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INTEGRATED CARE RELATED:

- Future Health. Building new health system action to reduce obesity audit findings of

VIOLENCE:

NPCC. Violence Against Women and Girls (VAWG) National Policing Statement 2024. Shocking figures – at least 1 in every 12 women will be a victim of VAWG every year (2 million victims) and 1 in 20 adults in England and Wales will be a perpetrator of VAWG every year (2.3 million perpetrators). A coherent and robust whole-system approach is needed to prevent VAWG from happening in the first place- Call to action as VAWG epidemic deepens (news.npcc.police.uk)

- The Lancet. Changing patterns of health risk in adolescence: implications for health policy.
