Grading:

'A/4' This work demonstrates mastery of all previous levels as well as going beyond grade level and exhibiting novel ideas or context. This work is truly outstanding. Insights are articulate, accurate, deep and thought provoking.

The 'A' student thinks critically and generates superior inferences. Essays demonstrate sophisticated style, near-perfect grammar, and strong development. Needless to say, 'A' work is thoroughly complete.

'B/3' This work meets grade level standards and the critical concept being taught. All work is complete.

'C/2' This work demonstrates many of the level B/3 concepts but doesn't quite make it. Work is approaching grade level. This work is complete, but most ideas are obvious or barely insightful. Critical thinking is minimal. Essays attempt to prove those ideas that most readers already understand, and present ideas in a simplistic manner.

'F/1' This work does not demonstrate mastery of a critical concept. This work is incomplete or exceptionally awful.
