## **RESTORATION — UPCOMING CLOSING**

Note that we are closed for maintenance and construction from September 9th through October 8th so that we can keep Dog Meadow in tip-top shape.

This summer has been one day after another filled with intense heat and very little rainfall. This causes the grass to go stale and turn yellow. Some spots have actually died due to a lack of water. Weeds are abundant, and this will cause a problem come the winter months. September is when we will close for an entire month to aerate and reseed. Hopefully, the weather will cooperate with some water. However, we may have to purchase some watering equipment since watering such a large area would simply be inefficient.

A large window will be installed that will have a view of the outdoors from the interior of the Dog Livingroom. This will allow more natural light into the space which we all love. Additionally, a new door, also with a window will be installed. All of this light will, of course, mean that the dogs may wake up sooner as these new openings face East. Oh boy!

As for daycare and boarding during that time, please make certain that you prepare with alternate daycare and boarding during the period that we are closed. We will resume on October 9. Let us know if you will need any recommendations. Phone calls and emails will be on a very limited return when we are closed.

#### WEE-WEE COMMAND — THE IMPORTANCE OF TRAINING

If you've ever had to wait for your dog before they would go to the bathroom or walk them for miles before they would go pee and wish you could tell them to go pee, well here is a really awesome little lifehack for you. Some people take their dogs out multiple times a day, yet their dog will refuse to relieve himself. He will want to chase bunnies or chase squirrels or birds and do other things. This command will cut down the time spent outside when it is necessary to do so.

It's actually one of the simplest things to teach a dog. Every time your dog goes to the bathroom, as soon as he's about to let loose, all you're going to do is say is "go wee-wee". People may look at you strangely, so you can use any word you want to forr the command. It is very important that you silently let them finish the task before praising them. As soon as they stand backup, reward them with a cookie or whatever treat is of high value to them.

Pretty soon they will make the connection and start to go to the bathroom, and actually come to you to get the cookie before you bring it out. With a puppy, it can take anywhere from 3 - 5 days. With older dogs, it can take a few weeks. Training is persistence and consistency. Keep at it and you'll both succeed. Then, one cold, rainy night when you are hoping to get the job done quickly, you can give the command and be on your way. Some other popular commands are "get busy" or "hurry up". Try to use a word that you don't normally use for other things.
