PLEASE NOTE: You are responsible for being aware of all policies, information, and assignments listed on this syllabus. You are also responsible for all materials covered in class, regardless of your attendance, including assignment handouts provided throughout the semester. By remaining in this class, you are accepting this responsibility and agreeing to follow the course guidelines. Read each section carefully and contact me immediately with any questions you may have.

I. Objectives:

This is a required course to complete your undergraduate degree at Georgia State University. Over the course of the semester, you will be learning the following.

- The Distinctive Characteristics of the American System of Government and Politics and How It Compares to Other Countries' Systems.
- The Benefits Enjoyed by Citizens of Democratic Governments.
- The Principles and Structure of the U.S. Constitution & How It Has Developed Over Time.
- How and Why the Relative Power of the Different Levels of Government Have Changed Over Time.
- The History and Present Status of American Civil Liberties and Civil Rights.
- The Nature and Determinants of Public Opinion, and Its Impact on Government and Politics.
- Why and How Citizens Participate (Or Refrain from Participating) In Politics.
- American Political Parties, Their Origin, and Their Functions.
- The Nature and Impact of Interest Groups.
- How the Congress, President and Judiciary Operate and Interact to Enact, Implement and Define Laws and Public Policies.
- How to Effectively Use This Knowledge as Thoughtful Citizens Participating in American Democracy.

II. Announcements and Communications:

When I need to make announcements to the class as a whole, I will do so by posting an announcement on the class iCollege page. If I need to contact you individually, I will do so by messaging you using your GSU Email. You should be in the habit of checking your email *daily*, throughout the course of your tenure at Georgia State University. You can download the Outlook app on your phone or computer and connect with your GSU email. If you need to contact me, please use my email address: rluke2@gsu.edu. The iCollege email system is unwieldy, *thus the best way to get in contact with me is through email.*

If you have questions or issues *while purchasing an access key* from the Kendall Hunt Publishing website (this is explained below), please contact Kendall Hunt support at HelpDesk@kendallhunt.com. If you *have any other technical questions* related to the Realizeit adaptive learning system (discussed below), including *activating* your access key, please contact Realizeit technical support at helpdesk@realizeitlearning.com.

Please note: Since iCollege is essential for accessing course materials and receiving announcements, please contact me immediately if you lose iCollege access (due, for example, to being dropped for nonpayment) so that I can add you manually back into iCollege right away.

Electronic Devices:

As this is an online course, a computer with internet connectivity is a requirement. If you do not have a computer, the library has many which you can use. For the exams, laptop computers, cell phones, tablets, or other electronic devices are not allowed. Text messaging is also not allowed. Students that are caught using any of these devices during the exam will receive a zero for the exam and may be referred to the Dean's Office for cheating.

III. Required Textbook and Online Adaptive Learning Courseware:

The required e-textbook for this course (*Understanding the American Way of Government and Politics*) is published by Kendall Hunt Publishing and is embedded within the Realizeit adaptive learning system you will be using this semester. You will have automatic free access to the textbook in Realizeit through iCollege during the first two weeks of classes. To continue using it, by no later than Monday, January 28 you need to follow these instructions to purchase an access key and to activate it:

Step 1: Purchase an Access Key:

The first step is to purchase an access key. For this, there are two options: purchase directly from the publisher online or purchase through the GSU bookstore. The first option is the fastest, easiest, and cheapest option, so you probably should not choose the second unless you need to for financial aid reasons. Please note: if you face significant financial hardship rendering you unable to purchase by the end of the second week of the semester, please work with the Financial Management Center (FMC) to find a solution: <https://success.gsu.edu/initiatives/financial-management-center/>. If FMC cannot help you, you may need to drop the course and take it during a semester when you can afford to purchase this required WebText. (But please do not drop without discussing with me first.) If you are not facing significant financial hardship (according to FMC), then you will choose from one of these two options to purchase an access key:

Option A (Recommended): Purchase Access Key Directly from the Publisher:

To purchase directly from the publisher, please follow these instructions:

- (1) Follow this link: <https://he.kendallhunt.com/product/understanding-american-way-government-and-politics-2>
- (2) Click on “Add to Cart” (making sure the quantity is set to 1). This should send you to a new screen showing this publication in your cart.
- (3) Click on “Checkout.” This should take you to a login screen.
- (4) Unless you have or want to set up a Kendall Hunt account (and I doubt you do), then click on “Checkout without an account.” This will take you to a new screen, at the top of which it reads, “Kendall Hunt Store Checkout / STEP-1: PLEASE ENTER YOUR BILLING SHIPPING INFORMATION.”
- (5) On that screen, enter all the required information and please use your GSU student email address (____@student.gsu.edu) where it asks for your email address. For “Institution,” choose Georgia State University. Then click on “Continue to Next Step.” This will take you to a new screen, at the top of which it reads, “Kendall Hunt Store Checkout / STEP-2: REVIEW ORDER AND PAYMENT.”
- (6) On that screen, you should review your order (verifying the quantity and information are correct) and enter your credit or debit card information. After that, click on “proceed with purchase.” This will take you to a screen verifying purchase and providing you with an access key. You should also receive a confirmation email with the access key. Make sure to keep your access key.

If you experience technical difficulties *purchasing an access key* from the Kendall Hunt website, please contact Kendall Hunt technical support at HelpDesk@kendallhunt.com.

Option B (NOT recommended): Purchase Access Key from the GSU Bookstore:

This option is more complicated and expensive, so I do not recommend doing it unless you need to purchase books from the bookstore for financial aid reasons. If you must purchase from the bookstore, I recommend doing so at the physical bookstore if possible, instead of through the bookstore’s online service. If you purchase through the bookstore’s online service, they will mail you an access card, and that can take five days or even longer. (By contrast, if you follow Option A above and purchase directly from the publisher online, you will receive an access key instantly and at lower cost than the bookstore’s online option.)

Step 2: Activate your Access Key:

After you have acquired an access key (following one of the two options above), you need to activate the key. This is simple. Anytime you access a Realizeit module from within iCollege (which is explained below), you will be greeted by a pop-up window that asks for your access key (while indicating how many days you have until the free trial expires on 1/28). When you have a key, you simply enter it into that pop-up window and click “activate.” Then you will be all set (and you’ll stop getting the annoying pop-ups). If you do not activate before the deadline on 1/28, do not panic. Your access to Realizeit will be disabled, but all the work you completed before the deadline will be saved, and your access will be reenabled within eight business hours after you purchase and activate your key. If you experience technical difficulties *activating your access key* in Realizeit (or any other technical issues with Realizeit throughout the semester), then please contact Realizeit technical support at helpdesk@realizeitlearning.com.

V. Course Requirements and Graded Evaluations:

Your final grade will consist of five components. First, **1% of your final grade will be based on accurate completion of a syllabus quiz located on iCollege.** Second, **20% of your final grade will be based on required work you do each week** within the Realizeit adaptive learning system. Third, **14% of your final grade will be based on watching and completing the embedded questions in a series of video lectures.** Fourth, **60% of your final grade will be based on three multiple choice exams**, which you are required to take in a proctoring lab on campus, located in the Testing Center. Fifth, **5% of your final grade will be based an end-of-semester standardized Core Assessment Quiz that you will take online via iCollege.** Below you will find more information about the five required components of your grade:

1. *Syllabus Quiz (1%):* You will be taking a brief syllabus quiz on iCollege to verify your understanding and acknowledgement of the duties, structure, and requirements of this course. By completing this quiz, students accept the responsibilities laid out in the syllabus, and agree to abide by them. The syllabus quiz will be due on iCollege by 11:59pm on Saturday, January 26th.
2. *Realizeit Modules (20% of Grade):* Each week you will be working through one or two modules in the Realizeit adaptive learning system. Each module contains content from a textbook entitled *Understanding the American Way of Government and Politics*. To learn how to access and use Realizeit modules, you will need to watch a video called “WATCH FIRST: Realizeit Tutorial” that is available under the Content Browser in a folder called “Week 1.” After watching that video, you will learn more about the textbook content and more about the Realizeit system by doing the module called “Welcome Module” that is also available under the Content Browser in the folder called “Week 1.” This very short module provides an overview of the textbook—its focus, content, and style—and explains how its interactive and adaptive features (powered by Realizeit) can help with your learning if you use them correctly. The Welcome Module will also explain what a “composite score” is. This is important to know because about **16% of your final grade will be the average of the composite scores across all modules you complete in Realizeit.** Your composite score, you will learn, is based on the number of sections you complete within each module and the level of mastery you demonstrate (by answering the quiz questions within the system). **The other 4% of your final grade related to Realizeit will come from the Polls and Your View open-ended response questions that you will answer within the system as you engage with the content.** Polls allow you to express your opinions or judgments on

questions posed to all students in the class. After submitting your answer, you can click on “see results” to see how the rest of the class answered the question. I think you will find these polls to be fun and interesting. Your View questions allow you to develop and express your thoughts through writing. You should plan to write enough to adequately express your thoughts, but this should normally require no more than about 70 words and can often be expressed in well under that many words. So long as you submit a thoughtful answer (in my judgment), you will get full credit. You will automatically receive credit for each Your View question after submission, but I will adjust your score downward if the answer does not, in my judgment, reflect a requisite degree of thoughtfulness. (So when the system says “correct!” after you submit, please know that this does NOT necessarily mean you received full credit. You should interpret “correct!” as meaning “answer submitted.”) Your submission will be visible only to you and me. However, I will periodically select the most interesting and thoughtful responses to share with the class.

Again, all of these assignments are integrated within the Realizeit platform. The schedule at the end of this syllabus indicates when each module is due. Composite scores earned for each module will be posted in the iCollege grade book the morning after modules are due. Grades for Your View questions and Polls will not be recorded in iCollege until the end of the semester, but if you do not hear anything from me you can probably safely assume you are doing a satisfactory job completing the Polls and thoughtfully answering the Your View questions.

3. *Video Lectures* (14%): Active engagement is of particular import in all online courses. Therefore, a series of video lectures highlighting specific topics or concepts from the week’s reading will be posted on iCollege. Students must watch the entire lecture, and answer the questions embedded within. The graded element here is based on watching the entire lecture, not the accuracy of responses. Students should watch these lectures before completing the week’s reading and module. The deadline for completing these video lectures is the same as the readings; 11:59pm on the Saturday of the week in questions. Students should watch these video lectures before reading for the week. I advise students to complete both the Realizeit modules and the video lectures early in the week to avoid any technical difficulties. Late submissions will not be accepted.
4. *Section Exams* (60%): You will be taking three one-hour multiple choice exams in the designated class period. The exam on which you get the **highest score will be worth 30% of your final grade. Your second highest exam will be worth 20% of your final grade. And your lowest exam score will be worth 10% of your final grade.** Each exam will consist of approximately 50 multiple-choice questions and each will be non-cumulative i.e., each exam will focus only on the material in the unit just covered and not on material from previous units.

Exams will be administered in a proctoring lab located in Student Center East Room #315 over six-day exam periods during each of the three exam weeks. Long before each exam week, you will have the opportunity to reserve a 1-hour time slot for taking your exam in the proctoring lab. A lot of students want to take their exams on the last 2-3 days of exam weeks. If you are one of these students, **make sure to schedule your time slots weeks ahead**

of time because there is high demand and time slots fill fast. You almost certainly will not get the time slot you want if you wait until exam week to reserve a slot. This is especially the case with the last exam, which will take place during finals week when several other classes are using the lab. As soon as the first or second week of the semester, you will have opportunity to reserve all of your time slots for the semester all at once. I'll notify you on iCollege when this opportunity arises, and I encourage you to take advantage of it. Failure to take an exam due to the unavailability of space DOES NOT constitute a valid excuse.

Instructions for Scheduling and Taking an Exam in the Proctoring Lab in Student Center East Room #315:

To take an exam in the proctoring lab, you will need to schedule an exam time slot as soon as possible at this webpage: <https://www2.registerblast.com/gsucii/Exam/List>. For “Group,” choose “American Government – Section 003 - Spring 2019 Luke.” If you need to reschedule, please follow the instructions provided on that page. If you have technical issues while trying to register for an exam through Register Blast, please contact their customer support at support@registerblast.com. On exam day, please remember the following:

- Arrive 15 minutes prior to your scheduled exam time.
 - When you arrive at the testing center, you must check in at the front desk and present your GSU issued Panther ID card or Government issued ID card.
 - If you leave during the middle of an exam, you will not be permitted back into the testing environment.
 - You may NOT use textbooks, notes, or supplemental materials of any kind.
 - All electronic devices must be turned off for the duration of the test.
 - No talking is permitted with anyone besides the proctor.
 - There is no food or drinks allowed in the lab environment.
5. *End of Semester Standardized Exam (5%):* The final graded component will be a standardized 30-question exam that all POLS 1101 students at GSU Atlanta and GSU Perimeter are required to take during the last two weeks of the semester. This is referred to as the *Standardized Core Assessment*. You will take the multiple-choice exam online via iCollege. (It will not be proctored in person.) More information about this exam will be provided later in the semester.

Makeup Exams:

There will be no makeup exams. If you miss an exam, you will receive a zero. See “Problems and Emergencies” for the only exceptions to this rule.

Exam Review:

Although I do not publicly release exam questions and answers, I am happy to thoroughly review each exam with you in my office.

VI. Extra Credit Opportunities:

There will be two (and only two) extra credit opportunities this semester:

1. You may participate in GSU's Political Science Research Pool (PSRP) studies. These studies are conducted by faculty and graduate students at GSU. Students often find participation in PSRP studies fun and interesting. But, even if not, they are a great way to earn extra credit. You may earn up to 3 percentage points on your final percent for the course by participating in up to 3 hours of studies over the course of the semester. If you wish to participate, please read and follow the instructions in the brief pamphlet that is available in the Content Browser for our class in iCollege under the topic called "PSRP Extra Credit Pamphlet." You will want to do this as soon as possible so that you can participate in studies as soon as they become available.
2. During the last two weeks of the semester, you will have an opportunity to earn 2 extra percentage points on your final percent for the course by completing a 20-minute online survey. The purpose of the survey is for me to discover ways to improve the course in the future. More information will be provided when the survey becomes available.

Ws have no effect on your GPA whereas WFs count as Fs for GPA calculation purposes. If you are struggling in the course and are worried about keeping your HOPE Scholarship, then you should consider taking a W before 5:00pm on March 5. Please feel free to contact me for advice on this. Another kind of withdrawal, called “Hardship Withdrawals,” are only given if students experience non-academic emergencies beyond the midpoint of the semester which interfere with or prevent the completion of their coursework. Such hardships are usually due to medical, personal or financial emergencies, and are not to be used for academic issues. These withdrawals also do NOT count as F’s for GPA calculation purposes.

Privacy and Personal Information:

In keeping with USG and university policy, I will make every effort to maintain the privacy and accuracy of your personal information. Specifically, unless otherwise noted, I will not actively share personal information with anyone except university employees whose responsibilities require access to said records.
