It takes eight ounces of honey to create one ounce of beeswax. Drawn comb is better for bees than foundation because it's ready for them to use immediately and they use it for every key function in the hive. Saving comb for your bees to use saves them a considerable amount of labor.

Ten Minutes with the Bees

The Bee Yard in October

At our September meeting we had Dave Noble as our guest speaker. It was fun to see 58 members attend the meeting, and they were rewarded with an excellent talk. I don't normally devote one of these articles to such events, but this one was special. Besides, everyone is checking their food supplies and planning their final Varroa treatments... right?

Dave made a good impression from the start by discussing different approaches to issues that we as beekeepers must deal with. Should I feed? *What* should I feed? Should I treat for Mites? What should I use for the treatment?



He explained the need to feed if light on food. He also discussed the need to wrap (or otherwise protect) hives against the wind. Dave stressed that windchill kills bees much faster than the actual temperature.

He then went on to explain some of the risks associated with various treatments for varroa. We were all fairly well aware of those risks. Using Oxalic Acid does not kill Varroa in the capped cells. Formic Pro has a higher risk of killing a few queens, especially when using the two-strip approach.

He then explained the "real" risks regarding whether to treat for mites. Nor did Dave ever suggest that his way should be your way. He just explained the options and why you should consider one or more of them.

But the real value of his talk followed these discussions. Dave talked about our uncanny ability to procrastinate, often doing nothing. That led him to the heart of his talk.

WINTER PREPARATION CHECKLIST 



Varroa MITES

Reduce mite loads BEFORE winter
Nearly broodless → mites feed on adult bees
Mite feeding → winter bees die prematurely
→ Colony death

Manage & Treat for mites

If we do not treat for mites for fear of killing the queen, she'll probably already be dead – we just won't know it until March when we discover the entire hive is dead. It was a very telling point in his presentation, as we have all been there.

Finally, Dave stressed the point that what you do as a beekeeper for your bees is up to you. It is your choice. And whatever you decide to do,


