2024 British Car Festival

Will the 34th edition of the SABCC British Car Festival be remembered as one of the best iteration of the show? The statistics are certainly compelling.

With 154 cars registered, tying the record set in 2023, and 138 cars on the field, only three fewer than last year, we offered participants and visitors an array of British cars, trucks, SUVs, and motorcycles spanning nearly a century of British motoring history. The oldest vehicle was a 1930 MG M-Type owned by James Hester of Russellville, Ala.; three 2024 Ineos Grenadiers (an SUV inspired by the classic Land Rover Defender) were the newest. With the exception of the 1940s, each of the past ten decades was represented.

The variety of vehicles was also impressive. Fully 25 marques and 75 models were covered by the registered cars. Each of the 30 BCF classes had at least one entry, and we even had to split the Sprite/Midget class when we ended up with three "Bugeye" Sprites on the field. Registrations came in from nine states, and a total of 21 clubs were represented. Importantly, 45 of the participants were new to the show (or at least had not registered a car within the last eight years).

But enough about statistics – the compelling question in the days and weeks after the show is "Did it go well?" While the BCF meeting on Nov. 11 (see preceding page) will give the show committee (and anyone else who would like to attend) the opportunity to discuss this in detail, the consensus thus far is "It went very well, thank you." The Friday night dinner was very

well-attended, and thanks to a critical assist from past show chair **Brian Daly**, the main course arrived in time for us to stay on schedule. **Donna Eagleson** and her team kept everything moving smoothly, and everyone had plenty to eat. **Andrea Bertagnolli** arranged for a large assortment of door prizes.

The day of the show was bright and sunny, with temperatures ranging from the mid-60s in the early morning to an afternoon high of about 80. Thanks to 134 participants registering before the day of the show, we had no lines at the entrance, and the only parking issues were finding places for some of the cars whose classes had more entrants than expected. As usual, **Noel Eagleson** and team handled these with grace and aplomb.

Once the cars were on the field, ballots were distributed and voting began. A crack team of vote counters, headed by **Donna Eagleson**, began tallying the votes as they came in, and the full results were ready by about 2:45 p.m.

Meanwhile, the activities of the day continued. **Dennis Carroll** recruited five vendors to display their good or services at the show. You can read more about them on page 7. The Tin Tin food truck served delicious food to those desiring a hot meal onsite, and a snow cone truck offered cold sweet treats. Finally, one of the highlights of the afternoon was valve cover racing, organized (but not won by) **Peter Lee**, the BCF chair. This event proved so popular that the awards ceremony had to wait for the contests to end.

One was presented to Larry Norton, president of the North American MGB Register, who brought his MGF to the show.





Drivers and Drivers

Americans are blessed with many easy laws or rules that are more strongly enforced in most countries. The opportunity of driving is a major one.

Pay attention; the ability to drive well in a loss of control situation, to know the laws, how to maintain your car, and how to help in an accident is very important elsewhere versus here, so getting a driver's license is a difficult, expensive, and lengthy process, so count your blessings.

Just a few examples: in France, when applying to driving school, you have to pass all the tests, which could take up to two years and cost you over a thousand dollars. In Spain, depending on the city, it can cost you from \$800 to \$2,300. In

the UK, it can coast you \$1,700. In Germany, you pay \$2,000 to \$3,000, and eight hours of maintenance and first aid courses are required, plus a 30question test to show mechanical ability for minor repairs and maintenance.

Cars are a more expensive utility in these countries. They are taken care of, and drivers are better educated of needs and how use them, store them, and not abuse them like we do. Don't believe fairy tales about the "Prince of




Longtime PBCA member Jack Rowles has a project MGB that is free (for pickup) to a good home.



The Show Must Go On

First, a word about last month's column: several readers contacted me to tell me they appreciated my thoughts on reasons to quit the car club. To those who took a minute to tell me they liked the column, thank you. To those who decided my reasons were sufficient to leave, it's been good to know you.

Continuing in the spirit of that column, and since our British Car Festival has just been held, I thought I'd use my space this month to talk about why we still need to have car shows.

Let's thank about it for a minute – with our phones or other devices, we can see pictures of countless cars almost anywhere in the world. We can read about them, see videos of them in action, and with gaming systems, even virtually "drive" them on a track. So we don't really need shows anymore, right?

And let's face it, folks. Car shows are a lot of work. The BCF committee works for almost an entire year planning and organizing the show. Yes, the last show was only three weeks ago, but we will meet Nov. 11 to start making plans for 2025. Is that really necessary, and a good use of our time? After all, none of us are getting paid.

Finally, a car show is a somewhat wasteful endeavor. All those carbon-spewing monsters on the road . . . many of them with little or no emission control systems. Of course that doesn't even consider the unnecessary driving to and from meetings, making preparations, and so forth. And has anyone thought about from whence comes the pork for our barbecue?

I believe the benefits of the show do, in fact, outweigh the costs. Apparently, many of you agree, as we seem to pull off this event every year, for 34 years and counting, and it seems to keep getting bigger and better. So let's discuss benefits.

First, the BCF supports our purpose as a club. Our bylaws say we exist to "promote camaraderie through British car oriented events" and "provide a multi-faceted source of information concerning British cars." Hosting a show for the community at large, and inviting other clubs and individuals to register and participate, certainly provides information and promotes camaraderie. Finally, and perhaps most important, our show carries the history, enthusiasm, and appreciation for the British car hobby to future generations. Our efforts, led by **Don Pritchett**, to involve kids and youth in the show are vital. We also selected the MINI as our featured marque this year, knowing that younger generations appreciate them. Thank you, **Ben Cummings**, for seeking more ways to involve young people.

So yes, the show must go on. We did well this year. Let's do even better next year.
