UPCOMING CLOSING

Note that we are closed for maintenance from July 21st to August 2nd so that we can keep Dog Meadow in tip-top shape.

Every now and then I get asked how it is that we keep Dog Meadow nice and green. Well, the answer isn't very simple. We DO NOT spray the meadow with chemicals that can make our dogs sick. So we end up with quite a bit of weeds throughout the property. Add to that the dogs going wee-wee, and you have a recipe for grass not doing too well. Sure it looks great when you're standing outside of it, but we have to put in some work to keep it beautiful. We will take some time this month to make some adjustments. The large-scale work will be in the month of September when we will close for an entire month to aerate and reseed. Hopefully, the weather will cooperate with some water.

Please make certain that you prepare with alternate daycare and boarding during these times. Let us know if you will need any recommendations. Phone calls and emails will be on a very limited return when we are closed.

THE IMPORTANCE OF TRAINING

Many people train their dogs when there are particular behavior problems at home, but training your dog is so useful in so many ways. Many don't realize that any training at all is helpful for many reasons. Whether you teach your dog to give you his paw, go to his place, sit, stay, roll over, or spin around, you are accomplishing a few important things:

- 1) you are strengthening your relationship with him
- 2) you are practicing communication with him
- 3) you are setting him up to be a "task-master"

This means that he will be well prepared in his life going forward with you to listen, learn, observe, and understand what is being requested of him. Part of what you are training your dog to do is to learn how to learn.

We have some clients that have started to practice agility with their dogs. This has inspired us to perhaps add some of this equipment to Dog Meadow to challenge our active guests in the future. In the meantime, we have a few interns now who play with the dogs during the day and structure some activities to keep them busy.

OUR LILY (LICK) PAD

While our athletic guests are busy, our very senior poodle, Lily, is turning 16 this fall and is declining rapidly. She is deaf, losing some strength, and suffers from dementia, a lung condition, and some incontinence. Fortunately, Laura is off work for the summer and is able to spend time with her. Lily still enjoys kisses, and most of all, eating. We've ordered her a lick mat for a special treat now that she doesn't get around much. Lick mats are an amazing invention in that they can occupy dogs for quite a while. Not only do they come in handy when crate training, but they are a great way to entertain a sedentary dog like Lily or one who is on restricted activity.

WATCH THEIR DIET

Most people make sure that they are either feeding their dog a well-balanced commercial dog food or a home-cooked balanced diet according to recommendations. However, many people give their dogs a lot of treats that are not nutritious. When you give someone a lot of treats, you are throwing off that balanced diet—much like when you eat balanced meals, but snack on too many chips and cookies in between.

The same goes for farm animals, who can be very sensitive to items that are not natural to their diet. Many people feed goats and sheep too much grain when they are better off just eating grass, hay, and weeds with barely any grain. In fact, goats and sheep are so sensitive that when fed the wrong thing, even on a single occasion, they can end up with deadly consequences. Yeah, I still hear about sheep and goat owners feeding them cookies or white bread, but that's not what is best for them.

As pet owners, we can responsibly control our pets' diets. The best way for us to do that is to choose a healthy balanced diet for them and to use pure food in small amounts for treats. Healthy treats would include tiny bits of leftover meat. (Not processed deli meat). We never throw a piece of meat away in our house. We recently took the roast beef from our intern's leftover sandwich, rinsed it well to get rid of any spices, and minced it up for dog treats. In moderation, fruits and vegetables make good treats as well, and with time you can usually get your dog to learn to like carrots, apples, or even zucchini. Cheese is another good occasional treat, only if used in moderation. Most of us would be better off if someone snatched the bag of tortilla chips out of our hands and gave us a carrot stick! The same goes for dogs.
