Mark's Minute

As you may know (or maybe you weren't aware), we will be on Sabbatical a year from now. I say "we" because you, Shalom, are coming with me on Sabbatical. In other words, we will ALL be entering into a time of spiritual renewal. Therefore, during this year leading up to the Sabbatical (which will take place from May 1, 2022 – August 15, 2022), you will be learning more and more about "SHALOM on Sabbatical."

Now, perhaps that term "Sabbatical" is new to you. You may even be asking, "What IS a Sabbatical, exactly?" The word "Sabbatical", of course, is connected to the word "Sabbath" and "Sabbath", in a Biblical context, is related to rest. So, a sabbatical, then (or, more precisely, a "sabbatical leave") is a period of rest and renewal. Maybe you've heard this word used in academic circles—where a college professor, perhaps, is granted a sabbatical in order to write a book. An academic sabbatical differs somewhat from а religious renewal The religious renewal sabbatical is designed to sabbatical. renew, reinvigorate, re-sharpen, retool, and relaunch clergy into the NEXT years of ministry ahead. So...in THAT sense, it's a win-win for both clergy AND congregation. Furthermore, Sabbaticals may be a new concept if you've been a Baptist all of your life. They are much more prevalent in some of our sister denominations (Presbyterian, Lutheran, even Methodist (in fact, Pastor Chad from NewSong, one of our neighbor churches, is on his sabbatical now). However, more and more of our Dover churches have offered sabbaticals (Emmaus Baptist, New Highland Baptist).

"How and why did Shalom choose to make a clergy renewal sabbatical possible?" It all began back in 2005/2006 when our Shalom congregation decided to enter into a covenant with me as your pastor. Part of that covenant included a clergy renewal sabbatical every 7 years. (Sabbath = 7th day of the week— Exodus 16:26; The Sabbatical year = the 7th year -Leviticus 25:4). In 2013, our church (at the 6395 Mechanicsville Turnpike location) was getting ready to move into a time of expansion and so it didn't seem to me (or to leadership) to be the right time. Of course, THAT focus shifted when we received a phone call from LIDL...which ultimately led into a church relocation and building project. Again, not the most opportune time to take a sabbatical. Finally, in 2018, we moved into our new facility. And so, in 2019, the deacon... "Sabbatical is a period of rest and renewal."

leadership brought up the idea of a sabbatical again. I started to do some research regarding how to pay for a sabbatical and learned about the CTS Eli Lilly Foundation Clergy Renewal Grant. Because the grant application would need to be completed in the year PRIOR to the sabbatical, it was agreed upon that I would work towards a sabbatical in the summer of 2021. And then COVID struck. And again, it was determined by both myself and our leadership that I needed to pastor through this time of uncertainty. And that brings us to our current timeframe—"Shalom on Sabbatical" will be May 1, 2022 through August 15, 2022.

So...that's WHAT a sabbatical is...and that's how and why Shalom arrived at this place in the sabbatical process. Several months ago, a "Sabbatical Advisory Team" was put in place. They will be at the "tip of the spear" in helping to provide information, communication and preparedness in this "Shalom on Sabbatical" process. The team members are: Ron Bowles (Personnel representative); Jane Snead (Deacon Chair); Ken Cliborne (Deacon Vice Chair); Allen Broaddus (Stewardship Chair); Geraldine Ford (Trustee Representative); Jean Dart (Staff) and Kelly Bittler (Staff). In her article, Seven Tips for Engaging with Live-Streamed Worship, Constance Cherry provides some great suggestions for how we can be more engaged in our worship services remotely. The most fundamental shift to make is moving from watching to participating – from passively observing a produced service to fully engaging as an active worshipper. Please consider these seven practical suggestions for worshipping during a live-streamed service.

1. **Build anticipation**. Talk to your family the night before about how exciting it will be to worship together "live." For those who live alone, share your joyful anticipation with a friend or neighbor, inviting them to join you from their home at the same time.

2. **Prepare the technology in advance.** Make sure that you have reached the web page at least 15 minutes ahead of the hour of broadcast and that it is functioning well. That way, you won't miss the first moments of the service while you are trouble-shooting any technical difficulties that could arise.

3. **Create a worshipful setting.** Gather what items you have around the house to create a centerpiece for worship. You might place a cutting from your yard, a candle and an open Bible on the table in front of you. What items do you have in your home that can help transform the space you're in to a worship space?

4. **Get settled.** Make sure that the lighting in the room is conducive to avoid screen glare. Position everyone. Grab that cup of coffee or tea.

5. **Pray.** Before the time of service, offer a prayer out loud for whomever is present (even if it is just you), invoking God's presence. Give this special time to God. Pray for your pastor and all worship leaders as they lead.

6. Enthusiastically participate throughout the entire service! Don't just watch other people sing, sing! Don't just watch other people pray, pray! If you are invited to engage in certain postures such as kneeling, bowing, standing, stretching out your hands to receive the benediction, do it! Do everything you would do if you were present together at your church— aloud!

7. **Reflect on the experience.** Mention what happened in worship at various points throughout the rest of the day or the upcoming week. Reflecting on what held meaning or was remarkable (other than the glitches in live streaming that happen to all of us!) is a way to remind ourselves that our weekly worship service at home has real significance.

Worshipping remotely can easily become passive, but biblical worship is never passive. So, let's do what we can to fully engage. How much more enthusiastic our worship will surely be for having made the shift from watching to participating until then.



Stewardship Snippet

Biblical Principles of Borrowing

Now that we have discussed the economic and spiritual dangers of debt, let's see what the Bible says about borrowing. Psalm 37:21 says, " The wicked borrow and do not repay, but the righteous give generously". This implies that not repaying a debt is never an option for a Christian. Our aim as Christians is to be debt free so we live a lifestyle of giving without hesitation or fear. Proverbs 22:7 tells us, "The rich rules over the poor, and the borrower is servant to the lender." This verse doesn't prohibit debt, but it cautions us against using it. 1 Timothy 5:8, "If anyone does not provide for his own, and especially those in his own household, he has denied the faith and is worse than an unbeliever". The underlying biblical principle here is by taking on debt you may run the risk of not providing for your own. Taking on debt may be used to improve your situation but, that's not always what happens. And it creates negative compounding and can have a negative impact on the future. So, avoid debt if at all possible. Luke 12:15 says, "Then Jesus said to them, Watch out! Be on your guard against all kinds of greed; life does not consist in the abundance of possessions. "Things" are just pre-trash. Debt makes it easy to fund greed. The question to ask is, am I funding need or greed? The Bible has many passages dealing with money and debt. Why? First, debt is extremely deceptive. Getting into debt is easy, it is also extremely hard to get out of. It may feel impossible to get out of it. Second, it creates bondage. It can affect our lifestyle and we are no longer free to be the witnesses God calls us to be. Lastly, debt is blasphemous. When we rely on debt, we deny God the opportunity to work. Even with all these cautions and warnings against debt, there are times when it may be acceptable, under certain circumstances. And we'll look at those next time.
