In February 2021, I was among folks honored to be among the "African American Leaders and Trailblazers" of Waterbury, Connecticut. I was the founding Chair of the Greater Waterbury Connecticut chapter of NCPBW (former name) in 1988.

The quote from the published book summarizes my accomplishments as follows:

"Waterbury native and Vietnam War veteran, Dr. Jacquelyn D. (Works) Jordan is a nationally respected Nurse educator and Dean who helped to transform lives while serving a wide range of civic associations throughout Connecticut and the nation. Possessing a

Nursing PhD, from Adelphi University and a Masters in Neuroscience from Yale University, Dr. Jordan served in Nursing Dean's positions at Howard University and Towson University. The famed nursing professional also served a 6-year tenure as the National Congress of Black Women's "Obama Care" representative with the White House and she was recently elected as 1st Vice Chair of the NCBW Board of Directors. Dr. Jordan directed Westfield State University's First Nursing Program in Westfield, Massachusetts. She also completed her undergraduate degrees at Mattatuck Community College and Western Connecticut State University and returned to teach nursing at the college and university.

Metro-Jackson Chapter



Making Banks and Lending Institutions Accountable to Black and Latino Communities



Glorious Johnson, Chair of the NCBW Jacksonville Chapter and the members of the organization are working with, Mr. Al Pina, Co-Founder/CEO of the Florida Minority Community Reinvestment Co-Operative, and Co-Founder of the National Minority Community Reinvestment Co-Operative. The mission of the organization is: "to empower low-income and minority communities by attracting investments for health, education, home ownership, employment, and minority entrepreneurship using a holistic advocacy approach." In

December 2020, the organization held a very successful Black and Latino Summit in which the summit provided an opportunity for banking institutions and the communities they serve to discuss access to capital, affordable housing, neighborhood development, and community reinvestment for these underserved populations."

There were workshops to inform, educate, and encourage mutually beneficial partnerships among the presenters, participants, and sponsors to stimulate economic growth in the Black and Latino communities." https://blackandlatino.org/ "As a result of the Black & Latino Economic Summit, Black & Latino community leaders in Detroit, Baltimore, Kansas City, Jacksonville, FL., and Southern California are now launching their local Black & Latino Community CRA Leadership Councils that will create city/local CRA agreements with major banks in their respective cities."



The members of the NCBW Jacksonville Chapter have been selected by Mr. Pina to serve the Jacksonville, Florida community as the Jacksonville Black and Latino Community CRA Leadership Council. As stated by Mr. Pina, "the leadership council will be meeting with community organizations, grassroots community organizers, and the leaders of banking institutions to work together towards access to Capital for Black & Latino small businesses, increased Black & Latino home ownership, and access to capital for Black & Latino FOCUSED organizations developing affordable housing."

Gulf Coast Chapter Helping the Homeless

The Gulf Coast Chapter partners with If My People Homeless Outreach to provide food, clothing and personal hygiene items to the unsheltered homeless in Jackson County, MS (Moss Point, Pascagoula, Gautier, and Ocean Springs). We started serving January 17, 2021 on Dr. MLK Day of Service.

We feed, on average, five days a week serving 27-37 unsheltered homeless men, women, and children. We also provide clothing, sleeping bags, blankets, tents, and personal hygiene items on an as needed basis.

Mr. Adrian McCullum is the Founding Director of If My People and a brother to our NCBW Chapter. Ms. Alma Waller, Vice Chairwoman of MS Gulf Coast Chapter, coordinates the Chapter's food and clothing pantry along with other Chapter members - Carolyn Thompson and Mardria McClemore.
