# **Syllabus**

**Prerequisites**: None, this is an introductory, required course for all Georgia State students.

**PLEASE NOTE**: You are responsible for being aware of all policies, information, and assignments listed on this syllabus. You are also responsible for all materials covered in class, regardless of your attendance, including assignment handouts provided throughout the semester. By remaining in this class, you are accepting this responsibility and agreeing to follow the course guidelines. Read each section carefully and contact me immediately with any questions you may have.

## **Learning Objectives:**

This is a required course to complete your undergraduate degree at Georgia State University. Over the course of the semester, you will be learning the following.

- 1. The distinctive characteristics of the American system of government and politics and how it compares to other countries' systems.
- 2. The benefits enjoyed by citizens of democratic governments.
- 3. The principles and structure of the U.S. Constitution & how it has developed over time.
- 4. How and why the relative power of the different levels of government have changed over time.
- 5. The history and present status of American civil liberties and civil rights.
- 6. The nature and determinants of public opinion, and its impact on government and politics.
- 7. Why and how citizens participate (or refrain from participating) in politics.
- 8. American political parties, their origin, and their functions.
- 9. How the Congress, President and Judiciary operate and interact to enact, implement and define laws and public policies.
- 10. How to effectively use this knowledge as thoughtful citizens participating in American Democracy.

#### **Announcements and Communications:**

When I need to make announcements to the class as a whole, I will do so by posting an announcement on the class iCollege page. If I need to contact you individually, I will do so through your GSU email. You should be in the habit of checking your email *daily*, throughout the course of your tenure at Georgia State University. The iCollege email system is unwieldy, *thus the best way to get in contact with me is through email*.

**Please note:** Since iCollege is essential for accessing course materials and receiving announcements, please contact me immediately if you lose iCollege access (due, for example, to being dropped for nonpayment) so that I can add you manually back into iCollege right away.

## **Electronic Devices:**

As this is an online course, a computer, with internet connectivity, **and webcam**, are required. Due to the ongoing health crisis, the library is both closed and unable to loan computers. During the exam periods, communication with other students in the course is not allowed (including but not limited to texting, email, and WhatsApp). Students that are caught communicating with one another, regarding the exam, during the exam period will receive a zero for the exam and may be referred to the Dean's Office for academic dishonesty.

#### Required Textbook and Online Adaptive Learning Courseware:

The required e-textbook for this course (*Understanding the American Way of Government and Politics*) is published by Kendall Hunt Publishing and is embedded within the Realizeit adaptive learning system you will be using this semester. You will have automatic free access to the textbook in Realizeit through iCollege during the first week of classes. To continue using it, by no later than Sunday, May 17<sup>th</sup> (11:59 pm).

To purchase an access key and activate it, you should follow the instructions below:

## Step 1: Purchase an Access Key:

The first step is to purchase an access key. For this, there are two options: purchase directly from the publisher online or purchase online through the GSU bookstore. The first option is the fastest, easiest, and cheapest option, so you probably should not choose the second unless you need to for financial aid reasons.

Please note: if you face significant financial hardship rendering you unable to purchase by the end of the second week of the semester, please work with the Financial Management Center (FMC) to find a solution: <a href="https://success.gsu.edu/initiatives/financial-management-center/">https://success.gsu.edu/initiatives/financial-management-center/</a>. If FMC cannot help you, you may need to drop the course and take it during a semester when you can afford to purchase this required WebText. (But please do not drop without discussing with me first.) If you are not facing significant financial hardship (according to FMC), then you will choose from one of these two options to purchase an access key:

#### *Option A (Recommended)*: Purchase Access Key Directly from the Publisher:

To purchase directly from the publisher, please follow these instructions:

- 1. Follow this link: <a href="https://he.kendallhunt.com/product/understanding-american-way-government-and-politics-2">https://he.kendallhunt.com/product/understanding-american-way-government-and-politics-2</a>
- 2. Click on "Add to Cart" (making sure the quantity is set to 1). This should send you to a new screen showing this publication in your cart.
- 3. Click on "Checkout." This should take you to a login screen.
- 4. Unless you have or want to set up a Kendall Hunt account (and I doubt you do), then click on "Checkout without an account." This will take you to a new screen, at the top of which it reads, "Kendall Hunt Store Checkout / STEP-1: PLEASE ENTER YOUR BILLING SHIPPING INFORMATION."
- 5. On that screen, enter all the required information and please use your GSU student email address (\_\_@student.gsu.edu) where it asks for your email address. For "Institution," choose Georgia State University. Then click on "Continue to Next Step." This will take you to a new screen, at the top of which it reads, "Kendall Hunt Store Checkout / STEP-2: REVIEW ORDER AND PAYMENT."
- 6. On that screen, you should review your order (verifying the quantity and information are correct) and enter your credit or debit card information. After that, click on "proceed with purchase." This will take you to a screen verifying purchase and providing you with an access key. You should also receive a confirmation email with the access key. **Make sure to keep your access key**.

#### *Option B (NOT recommended)*: Purchase Access Key from the GSU Bookstore:

This option is more complicated, expensive, and will take longer. As such, I do not recommend doing it unless you need to purchase your books from the bookstore for financial aid reasons. If you must purchase from the bookstore, you will need to use the bookstore's online service. They will mail you an access card, and that can take five days or even longer, or email you the access code in an indeterminate amount of time (by contrast, if you follow Option A above and purchase directly from the publisher online, you will receive an access key instantly and at lower cost than the bookstore's online option.) If you must purchase from through the bookstore, **do so immediately** to avoid being disconnected from the textbook following the trial period of one week.

## **Step 2: Activate your Access Key:**

After you have acquired an access key (following one of the two options above), you need to activate the key. This is simple. Anytime you access a Realizeit module from within iCollege (which is explained below), you will be greeted by a pop-up window that asks for your access key (while indicating how many days you have until the free trial expires on 5/17). When you have a key, you simply enter it into that pop-up window and click "activate." Then you will be all set (and you'll stop getting the annoying pop-ups). If you do not activate before the deadline on 5/17, do not panic. Your access to Realizeit will be disenabled, but all the work you completed before the deadline will be saved, and your access will be reenabled within eight business hours after you purchase and activate your key. If you experience technical difficulties activating your access key in Realizeit (or any other technical issues with Realizeit throughout the semester), then please contact Realizeit technical support at helpdesk@realizeitlearning.com.

## **Course Requirements and Graded Evaluations:**

Your final grade will be calculated on the basis of four components. First, 5% of your final grade will be based on accurate completion of a syllabus quiz located on iCollege. Second, 15% of your final grade will be based on fully watching and accurately interacting with video lectures located alongside the Modules. Third, 40% of your final grade will be based on required work you do each week within the RealizeIt adaptive learning system (the Modules). Fourth, 40% of your final grade will be based on three multiple choice exams, which you are required do to during their respective exam periods. These exams will be conducted via iCollege. Below you will find more information about the three required components of your grade:

**Syllabus Quiz (5%)**: You will be taking a brief syllabus quiz on iCollege to verify your understanding and acknowledgement of the duties, structure, and requirements of this course. By completing this quiz, students accept the responsibilities laid out in the syllabus, and agree to abide by them. This quiz is open book, open note, and you have unlimited attempts. There is no reason you should not get 100% on this quiz. This quiz will also be conducted with Respondus so that you can test if your webcam and computer meet its requirements.

Video Lectures (15%): I have posted a series of video lectures on iCollege, integrated with the PlayPosit learning platform. PlayPosit essentially pauses these lectures at several points to ask questions of the viewer. These lectures cover specific aspects of the Modules that are more complicated or otherwise have given students issues in the past. Given the limited time we have, I feel that these lectures may will supplement the Modules and aid your comprehension of the material. These lectures are no longer than 15 minutes, with one lecture per module (or pair of modules). You will be graded primarily on the accuracy of your answers, as well as 'watch time.' Your highest attempt will be graded so you can attempt these lectures as many times as you wish, as well as review these lectures in preparation for the Exams without concern for lowering your grade. These Video Lecture are posted alongside their respective modules on iCollege in the 'Content' tab. The due dates for the Video Lectures are listed in the course schedule. You can watch these video lectures before, in the middle of, or after completing the related module – whichever works best for you.

RealizeIt Modules (40% of Grade): Each weekday you will be working through one or two modules in the Realizeit adaptive learning system. Each module contains content from a textbook entitled Understanding the American Way of Government and Politics. To learn how to access and use Realizeit modules, you will need to watch a video called "WATCH FIRST: Realizeit Tutorial" that is available under the Content Browser in a folder called "Week 1." After watching that video, you will learn more about the textbook content and more about the Realizeit system by doing the module called "Welcome Module" that is also available under the Content Browser in the folder called "Week 1." This very short module provides an overview of the textbook—its focus, content, and style—and explains how its interactive and adaptive features (powered by Realizeit) can help with your learning if you use them correctly. The Welcome Module will also explain what a "composite score" is. This is important to know because about 35% of your final grade will be the average of the composite scores across all modules you complete in Realizeit. Your composite score, you will learn, is based on the number of sections you complete within each module and the level of mastery you demonstrate (by answering the quiz questions within the system). The other 5% of your final grade related to Realizeit will come from the Polls and Your View open-ended response questions that you will answer within the system as you engage with the content. Polls allow you to express your opinions or judgments on questions posed to all students in the class. After submitting your answer, you can click on "see results" to see how the rest of the class answered the question. I think you will find these polls to be fun and interesting. Your View questions allow you to develop and express your thoughts through writing. You should plan to write enough to adequately express your thoughts, but this should normally require no more than about 70 words and can often be expressed in well under that many words. So long as you submit a thoughtful answer (in my judgment), you will get full credit. You will automatically receive credit for each Your View question after submission, but I will adjust your score downward if the answer does not, in my judgment, reflect a requisite degree of thoughtfulness. (So when the system says "correct!" after you submit, please know that this does NOT necessarily mean you received full credit. You should interpret "correct!" as meaning "answer submitted.") Your submission will be visible only to you and me.

Again, all of these assignments are integrated within the Realizeit platform. The modules are grouped into three units, and each unit (with its included modules) is due at the end of the week – Friday at 11:59 pm. The schedule at the end of this syllabus indicates these due dates. Composite scores earned for each module will be posted in the iCollege grade book the morning after modules are due. Grades for 'Your View' questions and 'Polls' will not be recorded in iCollege until the end of the semester, but if you do not hear anything from me you can probably safely assume you are doing a satisfactory job completing the Polls and thoughtfully answering the Your View questions.

#### The due dates for the Modules are listed in the course schedule.

**Section Exams (40%)**: You will be taking three one-hour multiple choice exams in the designated periods. Each exam is worth 10% of your final grade, with the exam you score highest on worth an additional 10%. For example, if you score 80% on the first two exams, and 90% on the third, the third exams will count for 20% of your final grade while the first two will count for 10% each. The exams are collectively worth 40% of your final grade. Each of the three section exams will consist of approximately 50 multiple-choice questions and each will be non-cumulative i.e., each exam will focus only on the material in the unit just covered and not on material from previous units. Given the abbreviated nature of this course, there will be no final exam. These exams are embedded within iCollege, and use the Respondus function to identify cheating.

Exams will be administered via the Respondus function in iCollege. Respondus operates as an automated proctor during your exam. It monitors both your screen activity and your physical behavior while taking the exam. I then review this footage to monitor for cheating. I understand that this may seem an invasion of your privacy, and I am both sympathetic to this and understand your concerns. However, this is the best available option for this course. I do not take privacy concerns lightly, and you should be confident that I will:

- A. Not share or otherwise show any footage to anyone but me, except in the case of academic dishonesty in which case this footage may be shown to the Dean's Office.
- B. Immediately delete any record of this footage from my computer following each exam period.

Please email me if you have privacy concerns, or otherwise wish to discuss these issues.

#### **Exam Review:**

Although I do not publicly release exam questions and answers, I am happy to thoroughly review each exam with you either by email, or via virtual (Skype, WebEx) meeting.

#### **Makeup Exams and Late Assignments:**

No late assignments will be accepted, and there will be no makeup exams. As this is an abbreviated course, you need to complete all assignments and exams in the period specified. This may seem harsh, but there is no time to catch-up once you fall behind. If you fail to complete a module before the deadline, you will receive a zero for that module but not for the entire unit. If you miss an exam, you will receive a zero. See "Problems and Emergencies" for the only exceptions to this rule.

### **Study Guides:**

I have posted Study Guides for each of the 3 Exams. I urge you to complete these *while* completing the modules. These Guides are a good way to structure your learning. Moreover, these Study Guides will prove an invaluable resource when preparing for the Exams. Everything that will be covered on the Exams is included in the Study Guides, although not everything on the Study Guides will be in the Exams. I urge you to download and print these out immediately and fill them out as you go along.

#### **Extra Credit Opportunities:**

As this is an online, abbreviated course, there will be no opportunities for extra credit. You should focus your efforts on completing the graded course components.

## **Cheating and Academic Misconduct:**

Academic integrity is fundamental to the process of learning and evaluating academic performance. Academic dishonesty will not be tolerated. Academic dishonesty includes, but is not limited to, cheating, plagiarism, tampering with academic records and examinations, falsifying identity, and being an accessory to acts of academic dishonesty. ## Policy on Missed Assignments & Deadlines:

There will be no makeup assignments or exams. If you miss an exam, you will receive a zero. If you are late to an exam period, you must take it in the time that remains when you arrive. If a problem or emergency arises that prevents you from attending an exam, you should contact me via email immediately. You will be expected to provide a university-approved excuse and documentation. My policy on the make-up exams is that the same material will be covered, but the questions will be harder and may include short answer or essay questions. Given the abbreviated nature of this semester, make up exams will rarely be given, and only for university approved and documented reasons. Late assignments WILL NOT be accepted.

#### Withdrawals and Hardship Withdrawals:

The last day to withdraw and receive a W is May 22<sup>nd</sup>. Students who withdraw on or before that day receive a W; students who withdraw after will receive a WF. Ws have no effect on your GPA whereas WFs count as Fs for GPA calculation purposes. If you are struggling in the course and are worried about keeping your HOPE Scholarship, then you should consider taking a W before 5:00pm on May 22<sup>nd</sup>. Please feel free to contact me before doing so for advice, as I will be able to offer you a clear accounting of where you stand in the course. Another kind of withdrawal, called "Hardship Withdrawals," are only given if students experience non-academic emergencies beyond the midpoint of the semester which interfere with or prevent the completion of their coursework. Such hardships are usually due to medical, personal or financial emergencies, and are not to be used for academic issues. These withdrawals also do NOT count as F's for GPA calculation purposes.
