WARNING SIGN AWARENESS

IS THIS YOUR ROOF?

Here are some common warning signs that your roof needs attention and what to do when it does.



CURLING SHINGLESShingle edges are curled or shingle tabs are cupped.

What to do: This is a common sign that your roof may need to be replaced. It's time to get a professional opinion.



MISSING GRANULES

Bald spots on shingles or large amounts of granules in gutters or near downspouts.

What to do: This is a sign of an aging roof. It's time to put this project on your to-do list.





STORM DAMAGE

Look for missing shingles after high winds or dents from hail storms.

What to do: From a safe place, document visible damage, such as dented, torn, or missing shingles. This is helpful for insurance purposes.



MOSS

Moss holds moisture and in freezing climates can cause damage to the granules on the top of the shingles.

What to do: If moss growth is a continuing problem, contact a professional roofing contractor for advice.



DARK STREAKS

Airborne algae can cause dark streaks on your roof. While not necessarily harmful, it may not look good.

What to do: When it's time to replace your roof, consider shingles with StreakGuard® algae protection.



ICE DAMMING

This can be a sign of poor attic ventilation and can cause water to back up into your attic, which can cause damage to walls and ceilings.

What to do: Contact a local roofing contractor who can evaluate your roof for damage and determine your needs.





KNOW WHAT TO EXPECT

THE COST OF A NEW ROOF

Every roof is unique and requires a trusted, professional roofing contractor to thoroughly inspect and provide an estimate that is specific to your roof's needs. Here are a few key things that will impact cost.



Roof Square Footage

The size of your home's roof directly impacts its replacement cost. The more surface area you must cover, the more materials you're going to need, including OSB/plywood, underlayment, and shingles.

The square footage of your home is not the same as the square footage of your roof. The roof square footage includes all covered living spaces along with garages, walkways, overhangs and front entryways.

Roof Slope

Depending on your home's style, you may have steep slopes, low slopes, or a combination of both. In general, the steeper the roof, the more expensive the project cost, and this is typically due to safety reasons. A very steep roof might require special equipment for the roofers to use while they work on it.

Amount of Shingles You Need

Roof surfaces are measured in squares. A square is an area of your roof that equals 100 square feet and covers a 10' x 10' area. The number of roofing squares needed for a project is calculated by dividing the total roof area by 100. For example, if your roof covers a 2200 square-foot area, divide 2200 / 100 = 22, so your project would require 22 squares of shingles to cover your roof.



Waste Factor

Roofing contractors typically add between 10-15% to the total roof square footage to account for waste. This includes material that is overlapped in valleys and hips, as well as cut off material around flashings, penetrations, and gable ends.

Your Roofing Materials

The type of roofing shingles and materials you choose, or may even be required based on your local building codes or HOA rules, will also impact your cost. In addition to shingles, you may also need new decking, underlayment, vents, flashing, etc.

Condition of the Existing Roof

If you need a total roof replacement because your existing roof is heavily damaged, then this may affect the cost as well. If your roof has a hole in it that requires work on the underlying wood structure, this involves extra labor and materials. If it's determined that your roof doesn't have adequate ventilation, then installing new vents may impact your roofing project's costs and timeline.

Roofing Contractor Rates

Roofing contractors typically charge an all-in price per square for a roofing project. This price should include labor and materials. Just like other areas in life, going with the cheapest price may not be the best thing to do. Highly experienced and reputable contractors can command a higher price in the market. Remember the old adage, you get what you pay for.

Additional Fees

Extended Warranties

Some roofing manufacturers may offer extended warranties for the customer to purchase separately from the standard roofing materials warranty that automatically comes with the products.

Local Building Permits and Inspections

Many communities require building permits for roofing installation, which must be obtained from the proper municipal authorities.

Material Disposal Fees

If your roofing project involves removal and disposal of existing roofing materials, your contractor may add disposal fees onto the total cost of the job.






BOLD OR BLEND-IN?



CHOOSING A CONTRACTOR

CONTRACTOR COMPARISON CHECKLIST

How do you know if you're hiring the right roofing contractor? This checklist will help you make the decision with confidence. (And make sure you talk to multiple contractors!)

1 Can they provide an in-depth understanding of the company's experience level in the roofing business?

Think of this interaction with a contractor as a job interview. This isn't necessarily asking how long they've been in business because many company owners started in the industry with other companies, but you'll want to understand the total experience level of the contractor.

2 Does the contractor have insurance coverage?

Your contractor should carry insurance to help protect your home from accidental damage. Owens Corning Roofing Platinum and Preferred Contractors hold at least \$1MM in general liability insurance. Professional contractors will share with you the certificate of insurance coverage.

Does the contractor have a license or other credentials as required by the local municipality or state?

You can always call your city administrative offices to get the requirements. Contractors can, and should, provide you a copy of their license. Check with your local Better Business Bureau organization to be sure the contractor has a clean record with no outstanding issues. From time-to-time all contractors can have issues with customers; the key is do they resolve the issues?

Will the contractor provide you with a written estimate?

Your roofing contractor should provide an estimate that includes an accurate and complete description of the work to be performed, plus the products selected for your project. This should also include information on whether there is work that will be subcontracted out.

Does the contractor perform a thorough inspection of your roof?

In addition to checking for storm damage, your roofing contractor should perform a thorough inspection of your current roof, including the deck, attic, flashing, chimney, soil stacks, valleys and other roof penetrations. This is the best way to determine the full scope of the reroofing job.

Does your contractor check for adequate ventilation? Does he/she explain it to you?

Your roofing contractor should check the existing attic ventilation and explain the importance of proper ventilation. This should include inspecting your roof from inside the attic to determine if the current ventilation system is working properly. Improper ventilation can damage your shingles and invalidate your manufacturer's warranty.

Will the contractor take the time to explain how a proper roofing system works?

This should include an explanation of all the individual component parts and how they work together for the best roof performance.

Depending on your location for either ice/ snow or wind-driven rain, you may need an ice and water barrier on your roof deck. Does your contractor explain this requirement to you?

Depending on your location, your roof deck may require ice and water barriers to protect your home against either ice and snow, or wind-driven rains. Not only should your contractor be able to explain the difference in the products, but they should also be able to recommend the best protection in sealing your roof deck.

Does your contractor adequately explain your shingle style and color choices to you?

There are many shingle lines and price ranges to choose from, and some shingles have specific performance aspects that may be required in your area (like solar reflectance or impact resistance). You should ALWAYS be given choices.

Does your contractor explain the difference between his/her workmanship warranty coverage versus the product manufacturer's warranty coverage for defective products?

There is a difference. And the contractor should be able to explain to you whom you should call with a problem.

Will they provide references for this contractor's work?

Most professional contractors are eager to share their reference list; you should call a few of them.

12 Is the contractor clear about when he can do your project?

While things do happen to delay the start of your project (like the weather), you should have a general understanding of when you can fit into the contractor's schedule.

Do you feel the contractor has a good communication style? Do you feel he/she takes the time to answer your questions and listen to your concerns?

The bottom line is that regardless of the price differences between contractors, trust your gut about which contractor you feel will best fit you and your project. If you are having difficulty communicating before the project, it's probably not going to improve after you sign the contract.

14 Can they provide in writing clear payment terms?

You should NEVER pay for the roof in advance. On most average jobs that will be in the schedule quickly, the contractor won't expect you to pay a deposit, but he/she will expect payment in full upon completion. A different pay schedule may be required for very large, complex projects. You should be comfortable with the payment arrangements.

15 Does the contractor offer financing?

Not only might this help you fund this project, it could also be a sign that the contractor is in good financial standing as lending institutions have an application process for contractors to offer this type of funding.

EVERYTHING YOU NEED TO KNOW ABOUT

GETTING A ROOFING ESTIMATE

After you've narrowed down your list of potential roofing contractors to hire, getting a roofing estimate is the next logical step in your roof project.

What Is a Roofing Estimate?

A roofing estimate, or roofing quote, is a written summation of the scope of your roofing project provided by a roofing contractor.

What's Included in a Roofing Estimate?

Roofing estimates can vary widely from one roofer to another — some may email a one-page quote, while others may use computer templated software to create detailed reports that include the estimate.

Your estimate should outline the following:

- Materials list
- · Cleanup and removal
- Permits
- · Licensing and insurance
- · Who is responsible for what and when
- Estimated start and completion dates
- · The overall cost of the job
- · Payment terms

Materials List

A roofing quote should mention the brand and types of roofing materials your roofing contractor intends to use.

Cleanup and Removal

The estimate should include removal of discarded materials and cleanup of your property.

Permits

Local and city building codes may require permits for a roof repair or reroof project. Experienced roofing contractors should be familiar with what is needed and will factor these costs into the estimate.

Licensing and Insurance

A roofing estimate should include the roofing contractor's license (if required in your state) as well as proof of liability insurance and workers' compensation, proving they are reputable and licensed to perform the work.

COMPARING ROOFING QUOTES

It's easy to compare roofing estimates on the basis of cost alone. But the numbers may not always tell the whole story. Here are some things to keep in mind.

MAKE A FAIR, APPLES-TO-APPLES COMPARISON BETWEEN ESTIMATES

A more expensive quote might include work that is a bit more comprehensive or that involves a complete roof replacement, while another cheaper quote might be based on a roof repair.

IMPROVEMENTS ADD UP

If you decide to make improvements to your existing roof along with the repairs, this can also affect the cost. Whether it's increased ventilation or an attic fan or skylight, these upgrades should also be factored into your estimate.

TOO GOOD TO BE TRUE

Look out for roofing quotes that seem too good to be true because they probably are. It might mean the contractor is looking to cut corners on safety, licensing, or materials.

You've picked your contractor, so what's next?





Sign the contract

The next stage can sometimes feel a little daunting but is a necessary part of the process. Reviewing the contract carefully before signing is essential to ensure that you understand the terms of the agreement and protect yourself from potential problems down the line. Here are some tips for reviewing a roof replacement contract:

- · Verify the contractor's credentials.
- · Carefully read the entire contract.
- · Check the materials and scope of work.
- · Look for warranties and guarantees.



Schedule the installation

Keep in mind that a roof replacement can be very noisy. It's important to select a date that works well for you. If you work from home, consider choosing a day when you can work from another location to avoid distractions. Additionally, if you have pets, particularly those that are prone to anxiety, it's important to consider their needs and make arrangements. Finally, don't forget to inform your nearby neighbors of the installation timeline so they can also plan accordingly.



Pre-installation deliveries

As install day approaches, there will likely be deliveries to your property to support the job, such as shingles, a dumpster to dispose of old materials, or a portable toilet for the crew. Your contractor should keep you informed about when to expect these deliveries.



Prep the area

Fortunately, your roofing contractor can handle most of the details from here but there are a few things to keep the process moving smoothly.

- Make room for roofing materials and dumpsters. Be sure to move any vehicles to alternate parking areas.
- Move any outdoor décor items, such as planters, statues, or birdbaths to avoid accidental damage.
- Cover flowers and shrubbery.
- Discuss bathroom arrangements with your contractor, especially if you're not comfortable with workers entering your home



Installation

Once the roofing project begins, you can expect the work to progress swiftly. After the old shingles are torn off, here's what you can expect:

- Inspection of the roof deck this will be the first opportunity to assess the current condition of the roof deck.
- Any necessary repairs to the roof deck will be made
- Installation of drip edges to handle runoff
- · Underlayment installation
- New asphalt shingle installation
- Flashing, vent caps, and other roofing materials are added



After the install

- You and your roofing contractor should perform a final walk-through, discussing all parts of the project.
- Schedule an inspection if your locality requires it.
- Owens Corning Roofing Platinum
 Preferred Contractors may require a secondary inspection to be performed by an Owens Corning representative to inspect the quality of materials and installation.
