pea soup off the carpet. I needn't have worried. No one spilled and they devoured all the soup and rolls. I can't help wondering if today's Junior High would think that pea soup was a treat.

Somebody donated a Ping Pong (table tennis) table to the church and the kids decided to teach me how to play the game. I was a tennis player so I thought table tennis would be easy. I was wrong, and I was horrified when the kids entered my name in the city Ping Pong tournament. I won the tournament, but my family has never stopped teasing me and reminding me that there weren't many entrants.

Wally gave me a set of golf clubs as a wedding gift. He was a golfer and wanted me to learn the game. I was a tennis player. I tried golf on a while but then gave it up. Wally soon had a group of golfers to join on the available courses – the Elk's Club Course and the Ojibway Course. He had golfing privileges at both. He made a hole in one once, on the Elk's Course. I continued to play tennis and my favorite person to play with was a very nice High School student, Tommy Noble. Very few of the girls were interested in tennis.
