THE LOSS OF FRANKIE

On June 8 we lost a beloved rooster Frankie. Laura came home and discovered that Frankie did not greet her as she pulled into the driveway. He was attacked a killed by a dog that was loose in the neighborhood.

It's a great feeling when a pet greets you right away as you drive up to the house. Usually, it's the barking and jumping of a dog, but this greeting was very different. That's because the greeting came from a rooster and it was clucking, crowing, and circling that was performed. Frankie, a Buff Orpington, was adopted on Memorial Day weekend in 2022 at the age of twelve weeks old. He was young and as he matured and the pubescent hormones kicked in, he began to attack Laura. Curious about how to change this behavior, Laura joined a few groups and soon learned that picking him up and continually giving him attention would turn it all around.

Both Laura and I worked for weeks to train Frankie to be affectionate and for him to understand that we were his family. He was taken to outings and was known well at farmers' markets, outdoor eateries, and by the community

It really wasn't until we adopted and got to know Frankie that I knew how one could become attached to an animal. But those that have a pet and have a special bond with them completely understand it. Laura always has. When Frankie first started living in the house, he'd crow as early as 430 AM. We quickly got used to it, and most days, we slept through it since it didn't happen often. Shortly after we lost Lily, Frankie sat with Laura for the first time and asked for pets. It was a huge turning point in their relationship, and their connection became stronger. We connect with people all the time, and we get close.

There's always that person that will say "It was just a chicken!" Well, first of all, Frankie was a rooster, and interestingly enough, he had an amazing personality, and he understood that he was loved and he loved back. It wasn't the kind of love you

get from your spouse or daughter or even your parents. I can't even explain it, to be honest.

The dog that killed Frankie belonged to a gentleman who owned a landscaping company. After hearing about what had happened, he came to our door the following morning and genuinely and tearfully expressed his sympathy. He explained that he himself was an owner of pheasants and turkeys and understood our loss and what Frankie meant to us. Especially Laura. He expressed true regret about letting his dog run loose and said that he had learned his lesson. As we walked along the property with him, we came across a garden that we had been wanting to revamp. He offered to do it for us in Frankie's name. He invited us to his nursery to pick out some plants which he would plant in addition to some of the already existing plants. In the process, we learned that good people still exist in this world who are compassionate and genuine. As for the garden, it turned out quite nicely. The older centerpiece which is a white flowering bush, was relocated to another part of the property. We are looking to order a plaque that will tell a brief story of Frankie in his memory.

As much as we connect, we also lose connections. So many of us face challenges daily. No one said it would be easy, and all we can do is be strong, and if we can, be a strength for others. Thank you to those who have done that. Thank you to those who understand.

Following is a bit of history about the Library.

On November 6, 2018, the Pleasant Valley Library in Pleasant Vally, NY made news when it was in flames due to a fire that started in the basement. David Kruger, President of the library board of trustees noted on that Tuesday, for the first time in eight years, a proposition was on the ballots in Pleasant Valley to increase the library's annual funding by \$80,000 for a total operating budget of \$440,000.

He said they were looking for the funding "to maintain services offered."

"Then this morning, disaster struck. We are hoping there will be an upside at some point," he said.

With donations and funding for the renovation, the doors reopened on January 3, 2023. It is 4 times the size, with one-quarter of the original structure kept intact.
