Membership for the Branch County Fair

BY-LAWS BRANCH COUNTY FAIR

Organized under Act No. 80 of PA of 1855
Revised October 18, 2023

Article I- Membership

Section 1. Any person attaining the age of 18 years may become a member of the Branch County Fair. Only members who have been enrolled at least 30 days prior to the annual meeting shall be entitled to vote. Each member/business member shall be entitled to one vote on each question submitted at any meeting. A person may belong to the Association at one of the following levels:

- a. Individual– \$10.00 – per year (suggest paying three years at a time)
- b. Lifetime– \$ 75.00 – *Previous gold and silver members are grandfathered in. Gold Members are grandfathered and will receive parking passes.*
- c. Business Member Lifetime– \$ 150.00 (Membership suitable for framing, 4 free parking stickers annually.)

Section 2. Honorary membership- These are awarded to individuals and or businesses for exemplary donations of time/labor/money improving Branch County Fair and its service to youth. Recognition may include weekly fair passes and admission. They have all voting rights of a regular member.

Section 3. Meetings of Members- The annual meeting of the Fair shall be held at such place as may be designated by the Board of Directors and stated in the notice of meeting or at such time and place as may be designated by the President and state in the notice of meeting. One of the purposes of such annual meetings shall be the election of a Board of Directors. Notice of all meetings of members shall be given by written notice to each member not less than 10, nor more than 60, days prior to such meeting and shall contain the time, place and purpose of the meeting.

Section 4. Special Meetings- Special meetings of the members may be called at any time by the President and shall be called whenever one-tenth of the members shall request so in writing.

Section 5. Quorum- A quorum for the transaction of business at the annual membership meeting shall consist of not less than 25 voting members.

Article II- Board of Directors

Section 1. The board of directors shall consist of 12 persons elected from the membership. Each year four directors shall be elected to serve a term of three years. Each director so elected shall hold office until his successor shall have been elected. A nominating committee shall be appointed by the Board of Directors to present a list for consideration at the annual meeting.

Section 2. Organizational Meeting- The first meeting of each newly elected board of directors shall be held at the place holding the annual meeting of members, and immediately following the same, for the purpose of electing officers and transacting any other

business properly brought before it, provided that the organization meeting in any year may be held at a different time and place than the herein provided by a consent of a majority of the directors of such new board.

Section 3. Special Meeting of Board—Any special meeting of the Board of Directors may be called by the President, or by the majority of the persons then by comprising the Board of Directors, at any time by means of notice of the time and place thereof to each Director, given not less than twenty-four (24) hours before the time such special meeting is to be held.

Section 4. Duties of the Board—The Board of Directors shall conduct the business affairs of the association between meetings of the members. It shall cause to be kept accurate records of all transactions and in general perform such services as are usual in similar organizations. It shall have the power to delegate to a special committee composed of members such power and authority as it may deem advisable, provided that this delegation of the authority of the Board to any committee shall be by resolution and such committee shall report its action at the next meeting of the Board. A majority of the Board shall constitute a quorum. If a direction is absent for three consecutive meetings without reasonable excuse, the directors may declare a vacancy on the Board. In case of any vacancy on the Board, the nominating committee selects a current fair member to fill the vacancy completing the fiscal year, the final approval by the board of directors. The traditional voting procedure then occurs at the following annual meeting to complete the vacant term.

Article III-Officers

Section 1. The officers of the fair shall be a President and Vice President elected annually by the board of directors, and from the board of directors. The office of secretary, treasurer and manager are held as employees of the Branch County Fair, hired, reviewed annually and hold a current membership of the fair.

Section 2. Committees are reviewed and formed annually by the President, Vice President and Manager, to address specific needs of fair business.

Article IV- Amendments

Section 1. These by-laws may be amended by a vote of two- thirds of the members present at any annual or special meetings at which a quorum is present. Notice of the intended alteration of amendment shall be given at least 10, but no more than 60, days prior to the annual or special meeting, and it shall be the duty of the secretary, in giving notice of the annual meeting, to specify the alterations or amendments to be brought before it.

JUDGES

The Judges are requested to report at the Fair Office one-half hour before judging starts on the day they are to judge, unless otherwise informed. Expert Judges will be secured in every instance possible. Judges' placing is final.

ENTERTAINMENT

An effort is being made by officials of the Fair to provide clean, wholesome entertainment for the visitors. As much of this as possible will be made free to those attending. However, because of the fact that good entertainment is expensive, the evening shows will be staged inside an enclosure and a charge made. There will be an ample number of seats and every consideration given to the audience for their comfort and ability to see and hear the performance advantageously.

CAMPER AND TRAILER PARKING

TRAILERS MAY COME IN AT 8 AM THE FRIDAY BEFORE FAIR; EXCEPT FOR FAIR BOARD, LIVESTOCK AND CAMPING SUPERINTENDENTS WHO MAY PLACE TRAILERS THE THURSDAY BEFORE FAIR

Camper Draw Down Procedure:

Deposit of \$60.00 cash or check must be submitted with name on an envelope (provided by committee) Checks made payable to the Branch County Fair. The deposit will be kept if campsites are available, and you decline open campsites.

Camping sites will be reserved on a lottery type system on Wednesday, July 15th, 2026. Sign up begins at 6:30 pm with only one name per campsite, the drawing for campsites begins at 7:00 pm. The first campsite will be given to the last eligible drawn name from the previous year. The first drawn name will get 2nd pick of available campsites and so on until all names are drawn or until all spots are taken, whichever comes first. Payment for the spot is due at this time. Branch County Fair accepts Cash, Check or Credit Card with a 3% fee. No changing of campsites unless approved by the fair board prior to fair week.

Camping spots will be issued first to youth families exhibiting in the large animal divisions. If there are vacant spots after the camper draw down, small animal exhibitors including branch buds may register on a first come, first serve basis beginning at 9:00 am Thursday following camper draw down, at the fair office. Party must be present to register. Monday following camper draw down; organizational leaders whose club is exhibiting animals at the Branch County Fair, may register for vacant campsites. Registrations will be on a first come, first serve basis. Party must be present to register, beginning at 9:00 am. No more than one campsite will be sold to a person. All camping sites must be reserved in advance by the Monday prior to opening day of the Fair

FOR CAMPING FEES REFER TO THE FAMILY NEWSLETTER

- Each campsite will include two weekly camper parking passes and two weekly admission tickets
- All trailers must be self contained, gopher holes will not be allowed
- “Tote-Tanks” may be used for transporting only
- Campers are allowed to run air conditioning fair week on the fairs power supply in all campsites
- All trailers- three wire (prong) electrical cords are required according to electrical code.
- Vacuum Breaker preventers are required for each camper with water hook-up.
- There will be curfew enforced from 11:00 pm- 6:00 am, this means no campsite will have any disturbance or excessive noise during curfew hours.
- Campsites must be chaperoned by parent or guardian or person 21 years or over, appointed by guardian.
- All trailers must be parked with the tongue out. This is required in case there is a fire.
- ONLY 2 vehicles per campsite with proper camping permits, Both vehicles MUST FIT IN ALLOTTED CAMPSITE. No visitors parking in campgrounds. Breaking of any rules will result in being asked to remove your camper from the grounds. No refund.
- These rules may be changed without notice to conform with the state regulations.
- Generators may be used during 6:00 am to 11:00 pm only. Fumes and noise must not bother your neighbors
- PETS on campgrounds must be confined to trailers or a 6 ft leash; they are not allowed on the rest of the fair grounds except for guide dogs.
- Campers may be removed on the last Saturday of fair if removed between 4:00 pm-5:00 pm, otherwise you must wait until Sunday after 10:00 am; the dump station will not be available for campers until after 10:00 am on the Sunday after fair.
- Note: “Flushable Wipes” are not permitted
- NO OPEN FLAME FIRE PITS

4-H FAIR KING AND QUEEN CONTEST

Workshop for the King and Queen will be held May 5, 2026 @ 6:30 pm at the Fair Office

To be eligible, one must be between the ages of 16 and 19 (4-H age) and must have exhibited at the Branch County Fair for a minimum of one year prior to entering the contest. The contest is held prior to the opening day of Fair, with the crowning of King and Queen as part of the program on opening day.

This is an honor to the young lady and young man who are selected to represent all the young men and young ladies in Branch County. During the week of the fair, they will be in the Branch County Fair Parade, the crowning ceremony and many other events held during the fair and throughout the year you are King and Queen. Applications can be requested via phone or email, from the fair office on the fairgrounds, and be submitted by 11:59 pm on the second Monday in June to the fair office. The top young men and young ladies, based on application scores, will be notified and continue on to the interview portion of the contest. The interviews will be held the fourth Monday in July at 6:00 pm at the fair office. Contestants must be present the night of the interviews. Equal emphasis will be placed on the application form and the interview. Once scores are tabulated the evening of the interviews, the top three young men and young ladies will be announced. During the fair week opening ceremony, the King and Queen will be announced and will each receive a \$500 scholarship. The remaining court members will each receive a \$250 scholarship. The money will be awarded that evening and is to be used for future endeavors (career training/equipment, post high school education, etc) A plaque with the names of the King and Queen and their sponsoring organizations will be on display in the fair office. One can serve as the King and Queen one time.

SENIOR CITIZEN PROGRAM

The Senior Citizen program will be held on the Thursday of fair week, at the Dearth Community Center. Senior Citizens (60 years and over) will receive free admission and will pay parking. Only senior citizens will be eligible for prizes.

HONEYWELL MUSEUM BARN OF EARLY FARM AND HOMEMAKING TOOLS

- Items will be limited to Antique Agricultures and Homemaking objects.
- Acceptance of historic objects will be at the discretion of the fair management/superintendents and duplication is to be avoided
- Hours to be open to the public will be determined by the fair management/superintendents with the intent it will be open the same hours as the exhibit buildings during the fair. Other openings as needed (school children, educational groups, etc) to be scheduled through the fair office.
- During all open hours, the superintendents or their appointed assistants will present at all times. This person should have some ability to answer questions and have available to them information about the building and the items of display.
- Superintendents will maintain a complete record of items donated or items that are on loan to the museum. Identification cards will be placed on all items to best identify them.
- Donated items become the property of the Branch County Fair for the Honeywell Museum Barn and may not be removed from the buildings for any reason.
- On loan items may be released to the owner/designated specified person with the assistance of a superintendent at any time, according to written agreement, and may not be removed from the building for any other reason.
- Fair management/superintendents will be responsible for neat appearance. New ways to place displays will be explored to create an attractive and interesting display.

YOUTH RULES AND REGULATIONS

Exhibitors should examine the following in order to thoroughly understand the manner in which the fair is conducted and to prevent mistakes which otherwise occur.

Take no heed of rumors in regard to the business of the Fair. Read the rules and if in doubt as to what to do, inquire of those whose business it is to tell you, your 4-H leader or section superintendent. Suitable police will be kept on duty at night to protect the animals and property which may remain on the grounds, but the fair will not be responsible for any loss or damage which occurs to persons or property.

All youth exhibitors can range from age 8 to 19 years fair age. Fair age is determined as of January 1st of the current year. Example: An exhibitor who is 12 years old as of January 1 of the current year is considered to be 12 years of age the entire year (even after he or she passes a 13th birthday). A boy or girl shall be eligible to participate in the fair on January 1st after they turn 5 years old.

YOUTH ENTRIES

Youth exhibitors who exhibit in a given project in your classes at another county fair during the current project year will not be eligible in the same project area at the Branch County Fair.

All youth entries MUST be submitted via fairent.com website between June 1-30 (see additional entry instructions provided by the fair office). No late entries will be accepted. No changing of classes after the 2nd Friday in July will be accepted.

Entry tags must be attached to all entries for non-livestock classes. Non-livestock projects may be shown in two classes. Two entries per class will be allowed in Non-Livestock and Home Economics classes unless otherwise stated in the respective divisions and classes. Dropping projects is NOT encouraged.

THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS RESERVES THE RIGHT TO PROCESS PREMIUM PAYMENTS ON A YEAR - TO - YEAR BASIS. Premiums will be governed strictly by the records on the judges sheets. Premium checks will be made payable to exhibitors

and will be given to the club leader after the fair (Note: Checks have to be cashed within 90 days of the date of the check. No reissuing of checks will be allowed)

Exhibitor admission/grandstand passes are issued to ONLY those youth who have exhibits at the fair.

Check in for the small animal barn (all poultry, rabbits and cavy) will check into the fair on the Friday before the start of the fair from 4:00-9:00 pm. These species will NOT have a Saturday check in time. Exhibitors will report with their animals to the small animal barn. This includes Branch Bud and Barnyard Children poultry, rabbit and cavy projects. Large Animal Livestock must be brought in on Saturday (opening day of fair) between 8:00 am and 2:00 pm.

Branch Bud non-livestock (static projects) are to be brought in on the Friday before the start of the fair from 6:00-8:00 pm (judging will take place then). All 4-H Youth non-livestock (static projects) are to be brought in between 9:00 am-2:00 pm on the first Saturday of Fair; buildings are closed for lunch from 11:30-12:30.

Exhibits must remain in the places assigned by the department superintendents until released. (Check Schedule of Events for release times.) All exhibits must be out by 9:00 am on the Sunday after the fair or forfeit their right to premiums at the discretion of the fair board. Each section of the fair will have a superintendent in charge who will have the exclusive management of the same. Such superintendents will be in charge of the entries in their sections, the overseeing of the judges and will make a full report on all entries and awards to the fair office by the end of judging day.

Certain departments are reserved for youth. The judging of youth exhibits will be in accordance with the grouping systems. "Participant" ribbons will be awarded to those exhibiting, but not meeting the requirements and no cash award will be given. Placing ribbons will be awarded for 1st through 10th placing in all livestock classes, except where otherwise noted. Ribbons will be awarded in ALL classes throughout the book, unless otherwise stated. Grand Champion and Reserve Grand Champion, Best of Show and Honorable Mention will receive rosettes, unless otherwise stated.

Any exhibit can be disqualified by the judge if the exhibit is unworthy.

Best of Show and Honorable Mention ribbons will be awarded in each section in the non-- livestock departments at the discretion of the judge. If none of the exhibits in a section warrants a Best of Show or Honorable Mention ribbon(s), based on the judges recommendations, none will be awarded.

All winning titles will be awarded at the time of showing. Market champion banners will be presented at the time of show and must be displayed.

SPECIAL RULES FOR YOUTH EXHIBITORS

As parents, we must let our children grow and experience the ability and joy of working and completing their projects on their own. We have to remember that it is their project. It is our job to guide our children to do their best, but not to do the project for them, let's make it fair for all exhibitors and our children have pride in their work.

1. 4-H and FFA members must be enrolled in a 4-H club or an FFA chapter in Branch County.
2. An individual must be enrolled in a 4-H club by April 15th in order to exhibit, as a 4-H youth at the Fair.
3. Independent exhibitors must follow the same deadline schedule as all other exhibitors.

All projects must meet a "G rating" which means the project is "good for all audiences," having no violence, offensive language, or sexual content. Containing nothing that would be offensive to parents whose younger children view the project. Branch county Fair has the right to refuse any project that does not meet these guidelines.

GENERAL LIVESTOCK

- In order to be eligible to show at the fair MARKET animals market beef, starter calves, sheep, and goat ownership will be by the last tag date and time.
- Dairy, breeding stock, and swine (self tagging) must be purchased, tagged or be in the care of the person showing the exhibit by April 26, 2026.
- In order to be eligible to show at the fair HORSES must be present at one of the two mandatory Horse Pre-Checks. If a horse is obtained and you provide proof of purchase between April 27-May 1, the exhibitor must contact the fair office to set up a pre-check visit.
- Livestock can only weigh 2 times. If the animal makes weight the first time through, that is the final weight. If the animal does not make weight the first time, it can be reweighed between 5:00 pm & 6:00 pm the same day.

A family sharing the same facilities may tag in together on the same tag in sheet, *declaring individual ownership at fair week*. Extended families sharing the same facility may tag in together on the same tag in sheet, *declaring individual ownership at fair week* (The definition of an extended family for Branch County Fair is a sibling, step- sibling and cousins) BACC FFA members with animals housed on school grounds fall under this definition. Exhibitors housing their animals in the same facility but do not fall within the extended family definition must declare individual ownership on their own tag in sheet.

Livestock owners must complete the livestock owner certificate via the google doc on the cover page of fair entry. Branch County Jr Livestock health workshop will satisfy the health requirements for Branch County Fair husbandry credit. This certificate must be uploaded in FairEntry prior to the June 30th deadline.

YQCA Online Training: If the exhibitor did not attend the Junior Livestock health workshop, YQCA training is required to fill the husbandry credit. The website for YQCA online training is www.yqcaprogram.org. The cost is \$12 per individual. All livestock exhibitors must download and print a valid digital copy of your certificate and attach it with your fair entry online prior to the deadline.

EQUINE Exhibitors (if equine is your only exhibit) you must do one of the following options: attend the Junior Livestock health workshop, take two horse credits on <https://www.myhorseuniversity.com/freecourses> or attend the 1 hr equine seminar taking place in April @ Branch County Fair office.

Rate of Gain is optional, BCF tagging or body pre-check is required for all species. Self tagging is required for swine.

Market Beef: MANDATORY BCF tagging

March 7th, 2026: 8am-Noon

March 14th, 2026:8am-10 am

Horses: MANDATORY BCF Body Condition Pre-Check

April 18, 2026: 8am-Noon

April 25, 2026: 8am-10 am

If horse is obtained after April 25th but before May 1st (proof of purchase required) contact the Branch County Fair office to schedule BCF body condition pre-check

Starter Calves: MANDATORY BCF tagging. Exhibitors must pay \$10 at Spring tag in, to cover mandated nasal vaccine at fair (no refunds)

April 18, 2026: 8am-Noon

April 25, 2026: 8am-10 am

Animals must be halter broken and have clean RFID tags in their ears. Current animal weight can be provided for the exhibitor.

Sheep & Goats: MANDATORY BCF tagging. Each animal must have a scrape tag attached to the ear when attaching the BCF tag to the other.

April 18, 2026: 8am-Noon

April 25, 2026: 8am-10 am

Swine: Assigned leader must complete market hog paperwork. Weigh animals only if requested. Each animal must have a federal ID (840 tag) attached to the ear when attaching the BCF tag to the other. Both sets of tag numbers must be submitted on paperwork.

April 18th-April 26th, 2026

Exhibitors may tag in twice the number of market animals in that species that they can show, except for swine. Example: beef can show two market steers at the fair, therefore they can weigh in four. Maximum animals allowed to be tagged per exhibitor; Sheep (4), Beef (4), Starter Calves (4), Goats (4), Swine (6).

Any animal housed at fair must be entered and exhibited in at least one market and or breeding class. No freeways allowed in market livestock if minimum weight is made. See each species for guidelines. For any market animal not making the minimum weight requirements must go home by 9 PM on entry day.

Once livestock is weighed and checked in, they are considered an exhibit entered into the fair. Said animals must remain on the fairgrounds until release date and time unless authorized for an early release by a veterinarian and/or the livestock general superintendents.

All livestock exhibitors must complete a market livestock owner certificate to be eligible to show and sell animals. Breeding ownership and non-market (not for sale) lease certificates must also be turned in by any exhibitor showing an animal and are for animals that are not bona fide property of the exhibitor. These certificates must be submitted with fair entries on fairent.com cover page prior to entry deadline.

- No bolts, screws, etc. may be used on trusses and rafters of livestock Barnes for any reason. Wires, chains and zip ties are permitted.
- Volume of amplifying systems and music played must be controlled to prevent disturbance to exhibits, exhibitors, and spectators.
- All green market or white breeding stock pen cards, supplied by the Fair office, must be displayed by opening Saturday at 9 PM and remain up until post fair Sunday.
- ID tags, scrapie tag, federal ID(840) tags are required.
- Rate of gain is optional to determine the days on feed. Find the following schedule at www.branchcountyfair.com.
- Livestock trailer parking will be controlled; all trailers, horse, tack, utility, gravity, wagons, etc. may be parked in designated area at the west end of the fairgrounds after the first Saturday morning of fair. Any trailer parked elsewhere will be removed at the owner's expense.
- When using the practice ring, the exhibitor or parent must be in the ring with the animal at all times in a halter or necktie, must be present and held in hand.
- All livestock should be fed, watered, and in clean bedding daily by 9 AM. Acceptable bedding material is straw, sawdust, wood chips, and wood shavings.
- It is the exhibitors responsibility to check their animals periodically throughout the day to ensure animal welfare and public perception as positive. Failure to attend to animal needs may result in removal of animals from the fairgrounds. All exhibitors must ensure their exhibit area is suitable for public viewing in the early evening (animals to be fed, cleaned, and watered)

ALL EAR TAGS MUST REMAIN IN THE ANIMALS EAR. IF REMOVED, A \$200 FEE PER ANIMAL WILL BE REMOVED FROM EXHIBITORS JUNIOR LIVESTOCK CHECK

Livestock club display and project area set up cannot begin until after 3:00 PM on the Thursday prior to the fair.

Livestock Release- livestock release times at the end of fair week, take home families with multiple species will follow release schedule- TRAILERS ARE NOT PERMITTED INSIDE THE EXHIBITOR GATE UNTIL DESIGNATED SPECIE LOAD OUT TIME.

- Saturday, 1-3 PM, Tack Removal (no trailers) Only decorations, tack box & fans. **DO NOT REMOVE GATES or PEN TAGS**
- Saturday, 4-4:30 PM: All Dairy Barn Exhibits, Beef Breeding, Beef Feeder & Any take home market beef
- Saturday, 4:30-5:30 PM: TAKE HOME & BREEDING Small Animal Barn, Swine & Starter Calves (that were pulled from the auction)
- Saturday, 5:30-7:00 PM: All Other Take Home, ALL Barnyard Children & Mini Ponies and Horses (all), Goats, Sheep, Starter Calves purchased through the auction

Any animals, decorations, gate or stall tear down left will be released Sunday morning after Fair at the discretion of the superintendent and must be done by 9 AM.

Exhibitors can show and sell three units of market animals.

- One unit of sheep (two lambs or one lamb)
- One unit of goat (two goats or one goat)
- One unit of swine (two swine or one swine)
- One unit of duck (one duck)
- One unit of chicken (two chickens)
- One unit of goose (one goose)
- One unit of turkey (one turkey)
- One unit of rabbit (single rabbit) or (pen of three rabbit)
- One unit of starter calf (two starter calves or one starter calf)
- One unit of market beef (one market steer or one dairy beef steer) maximum of two head

Exhibitors may only sell one unit per species as listed above with the exception of market beef, market rabbits, market chickens, and market geese, which may sell two units.

- You must be an exhibitor and show your own animal in any showmanship contest.
- No parents or leaders are allowed in the show ring while exhibitors are showing, this includes those who are serving a duty.
- No printed clothing may be worn in the show ring. Proper footwear should be worn while in the show ring.
- Grade and registered animals will show together, except some horses will show separately. Animals not registered must conform to breed characteristics.
- Exhibiting stock will be limited to two breeds in any one division, a total of six animals, and can show a maximum of two animals per class.
- State department of agriculture, division of animal industry rules, pertaining to disease among livestock found elsewhere in the book or on website apply to all classes. Any animal considered infected with parasites or contagious diseases (ringworm, erysipelas, warts, etc) can be denied entry or dismissed to return home
- In livestock classes, all feed must be provided by the exhibitor
- All lactating dairy cattle and market sale livestock must be withdrawn from medicated feed in accordance with feed manufacturer specifications
- Animals, occupying stalls or pens, must be shown in competition in respective classes when called for by the superintendent and stall space not used appropriately will be addressed by the livestock committee
- All youth members exhibiting livestock who fail to keep animals and stalls in a neat condition and all times to the satisfaction of the superintendent, or who show evidence of cruelty to their animals will be asked to remove the animals from the fair and premiums will be forfeited.

Upon completion of all livestock shows the grand champion and reserve grand champion need to be relocated to their specified champion pens within two hours. Banner and pen cards also need to be in place at that time.

All grand champion, reserve grand champion, third, fourth and fifth overall banners will be furnished by the fair. All breeding and market pen cards will be furnished by the fair.

The dates for determining the age of livestock may be found under their respective divisions. All breeding cattle, four months of age and older shall have been officially calf hood vaccinated (refer to MDA rules)

All animals must be dehorned, except certain classes of breeding stock including goats, sheep and dairy breeding stock under one year old, no regrown horns or scurs over 1 inch for sheep, goats, starter calves, and over 3 inch long for beef, dairy beef, dairy, and no points allowed.

The Branch County Fair board or livestock superintendent can reject any livestock that cannot be handled or tied when feasible. Exhibitors must show and sell their own animals, except in the case of illness or extenuating circumstances when a designated exhibitor may show the animal with permission from the livestock superintendent. Any individual that is not directly involved with the branch county youth program is prohibited from helping to groom or otherwise prepare the youth livestock project during fair week. Any violation or infraction of this rule may cause you to be subject to disqualification.

SWEEPSTAKES INFORMATION

The representative selected from the "show off" must decide within 15 minutes after the conclusion of the show, whether to participate or not in the senior showmanship sweepstakes. The representative must report their decision to the superintendent. A senior showmanship sweepstakes contest (large and small animals) will be held Friday evening at 5:30 PM in the horse arena and then 6:00 PM in the show shelter. To be eligible to enter the senior sweepstakes, the contestant must be a winner in one of the following large animal, senior showmanship contests: pony, dairy, beef, sheep, and swine. To be eligible to enter the senior

sweepstakes, small animal contest the contestants must be winners in miniature horse, rabbits, poultry, cavies, dairy starter calves and goats. Once you have won the showmanship sweepstakes you are not eligible to compete in that category either large or small animal. You are eligible to compete in any specific showmanship, but you must drop out of the sweepstakes show off within 15 minutes of the conclusion of the show. The next eligible person in that class advances to the show off. Awards will be given to the winner of each contest as well as their showmanship team.

LIVESTOCK ETHICS POLICY

1. Exhibitors are responsible for the complete care of their animals.
2. Keeping the exhibit space assignments is the responsibility of the exhibitor, if there is a problem, the exhibitor will be contacted.
3. Unethical and inappropriate otherwise inhumane treatment of animals for preparation is not acceptable. The exhibit will be disqualified if a violation is determined.
4. Violation of the following rules will automatically result qualification:
 - The use of any drug or chemical compound that is not approved by the food and drug administration for use in meat animals is prohibited. The illegal administration of approved drugs in compounds is also prohibited. All animals entered in the youth department are subject to blood, urine, and tissue test by the livestock committee or designee, FDA and USDA for illegal substances and substances that exceed the acceptable levels established by the United States Department of Agriculture, the Food and Drug Administration, the Food Animal Residue Avoidance Databank and Environmental Protection Agency. Fairboard reserves the right to drug test any animal at any time. A positive test will result in disqualification. The exhibitor shall assume full responsibility for any violation of regulations related to drugs and medication to include withdrawal times and the condemnation of the carcasses due to drug rules/regulations violation. This includes forfeiture of all premiums, trophies, and sale value of the animal.
 - Any attempt to change the natural color of an animal, above the knee/hock area, by changing the color of hair, Felice or skin at any point, spot or areas of the animal's body. False switches are permitted.
 - Misinterpreting the age of an animal for the class in which it is shown
 - Minimizing the effect of cramping by feeding or injecting drugs, depressants or applying packs or using any artificial contrivance
 - Striking the animal to cause/create swelling in a depressed area
 - Insertion of foreign material under the skin
 - The use of alcoholic beverages in the feed or administered as a drench
 - Criticizing or interfering with the judge, exhibitors, sale committees, superintendents, and other show officials or other conduct detrimental to the exhibition or show.
5. Ownership and possession of animal exhibits: it is the responsibility of the youth exhibitor and family to follow all prescribed and accepted. Livestock exhibiting practices as it pertains to when ownership of animals is to occur. Possession means the animal (s) are the exhibitors name written proof of ownership by either one of the following: bill of sale, lease agreement, purchase agreement, family owned/raised statement or animal registration papers with exhibitor name and appropriate date acquired. Is required to provide a majority of the care to the animal project.

NEW IN 2025 BRANCH COUNTY FAIR ANIMAL REPLACEMENT POLICY

Policy Recommendation:

Exhibitors may replace an animal that dies within specific timeframes based on the type of animal. For larger animals—sheep, goats, swine, dairy starter calves, and beef/dairy beef steers—if an animal dies within **30 days of the April tag/weigh-in**, the exhibitor can replace it with a tagged extra animal. For small animals (rabbits), if a tattooed rabbit dies **within one week of the tattoo date** (the second Wednesday in July), the exhibitor may tattoo a replacement during that same week. No replacements are allowed after these specified periods.

Policy Outline:

Step 1: Tagging and Weigh-In Registration for Larger Animals

- **Timeline:** Last two weeks of April.
- **Action:** Exhibitors tag and weigh in their larger animals (sheep, goats, swine, dairy starter calves, beef/dairy beef steers), with a recommendation to tag extra animals for contingencies.

Step 2: 30-Day Replacement Period for Larger Animals

- **Timeline:** Ends approximately May 31 (30 days post-tagging).
- **Action:**
 - If an animal dies during this period, the exhibitor may replace it with an extra tagged animal from another exhibitor.
 - Replacement animals must meet health and eligibility standards, and the replacement must be documented by the chair of the fair board livestock committee.

Step 3: Tattooing for Small Animals (Rabbits)

- **Timeline:** Third Wednesday of July.
- **Action:** All market rabbits must be tattooed for fair registration, and exhibitors are encouraged to tattoo extra rabbits to allow for potential replacements.

Step 4: One-Week Replacement Period for Market Rabbits

- **Timeline:** Ends one week after the Third Wednesday in July.
- **Action:**
 - If a tattooed rabbit dies within this one-week period, the exhibitor may tattoo a replacement rabbit.
 - No replacements are permitted after this one-week period.

Step 5: Post 30-Day Period for Larger Animals & Post Tattoo Window for Market Rabbits

- **Timeline:** After May 31 for larger animals; after one week post-tattoo for rabbits.
- **Action:**
 - No replacements are allowed if an animal dies after these time frames.

Step 6: Communication and Documentation

- **Timeline:** Initial communication before tagging/weigh-in in April, with ongoing reminders as necessary.
- **Action:**
 - The chair of the fair board livestock committee will include this policy in all exhibitor guidelines and registration materials.
 - Any replacement requests must be documented and approved by the chair to ensure compliance and transparency.

LIVESTOCK RULE VIOLATION PROCEDURES

1. All complaint forms must be received at the Fair office within four hours of the complaint. The complaint form must be filled out entirely with proper signatures and returned with a \$100 deposit for market animal ethics policy.
2. Within 12 hours from the time of the complaint being filed, a meeting of the rules and violation committee, and the parties involved will meet. A 15 minute explanation by the plaintiff will be followed by a 15 minute explanation by the defendant. Then each party will be given a five minute rebuttal starting with a plaintiff. Well, the other party will remain silent.
3. Upon completion of the testimony, will be subject to questioning by the rules and violation committee
4. Both parties will be dismissed for deliberation on potential rule violation by the committee
5. A decision will be rendered within 24 hours of meeting time
6. A written decision will be given to both plaintiff and defendant, signed by committee members
7. The rules violation committee will consist of the general livestock committee plus 4 past or currently involved adults from the agricultural field with one alternate for conflicting interest. Five committee members must be present to achieve a quorum.

8. Complaint policy: all complaints regarding conflict of interest of the judge, disqualification of an exhibit or exhibitor, exhibitor, group leader, department chair, or superintendence behavior, and eligibility of any exhibit; which are not resolved by the chairperson or Fair board member in charge, a written complaint within ten (10) days from the end of the fair. The Fair board of directors rules and violation committee will review complaints and offer a written response within 10 days of receiving the complaint. Any exhibitor may appeal the decision to the Department of Agriculture within 45 days of filing the initial complaint

The Branch County Junior Livestock Association, through the assistance of many interested individuals and concerns, conducts the Farmers Day Husbandry Clinic in February and is held at the BACC, many workshops and clinics throughout the summer to provide any assistance and guidance to our 4-H Youth Livestock exhibitors.

Small animal order for 2026 Auction: starter calves, rabbits, chickens, ducks, geese, turkeys will be sold Thursday evening, August 13th at 3:00 PM. Only the animals shown in the market classes are eligible for sale.

Large animal order for 2026 Auction: swine, dairy, beef, sheep, goats will be sold on Friday morning, August 14th at 9:30 AM. Auction day sale order by species: grand champion, reserve grand champion, third, fourth, fifth overall and rate of gain champion, showmanship winners, and then by weight.

Animals must be fed and cared for until they are released and be present prior to sale time for their respective project. It is the exhibitor's responsibility to be available and ready to sell at the auction. Be at the barn 30 minutes prior to the beginning of your auction and remain there until your animal(s) are sold. If the exhibitor is not present, the exhibitor will be skipped, and their animal will not go through the sale. Support price(if applicable) will be paid.

Proper attire and footwear must be worn at auction by exhibitors.

Any questions regarding the ownership, identification, or any other irregularity concerning a market life document animal must be brought to the attention of the species superintendent or Fair office within four hours of the completion of respective species show the complaint is being filed against. Please refer to the ethics policy for further details.

Those animals designated as finished by the judge will be eligible for sale. An exhibitor with market animals may withdraw their animals from the sale no later than 15 minutes after the conclusion of that species show. Request to withdraw to be made to the superintendent of the respective species. Grand champions and reserve grand champions in market livestock classes must be sold in the auction.

All animals that go through the sale ring must be accompanied by the exhibitor (except in extenuating circumstances, and with the species superintendents approval prior to the auction) or livestock will not be sold in the auction.

Market livestock pen cards shall have the buyers name posted two hours after the sale. All pen cards must be in place and completed on entry day at 9 PM and remain in place until the animals are released.

Youth, having consigned animals to the sale, are responsible for the care of that animals, and our financially responsible for those animals until they are loaded on trucks Sunday morning at the conclusion of the fair

Purchaser upon payment for livestock, must also give the name of the processor. Trucking will be arranged by the Junior Livestock Association. All market livestock must be removed by 9 AM or by superintendents discretion, the last Sunday affair, unless other arrangements have been made with the sale committee.

For exhibitors leasing breeding animal(s) contracts must be completed and uploaded to your fair entry prior to the deadline. These apply to animals that are not the bona fide property of the exhibitor. The owner certificate for breeding animals owned by the exhibitor.

All dairy must have an RFID tag to exhibit- DO NOT REMOVE ANY EAR TAGS AT ANY TIME

For more information, refer to the general livestock rules. All animals should be clean, fed and watered by 9 AM each day. Bedding, tack and exhibit areas should be cleaned and ready for display. All exhibitors must ensure their exhibit area is suitable for public viewing in the early evening hours.

1. Jr 4-H Dairy Program Only—Animals must be gated separately from all other animals of their club. Seven-year-old exhibitors will show following the dairy show of eight year-old through 17 and above exhibitors.
2. Jr 4-H Dairy Program Only— this is to be their only animal at the fair. No branch bud, barnyard children or junior 4-H small animal and cannot show in the mentor and me show on the last Saturday of Fair.
3. Jr 4-H Dairy Program Only— all rules for exhibitors apply as outlined in the Fair book. Example, white clothes, hard shoes or boots feeding/cleaning and care of exhibit all week and must have assigned lease agreement if the animal is borrowed.
4. 7-year old Jr 4-Her's can participate in YQCA or animal health, though it is not required
5. 8 and 9 yr old members are limited to exhibit two animals (both can be in the same class). Must be heifers under two years old.
6. No bulls of any age shall be exhibited
7. 10-year-old members and over may show six animals with no more than two animals per class.
8. When the breed of the animal is in question, exhibit the breed which the animal comes closest to representing according to the discretion of the superintendent of the section. Milk cooler available on grounds for milk handling, income from milk is prorated to individual producers after expenses are taken out.
9. Milking to be done at 7 AM and 6 PM
10. All grand champion dairy females are eligible to show for Supreme Champion Dairy Female. Selections to take place immediately after completion of all breed shows.
11. Proper dress code for showing dairy is required. All white clothes and hard boots.

For more information, refer to the general livestock rules. Chutes need to be taken home after show day to reduce clutter. For safety inside and outside the showing, if an animal gets away from an exhibitor twice during showmanship, the exhibitor, and the animal may be asked to leave the show ring. The exhibitor can return for market class if the animal again gets away from the exhibitor, the exhibitor and animal will be asked to leave the ring. If an animal gets away from the exhibitor as a result of another animal (i.e jumping on or being unruly), the exhibitor whose animal gets away will not be penalized. If the animal is not placed in the market class, it will not be able to go through the auction. It can be sold for support or taken home after the fair. This decision will be made by the specific superintendence and or general livestock committee fair members.

For exhibitors leasing breeding animal(s) to exhibit at the fair, a non-market lease contract and YQCA certificate must be completed and uploaded with fair entry by the deadline. These apply to animals that are not the bona fide property of the exhibitor.

1. First and second year exhibitors are limited to exhibiting one animal, unless the animal has calved in which case the calf may be exhibited. Dairy Starter Calves must not exhibit any signs of crossbreeding with any beef breed; evidence being in the head, neck, body or muscle structure. If identified, the calf will be put in a beef crossbreed market class to be evaluated. Those calves will still be able to sell at the auction, but will not be eligible for any awards and will not be allowed to be brought back as a finished dairy beef steer the following year. The Livestock Committee's decision in this matter is final.
2. Starter calves are to be steers, no heifers or bulls allowed.

The representative must then report their decision to the superintendent.

Division 83 - Market Hogs

Once livestock are weighed and have reached the minimum weight of 230 lbs. they are considered an exhibit entered in the fair. The Branch County Fair will include Purebred market hogs (Light and Dark). At entry day weigh-in, purebred hogs must present pedigrees in the name(s) of the exhibitor(s) as the owner (i.e. individuals or brothers & sisters living at the same address). Farm names will not be allowed (i.e. Doe Farms or John Doe and Family is not allowed).

1. Each exhibitor is limited to showing a total of two (2) individual market hogs. (No pairs shown). A market hog is a barrow or gilt only.
2. All swine must have an "A" rating and be declared finished by the Judge to be eligible to sell. An exhibitor with market animals may withdraw his animals from the sale no later than 15 minutes after the conclusion of the market show. Any swine not weighing a minimum of 230 pounds must go home by 9:00 p.m. on entry day.
3. All swine must be tagged during the pre-fair check in with 1 B.C.F. tag and an 840 tag (Official Federal Premise ID).
4. All swine will be bedded with shavings provided by the exhibitor.
5. Refer to General Livestock Rules on how many species can be entered in the Market Livestock Division.
6. Water or water-based products are suggested for use on Market Hogs. Hair clipping is permitted, shaving is NOT.
7. Club Exhibit -See Department 27. Optional Market Project Books - See Department 28
8. It is the Exhibitors responsibility to be available and ready to sell at the auction. Be at the barn 30 minutes prior to the beginning of your auction and remain there until your animals are sold. If the exhibitor is not present, he/she will be skipped, and their animals will not go through the sale. A support price (if applicable) will be paid.
9. There will be no market divisions. All first in class crossbred animals will return to the show ring for the crossbred drive with second place animals "on deck" unless the judge deems otherwise. The top five crossbred market hogs will be selected and will return for an Overall Final Drive.
10. Purebred Hogs: Minimum of 5 per breed to make a class. If less than 5 purebreds are in each class, those classes will be combined into an AOB Purebred Class. Breed Champion and Reserve Breed Champions will return for the final drive. An exhibitor may own more than one animal in this Overall Final Drive. However, if an exhibitor's animal is chosen for any placing in the final drive, their second animal must withdraw from the competition. Banners will include Grand Champion, Reserve Grand Champion, Third, Fourth, and Fifth Overall. As in the past, Grand and Reserve Grand Champion animals MUST go through the auction.
11. Exhibitor signs must not be taken down until the releasing of the market animals Post Fair Sunday, at Superintendent discretion.
12. Grand Champion & Reserve Grand Champion are to be in the swine champion display area within two hours of show completion.
13. Once market hogs are weighed and have reached the minimum weight of 230 lbs, they are considered an exhibit entered into the fair. Said animals must remain on the fairgrounds until release date and time unless authorized for an early release by a veterinarian and/or the Livestock General Superintendents
14. *Enter ONLY 2 animals*

Be at the barn 30 minutes prior to the beginning of your auction and remain there until your animals are sold. If the exhibitor is not present, he/she will be skipped, and your animal(s) will not go through the sale. Skipped animals will be donated to Meet the Need.
7. All Market exhibitors must complete a livestock owners' certificate and YQCA/Animal Health certificate and upload their fair entry form in order to show and sell.

- Jr. 4-H Poultry, Waterfowl, & Pigeons Program Only- 7-year-old exhibitors will show following the poultry show of 8-year-old through 17 & above exhibitors.
- Jr. 4-H Poultry, Waterfowl, & Pigeons Program Only- This is to be their only animal at fair. No Branch Bud, Barnyard or other Jr. 4-H Project and cannot show in the Mentor & Me show on the last Saturday of Fair.

 1. Market Poultry must be owned by the exhibitor before it is one week of age.

 6. Exhibitors are allowed to show a total of 6 pens.
 7. Classes may be combined or divided at Superintendent discretion.
 8. Club Exhibit-See Department 27.
 9. All extra cages, buckets, food containers or water jugs will not be left in the barn for the week and will be removed at the Superintendents' discretion.
 10. Payment for shavings will be due on Entry Day. Exhibitors with waterfowl are required to donate feed for waterfowl on entry day. Failure to do so will result in forfeiting premiums. No extra shavings will be left in the barns.
 11. When weighing in at Fair, exhibitors will have only one chance to re-weigh birds if they do not make minimum weight and will only be allowed to weigh in one extra bird. Market pens should be determined before weigh-in at the fair.
 12. The correct market class will be determined by weight at check-in.
 13. Exhibitor name tags must remain on the cage of market pens until released to the buyer.
 14. For exhibitors leasing the animal to exhibit at fair, a Non-Market Livestock Lease Contract must be completed and turned into the fair office with their fair entry forms. This applies to animals that are not the bona fide property of the exhibitor.

Market Rabbit Information

Only market animals receiving an “A” rating will be eligible for Grand/Reserve Champion. Only market entries receiving an “A” or “B” rating and declared finished by the Judge may sell. 1-10 placings in market classes. Any exhibitor with market animals must sign a consent form in order to withdraw his/her animals from the sale no later than 15 minutes after the conclusion of the show. Grand and Reserve must be sold.

- Fryer Market Rabbits – Not over 10 weeks of age. Minimum weight of 3.5 lbs. Maximum weight of 5.5 lbs.
- Roaster Market Rabbits – Rabbits must be under 6 months of age. Minimum weight over 5.6 lbs. Maximum weight of 8 lbs.
- Stewer Market Rabbits – Rabbits must be 6 months of age and over. Minimum weight over 8.1lbs.

Livestock Owners Certificate must be completed and turned in to the fair office with their premium entry forms. Market rabbits must be brought to the Fairgrounds on the tattoo date to be tattooed. You are not allowed to call in market rabbit tattoo numbers; they must be issued by the superintendent. Tattoo date is the second Wednesday in July from 5:00pm-7:00pm. Anyone who does not make tattoo date, will not be allowed to enter! Exhibitor name tags must remain on the cage of market pens until released to the buyer.

For Exhibitors leasing the animal to exhibit at the fair, a Non-Market Livestock Lease Contract must be completed and turned into the fair office with their premium entry forms. This only applies to animals that are not bona fide property of the exhibitor.

- Jr. 4-H Cavies Program Only- 7-year-old exhibitors will show following the Cavies show of 8-year-old through 17 & above exhibitors.
- Jr. 4-H Cavies Program Only- This is to be their only animal at the fair. No Branch Bud, Barnyard or other Jr. 4-H Project and cannot show in the Mentor & Me show on the last Saturday of Fair.
- Jr. 4-H Cavies Program Only- All the rules for exhibitor's apply as outlined in the fair book; must attend 1 mandatory Rabbit meeting. Example hard shoes or boots for show; feeding/cleaning and care of exhibit all week and must have a signed lease agreement if the animal is borrowed.
- Only purebred cavies may be entered in the breeding cavy classes. Classes will be judged by A.C.B.A rules. Classes will be assigned at the time of check-in. Know your cavy's breed, sex and age at check-in.
- An exhibitor may show a total of 6 pens.
- There will be enough housing available for 36 cavies. Cavy cages will be assigned on a first come first serve basis. After the 36 cages are filled it will be the responsibility of the exhibitor to provide housing.
- All cavies must be ear tagged or tattooed to enter. The tattoo date will be the second Wednesday of July, 5:00pm-7:00pm at the Fairgrounds. Cavies will be ear tagged at that time, if your animal is already tagged you do not need to bring it to get tattooed.
- Exhibitors must provide spill-proof dishes for food and water. Water bottles for cavy are acceptable if they can be sturdily attached to the cage.
- All extra cages, buckets, food containers or water jugs will not be left in the barn for the week and will be removed at superintendents' discretion.
- Payment for shavings will be due on Entry Day. Failure to do so will result in forfeiting premiums. No extra shavings will be left in the barn.

Horses, Ponies & Miniature Horses to be brought in on Saturday from 8:00 am to 2:00 pm and from 5:00 pm to 6:00 pm.

Judging: **Sunday, MINIATURE HORSE & IN-HAND CLASSES (8:30 a.m.); Monday, WESTERN STOCK HORSE & WESTERN PONIES (8:30 am); Tuesday, GYMKHANA (8:30) Wednesday, PERFORMANCE (8:30 am), Costume (5:00 pm), and Fun Events (6:00 pm); Thursday, ENGLISH (10:00 am).**

1. **An Animal Welfare Course is REQUIRED and must be attached to your premium statement at the July turn in date to show any equine by exhibitors of all ages. A class designated by the fair board on only equine or an all species class if showing another specie, or an all species class, online or in person, will be acceptable. You can refer to the Youth Rules & Regulation section in the fair book toward the beginning of the book for further information.**
2. **Mandatory** Branch County Fair equine body scoring will be the last two Saturdays of April. All equine potentially showing at fair (primaries) must be checked in. Any equine purchased after the last Saturday of April through May 1st must be submitted to the fair office (prior to the May Horse Leaders' meeting). The owner must include a dated proof of purchase via email. The equine must also be available for scoring by all participants at the May Horse Leaders' meeting.
3. Some Stock horses will be divided into grade and registered classes. Ponies under 55 inches go in designated classes. Those 55 to 56 inches may either go in Pony or Horse classes. Those 38 inches and under will enter miniature horse classes. **Only ponies and miniature horses** under age 6 and under 54" must be measured every year at **either** of the **two body score check-ins in April** at the fairgrounds (except as specified below). No additional measure dates will be permitted. A fair board representative will measure ponies and minis with a horse superintendent assisting. Each new pony or miniature horse to Branch County will be measured and added to the Branch County pony/mini list. If a pony or mini is 6 years old or older AND has been previously measured in Branch County between 56"- just over 38" for pony and 38" and under for mini (measured from the last hair of the mane), then they do not need to be measured again.
4. A mare & foal is considered one project. Foals may be shown as a project at the fair even if the mare is not shown. Exhibitors may show up to three (3) projects, at the leader's discretion.
5. An animal may be entered in any number of eligible classes, but must participate in a minimum of two classes to receive a possible premium for their Equine Notebook.
6. Hackamore bits and tie downs can be used in all gymkhana classes.
7. **At least one horse per exhibitor WILL be housed in box stalls. In the event that ALL stalls are taken, the superintendents will prorate stall space.** Multiple projects for the first and second year exhibitors is discouraged.
8. Stallions are not eligible as a 4-H project animal except in the year foaled.
9. Horse and pony ages will be determined as of January 1.
10. Ownership is encouraged, but not required. Lease horses must have a lease agreement on file.
11. Club Exhibit—See Department for Clubs in the Fair book.
12. Individuals (one exhibitor per animal) must have purchased their equine by May 1, or be responsible for as much of their care, feed, etc., as possible, from May 1 on, to be eligible for exhibiting at the Fair. Exhibitors can register up to six (6) horses as possible fair projects. A registration form must be turned into the Association by May 1. The Association will consider no substitutions for ill, injured, lame or death of projects.
13. Vaccinations required to exhibit equine at the fair will be Rhinopneumonitis and Influenza. It is highly recommended that you also vaccinate for Encephalomyelitis, Potomac Fever, Tetanus, West Nile Virus and Strangles. Influenza and Strangles are also available in an intranasal application as well as a vaccination. Proof of having the required vaccinations must be turned into your leader by **June 1st**. Proof will be a vet slip, attendance at a vaccination clinic or a witness form filled out by the club leader or owner (receipts of vaccine are acceptable). A legible copy of proof of negative Coggins test with a picture of the equine which is valid through the conclusion of the current year's fair and/or state horse show must be turned into your leader no later than **June 1st**.
14. Suitable covering is recommended in the stall to prevent digging of holes.
15. The senior exhibitor contestant representing the Horse and Pony division in the Large Animal Showmanship Sweepstakes will be the winner of the "Individual Showmanship Sweepstakes Show Off" class on **Monday** morning. Exhibitors 15 years old and over are "Senior Exhibitors".
16. The senior exhibitor contestant representing the Miniature Horse division in the Small Animal Showmanship Sweepstakes will be the winner of the "Individual Showmanship Sweepstakes Show Off" class on **Sunday** morning. Exhibitors 15 years old and over are "Senior Exhibitors".
17. Classes to be judged according to Michigan 4-H standards (Bulletin 1145).
18. Classes may be combined or split at the Judge's and Superintendents' discretion.
19. All Horses & Ponies **MUST** be on the fairgrounds by 7:00 pm the opening Saturday of Fair for veterinarian health checks, including any posse horses that are being used. Each equine will be presented by the owner (or someone they appoint) to the check-in committee at 7:00 pm. They will be checked in sequential stall order. The equine animals are to return to their stalls until released by the superintendent or fair board member. **Any animal not in good health & with a body score of less than 4 (according to the appointed vet by the Fair Board and/or Superintendents), including any haul ins or posse horses that are being used, will not be allowed to exhibit at Fair and will be sent home.** All animals are to remain in the barn until they are released and ready to leave the grounds. The project will be immediately off the fairgrounds if possible, but no later than 9:00 a.m. Sunday, the following morning. If the project is not out by 9:00 a.m. it will be removed. If a return project is available, it must be available for vet & fair board approval by 9:00 am on Sunday.

20. Equine exhibitors will only be paid for their equine notebook that is required to show an equine at fair pending that an equine is shown in two or more classes. (If premiums are paid that given year)
21. Any horse or pony that is shown in a showmanship and/or halter class, on any day, must enter two performance classes in that discipline that day, except in hand performance, and except junior horses/ponies entering halter classes only. On Tuesday, Gymkhana any horse or pony in a Showmanship, Halter, or Horsemanship class must be ridden in three (3) of the Gymkhana Classes. (Pole Bending, Flags, Down & Back, Speed & Action, Cloverleaf or Keyhole).
22. Exhibitors may ride only one (1) Equitation/Horsemanship class per seat style per section under saddle.
23. HORSES ON THE RAIL MUST BE CALLED TO THE CENTER OF THE RING ONLY AT A WALK.
24. **ONLY THE EXHIBITOR MAY RIDE THEIR PROJECT DURING SHOW HOURS. No professional trainers or groomers (leaders and family members are excluded) may assist in the preparation of the project animal.**
25. **If the exhibitor enters/shows in a walk or walk/trot only class, they are not eligible to enter any lope class including gymkhana & hunter hack with the same project animal.** It is highly recommended that the same horse and rider combination not enter a walk-trot class for more than two years except at leader's discretion for safety or health reasons. If the exhibitor shows in a walk only class, they cannot show in any walk-trot or canter classes on that same project animal. It is highly recommended that the same horse and rider combination not enter a walk only class for more than one year except at leader's discretion for safety or health reasons.
26. A 4-H exhibitor may use a posse horse at the Fair if the animal comes in under the 4-H rules (care, feeding, etc.) and is on the exhibitor's project registration sheet by May 1. Posse horses may not be hauled in specifically for fun day events.
27. Specific information regarding arena exercise time and wash rack duty is available at the Entry Booth posted by Superintendents. Wash horses, ponies and miniature horses in wash rack area only.
28. NO SMOKING OR VAPING IN THE BARNS, BLEACHERS OR ENTRY BOOTH.
29. No riding with halters. A bridle must be used at all times on all equine at all times by EVERYONE.
30. 4-H exhibitors should always wear proper riding footwear when riding or handling equine at 4-H events. Sandals and flip-flops are not acceptable. This applies to ANY person riding or handling an equine.
31. No loose equine **in or out** of ANY of the arenas, except foals who may be turned loose in the arenas at designated times. Yearlings are to be ponied or longed inside the arenas only.
32. Riding double is allowed, but no more than two.
33. NO DOGS in the barn and NO BIKES in any horse areas.
34. Ride/drive in designated areas ONLY. Lunge in arenas only.
35. **No horses are to be out of their stalls after 11:00 pm** except in cases of emergency.
36. Curfew rules of the campgrounds will apply in the barn areas (see rule in the fair book under camping & trailer parking). Chores should be done by 10:30 pm for lights out at 11:00 pm.
37. Any equine showing in the In Hand Performance or Lunge Line Class MAY NOT be shown in a riding class during fair week, or be ridden during the fair, including fun day.
38. No classes will be held for late exhibitors. Class/Exhibitors will be given 2 calls then the gate will close.
39. English/Western riding exhibitors must enter either the Novice or Advanced class. The Novice class will allow simple lead changes. Simple lead changes are defined by three trotting strides between lead changes. The advanced class will require exhibitor to perform a minimum of four flying lead changes.
40. Hunter Hack class will have jumps 18" tall and 48' apart. Miniature Horse In-Hand Hunter class will have 5 jumps from 12" to 24" high.
41. Horse Project Notebooks must be turned in before the adjournment of Horse Leaders meeting generally held two weeks before Fair. Each leader is to turn in their members' notebooks as a group, with a complete list of the project members that are enrolled in their club. The notebooks may be found online at: www.branchco-4horseleaders.com, copies of the notebooks are also available at the MSU Extension Office and from each horse leader.
42. DO NOT leave any equine unattended when tied to hitching posts.
43. Equine clubs will furnish their own back tags for their members. These back tags can be laminated or covered with clear contact paper.
44. ASTM approved helmets with the SEI label are required whenever you are on a horse in Gymkhana or English styles with full tack. This is to include Gymkhana horsemanship classes. The harness must be fastened when a helmet is worn. **All helmets will be checked for SEI or ASTM label the first Saturday of the fair at a time TBD at the entry booth. Arrangements may be made to check helmets on Sunday if necessary.**
45. Fair Premiums may be pulled by the Horse Leader's Association, Superintendents & fair board for good cause.
46. The use of cell phones while riding is prohibited.
47. **By 9:00 am every day, ALL livestock should be fed, watered and pens cleaned. Animals/Stalls MUST be checked for cleanliness and clean water/feed twice per day minimum. PM stalls and chores must be done within 1 hour after show ends. Club by laws may supersede this guideline.**

48. If an equine is being exhibited in other disciplines, other than pleasure, and entering the Senior Sweepstakes class wishes to have ring time before the actual Showmanship Sweepstakes class, the member may take the horse in one halter class for preparation (not to place in that halter class or count against them in the Sweepstakes Class).
49. High Point will be offered through the Branch County 4-H Horse Leaders' Association due to your leader by July 1st. Please reference that rulebook to enter those options if desired.
50. The Judge/Superintendent/leader has the right to remove any exhibitor from the show arena at any time.
51. **NO EQUINE MAYBE HAULED IN FOR WEDNESDAY SPECIAL EVENTS OR SATURDAY'S FUN DAY.**

Exhibitors are responsible for complete care of their animals.

All dogs to be exhibited at the Fair must be kept on a leash and under complete control, while on the Fairgrounds.

During exhibition, leashes and/or collars may be removed.

Dogs being shown must have 1) Current state license tag and receipt. 2) Proof of veterinary issued papers for current rabies vaccination and current CORE VACCINATIONS. See a Superintendent for proper forms to be completed when shots/tests are given by someone other than a veterinarian or vaccine clinic. 3) A Titer test by a veterinarian showing acceptable levels of immunity may also be accepted. A photocopy of all licenses, vaccinations, lab results, etc. MUST accompany your fair entry and turn it into the fair office one month prior to the fair (with all other entries). NO PAPERWORK will be accepted after the entry deadline.

Dogs being shown must have been in possession of the exhibitor since May 1. Dogs must be trained and/or groomed by the exhibitor prior to completion, regardless of class entered.

Dogs exhibiting at the fair will be brought in, exhibited, and taken home on that same day.

Exhibitors must be enrolled in a Dog Care and Training Program to show at the Fair. All dogs must receive training in the area they are showing at the Fair. A MINIMUM OF 8 TRAINING SESSIONS ATTENDED by both handler and dog working together is required to show at the Fair. Training Sessions must be attended in the current year (September – August) of Fair classes being entered. It is very important to be involved locally with the Branch County Fair Dog Training Program so you are kept up to date on all events pertaining to participating in our dog program. If showing more than one dog, all dogs must meet minimum requirements with the handler. If classes are taken other than with the Branch County 4-H program, a written statement from the instructor must accompany your entry form. Statement must contain dates of classes attended, kind of class attended, instructors name, address & telephone number for verification.

No two exhibitors shall show the same dog.

Any Exhibitor and/or dog who has paid a fee for Professional Training OR has an agility or obedience degrees or titles in A.K.C., U.K.C. or any other organization other than 4-H in the class being entered or has shown in the entered agility or obedience class from previous years, shall enter in the experienced class. See the Superintendents.

Exhibitors may show the same dog in only one Obedience class, one Rally class and one Agility class. This does not include Brace or Team classes. Exhibitors may exhibit more than one dog as long as the dogs are competing in different Obedience classes. Only exceptions to this rule are Beginner Novice and Pre-Novice because there are no group exercises. Exhibitors may show 2 different dogs in Beginner Novice and Pre-Novice. Exhibitors cannot show 2 dogs in the Sub-Novice classes. Example: First dog shows in Novice B and second dog shows in Graduate Novice A class. Exhibitors may show more than one dog in the same Agility class and the same Rally class. First year members can show one dog. Second year and above members may show up to three dogs.

Dogs exhibiting must be pre-entered 30 days prior to opening day of the fair. Exhibitors will be called only twice to the show ring. If you have other 4-H activities that day that conflict with the Dog Show, the superintendents must be made aware of the conflict. You are responsible for making your class.

All Best of Show and Honorable Mentions must have a qualifying score in that class to receive honor of trophy and ribbon. Awards will be determined by score sheets with the exception of showmanship which is determined by the judge. In the case of a tie score or tie score and time, the judge will determine the award by a run off.

Dog Grooming competition to involve Dog Care and Training project exhibitors only. Competition to be held simultaneous with Showmanship and Obedience classes.

“Best of Show” for grooming involves the top two groomed dogs from each class, to be determined by the grooming judge.

No females in season will be allowed on fairgrounds (during fair week) or allowed to participate in any dog show events at the fair.

If a dog is coming out of season and is causing a big distraction to other dogs, they will be dismissed from the dog show and sent home. Superintendents will make the final decision.

All dogs must be entered and shown in a grooming class.

Proper dress attire is to be worn in a show ring. No advertising on clothes or leashes. Dress requirements available at the extension office.

A qualifying score must be obtained by the dog in its obedience, Rally & Agility class before the dog can move up to the next class in that event (exception is Pre-Agility). If a qualifying score is obtained other than at the fair, a photocopy of score, judge and place of show must accompany the premium statement in order to move up at fair.

Once a dog has received a qualifying score in obedience and rally, it must show experience in that obedience class or move up to the next class.

A dog receives only 1 qualifying score in beginner novice then moves to Sub-Novice. A dog may receive 2 qualifying scores in any other level of obedience (Pre-Novice, Novice, etc.). The dog must move up after receiving a second qualifying score at our Fair or receiving Best of Show in that class.

Section 124 – Rally Obedience

AKC Rally Regulations will be used at the discretion of Superintendents. Please see the superintendent for modifications of rules. When a qualifying score is received in Rally Novice, the dog must move to Rally Intermediate. Dogs can only receive 2 qualifying scores in any other Rally level, after 2nd qualifying score the dog must move to the next level. Dogs may continue to show in Rally Excellent after receiving 2 qualifying scores.

- **BRANCH BUDS are not eligible to sell, OPEN CLASS exhibits are not eligible to sell.**
- Exhibitors must register for the Still Exhibit Auction by submitting a completed registration form to the Fair Office by 5:00 p.m. on Monday and must be clearly marked with a silent auction tag provided by the fair office. Exhibitors who fail to register by 5:00 p.m. will not be eligible to sell.

Section 188 – Rocketry

Learning Objective: The 4-H rocketry program is designed to allow 4-H members to explore aerospace through rockets of various sizes. Branch County 4-H has adopted the National Association of Rocketry's (NAR) rules, regulations and safety guidelines. Each exhibitor will adhere to the details listed in the project guidelines.

Each exhibitor may enter up to two rocket exhibits that have been constructed during the current year. If two rockets are entered, one rocket must be either a "kit" or a "rocketry educational exhibit" and the second may be entered into any other applicable class. An exhibitor may not enter two rockets in the same class.

Each rocket exhibited MUST be accompanied by a separate 4H Rocketry Exhibit Information Form. This report should NOT be attached to the rocket stand or to the rocket. This may be downloaded from the BlogSpot link. This report cannot be exhibited as a Rocketry Notebook or Rocketry Display.

Plans (or a photocopy) must be placed inside the envelope.

This includes original design rockets.

If a rocket kit has been modified structurally, notations need to be given indicating the changes made, either by notations on the Rocket Exhibition Information Form or by placing notes in the plans.

One or more photographs of the rocket at the launch site are required.

Photographs showing the rocket at the moment of ignition are preferred.

Photographs must be mounted on one side of 8 1/2" x 11" page(s).

There must be at least 1 page of photos and no more than 5 pages of photos.

Include at least one photograph showing rocket construction, preferably with the exhibitor included.

To exhibit in this division:

The rocket must have been flown.

Rockets shall be displayed standing vertically on a stable display base and held by a support rod.

Support rods must not extend past the tip of the highest nosecone on the model.

Support rods must remain in the upright position, 90 degrees to the display base, do not angle. If support rods are not perpendicular to the base, the judge should deduct two ribbon placings.

No models may be submitted on a launch pad.

Support rods must be topped with a brightly colored cap or topper for the sake of safety.

The altitude achieved by the rocket is to be determined using a method other than estimation. Examples of accepted methods include an altimeter, computer software, range finders, etc. If additional space is needed to show calculations of how the altitude was achieved one additional page may be added to the rocketry information pack.

Flight damage is to be documented by the participant on either the construction plans or the 4-H Rocket Exhibit Information Form.

The judging of flight damage is to be secondary to all other aspects of the model. UNDER NO CIRCUMSTANCES may flight damage be grounds for disqualification, and only minor placing deduction.

Engines and igniters ARE NOT PERMITTED UNDER ANY CIRCUMSTANCES with the exhibit and constitute an immediate disqualification.

If an engine becomes stuck, jammed, wedged or in any other way permanently affixed in or to a rocket and cannot be removed from the rocket, the rocket will be subject to immediate disqualification. This is because it is not possible to make a full and immediate assessment of the safety of the rocket when it is being judged and safety is paramount.

Engines may not be used as display stands hollowed out or otherwise and will be subject to immediate disqualification.

Rocket engines shall not be used to join multi-stage rockets together.

Multi-stage rockets can be displayed without having the stages connected together.

The different stages must be included to complete the rocketry exhibit, incomplete exhibits will be deducted at least one ribbon placing.

Use of any engine to join the stages together will be subject to immediate disqualification.

Multi-stage rockets can be flown using just the final stage and be considered fully flown.

Rockets are to be properly assembled according to the assembly instructions.

Beginner kits with prefabricated fin assemblies and pre-finished (requiring no painting) are only acceptable for the 9-10-year-old exhibitors.

Plastic snap together fins must fall within a plus or minus 2-degree variation using an approved fin alignment guide (such as KSSTAC10).

An official fin guide is available from BlogSpot

Each Fair Rocketry Educational exhibit must include a 4-H Educational Rocketry Exhibit Information Form, which should be attached to the outside of a 10" x 13" manila envelope.

Exhibits may not consist of only a rocket, but must contain substantial supporting educational material in the form of posters, notebooks or display boards, etc.

Displays should be creative and showcase something specific you have learned in the Rocketry project during the current 4-H year. Follow copyright laws, citing all sources of information in a standard notation on the "4-H Educational Rocketry Exhibit Information Form". Additional pages can be added inside the Informational Packet and should be labeled "Citations".

Educational displays are not to exceed a standard commercial 3' x 4' tri-fold display board. No cardboard table exhibits will be allowed. Care should be taken to use durable materials that will withstand display conditions.

"Construction Kits" that are part of Educational displays must be contained in cases (tackle boxes, sealable container, etc.) that may not be larger than 1' x 2' x 2' and must have a latch which securely keeps all components contained in the "Construction Kits".

Rocketry Educational Project notebooks must be organized in a 3-ring binder.

Educational posters must be no larger than a 22" x 28" poster board.

Engines and igniters ARE NOT permitted with the exhibit and constitute an immediate disqualification. This is for safety reasons and includes both spent and live engines.

Exhibitor's name, county, age and year(s) in project must be tagged or labeled in a prominent location on the educational display, notebook, Construction Kit and/or poster.

A central theme

What you want others to learn

Be designed and constructed in a manner befitting the exhibit

Be something you are interested in

Be related to model or high-power rocketry

- Tractors must have ALL standard sheet metal including fenders.
- Contestants will have 1 minute to hook after being called. Pull will start with a tight chain and one restart allowed if the sled does not reach 50 feet.
- Vehicle will not pull until the track judge has displayed the green flag and will stop immediately when the red flag is displayed. The flag man is in control and failure to follow his directions will result in disqualification.
- Tractor (but not sled) must stay within boundaries or be disqualified.
- Fuels: Must be manufactured with recommended fuels-no alcohol, blended or aviation fuel. Vehicles will be inspected for leaks.
