Whether you have a Labmix, Pitmix, or an exuberant doodle, your dog will probably require a trial day to see if they are ready to join our pack.

COVID -19 | NEW PUPS | TRIAL DAYS

At Dog Meadow, we provide dog daycare and cageless dog boarding for all types of well-socialized dogs. Your dog may have gone to a dog park or perhaps stayed at home with a family member overnight, but that does not mean they are wellsocialized. Additionally, the covid pandemic has brought an influx of new dog adoptions and with it, dogs that may not have had the opportunity to learn proper socialization. The pandemic has also created a lapse in the ability to provide continued socialization for many dogs. Therefore, your dog may have a trial day to evaluate if he is a good fit. During the trial, we look for not only signs of aggression but other behavior that indicates he is not a good fit. These signs may even include puppy-like exuberance, which is often expressed by leaping on us (not a problem at all) but also expressed often by leaping on other dogs. Due to this lack of social experience, when dogs correct him with a growl or bark at times when they don't feel up to playing, he may not get the message and may continue to throw himself at them continually. Sometimes, when a dog gets comfortable in a situation, this kind of behavior can accelerate before he learns to control it. We may recommend a dog go to a more controlled environment to acquire social skills. Other signs can include

anxiety, fear, resource guarding (possessiveness), and simply being over dominant. Prey drive plays a deciding factor as well since we are a farm and have quite a few farm animals in proximity to the Meadow. If a dog continually charges the animals then he will more than likely not be a good fit. Finally, during a trial, if your dog lacks the basic command of coming when called, they may be put on a line. (We explain why we do this on our website). Our goal is to create a stress-free relaxed environment where all dogs can play safely.

PARENTS WEEKEND

We welcomed the parents of our interns during Parents Weekend at The Maplebrook School in Amenia. Eliza first came to us in the summer, while Morgan recently joined us at the start of the school year in September. Both play a huge role in assisting with the dogs. Helping with socialization and correcting behavior as well as playing with them are important to all of these pups. More importantly, is the human connection that is added on a daily basis. They give the dogs lots of attention and love and plenty of belly rubs.

While visiting Dog Meadow, both sets of parents were very pleased with what their child was experiencing. According to Eliza's dad, "This is the best thing that's happened to her. It has completely changed her. She so happy and enthusiastic." I can add that she has become a great multi-tasker and continues to learn the skill of watching for details pertaining to each dog. Additionally, she has learned some management skills. Morgan's parents were ecstatic about the dogs and the beauty of

the property. Her dad's reaction was that "Morgan loves it here so much! She can't stop talking about it." Morgan does, in fact, love it here. She loves that she continues to learn skills in dog interaction: the difference between rough-housing and the fine line being crossed into a possible fight; how puppies interact with older dogs and their "corrections" of them; and simple dog training with the dogs that lack recall.

My past experience with interns in the corporate world was very different as most came with experience. Training these young students has taught me patience and fine-tuned my decision-making on what to delegate. Whether teaching them simple training methods or what to look for when playing with a kong, it's important that they receive clear direction on what should be done. I also put them into possible scenarios and quiz them to ensure they are learning.

The Maplebrook School is designed for students that may take different paths to achieve the goals of other students. The school provides a nurturing environment where each student can feel comfortable to succeed each day with positive support and an exciting, challenging curriculum. We're happy to be a part of Eliza's and Morgan's education.

DOG TRAINING

Training tip: Practicing fetch will accelerate your bond with your dog and give you the simplest possible way to get the excess energy out on your terms. However, next time you're out playing fetch, take the opportunity to teach and/or reinforce commands such as wait, sit and come.

If there is one thing that can be said about "proper" training, it's that every trainer believes they use the best method. Whether the person is educated, famous, has years of experience, or simply reads a lot, they will believe that their ways of training are the most effective ones. However, properly training your dog has little to do with your knowledge of dog training, and more to do with how well you know your dog.

Like children, every dog will learn differently, and you must work with their capabilities to train them successfully. Without first understanding your dog, you are setting everyone up for failure. Once you feel like you know your dog, his behavior, what needs to be addressed, and how he retains information the best, you will be able to begin the training process.

There are many labels for different methods of training such as "positive reinforcement", "correction", "negative reinforcement", "behavior adjustment training", etc. Many people believe that one, some, or none are better than others, but the key to properly training your dog is combining them based on what you know about your dog's learning capabilities.

There is a large difference between behavioral adjustment training and abuse. You should never inflict pain upon your dog as a means of training. If you are unsure of whether or not you are capable of training your dog properly, consult a professional.

We had a couple of medical issues with our farm animals this month. Candy, Laura's beloved chicken, suffered from an illness that ended up being unknown to the vets that treated her. We nursed her for a while and had one nice last afternoon with her, but had to have her put down in the end.
