The inherent risks include, but are not limited to any of the following: the propensity of an animal to behave in ways that may result in injury, harm, death or loss to persons on or around the animal; the unpredictability of an equine's reaction to sounds, sudden movement, unfamiliar objects, persons or other animals; hazards, including but not limited to, surface or subsurface conditions, a collision, encounter and/or confrontation with another equine, another animal, a person or an object; the potential of an equine activity participant to act in a negligent manner that may contribute to injury, harm, death, or loss to the participant or to other persons, including but not limited to, failing to maintain control over an equine and or failing to act within the ability of the participant. If a horse is frightened or provoked it may divert from its training and act according to its natural survival instincts which may include, but are not limited to, stopping short; spinning around; changing directions and or speed at will; shifting its weight; bucking; rearing; kicking; biting; and or running from danger. I/We also acknowledge that these are just some of the risks

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and I/We agree to assume others not mentioned above. I/We am (are) not relying on Challenge Unlimited, Inc., Ironstone Therapy, Inc. and/or Ironstone Farm to list all possible risks for me.

2022 Advanced Summer Clinic Descriptions

Please be advised, rider must be at the walk/trot/canter level in order to participate in these programs

Jumping Clinic (Parts 1 - 6)

This clinic will be offered on most Friday mornings, and will be a progression clinic. If you want to participate in the final 2 clinics, you must take at least 2 of the first parts, in order to make sure you progressed safely, and have all the tools necessary.

Part One: Intro to Jumping - Learning proper equitation in an english saddle, without the jump factor.

Part Two: Single Fences - Utilizing the proper equitation skills developed to go over a jump at the trot and canter **Part Three:** Intro to Lines & Bending Lines - Learning how to appropriately approach a jump, where to start, finish, and aim for jumps that may have different lines, or changes in direction.

Part Four: Jumping Gymnastics - A series of consecutive poles or jumps in a straight line, of all heights, that encourage our horses to set into a rhythm and pick up their feet to a certain stride.

Part Five & Six: Jump Course - Combining every skill from prior clinics to successfully complete a jump course at the trot and then the canter.

Gymkhana

Gymkhana is a speed game based class, where clients will be able to participate in all sorts of games that require focus, agility, and fundamentals of riding. Some of these games include barrel racing, pole bending, turn n' burn, keyhole, musical stalls, relay race, pony soccer, and more! Riders will participate in the games at the level in which the instructor deems appropriate. This will depend on horse assignment and is subject to vary each time a client participates.

GroundWork Clinic

Groundwork is a foundation of how to train a horse, and a super important aspect of horsemanship when working on communication and confidence. Riders will start in the round pen using At Liberty as a way to communicate and train the horse. Once they have developed a strong foundation in the round pen, they will move on to lunging in the round pen, white ring, and arena. The last part of groundwork that will be focused on is flagging, and other desensitizing agents while riders are handwalking the horse. It is highly recommended that this course is taken multiple times in order to see improvement and build a strong bond and foundation with your project horse.

Drill Team Clinic

Our Drill Team clinic is one the most popular activities we offer here at Ironstone. In this, we are teaching riders synchronized riding on horseback to high energy, upbeat music. This is a great way to improve your riding skills, as all fundamentals of riding are needed. Controlling speed, being spatially aware, pivoting, turning, weaving through other horses, while performing a complex routine.

Farm/Trail Walk

This class will be a fun way to tour the farm. We will be taking a trail walk all over the property, in areas other than where we normally ride. These walks will be on and off horseback. We will learn how to confidently walk our horses into different/new situations as well as learn how to get them to trust us. Some of these off roading

adventures include climbing stairs/ramps, walking into the gazebo, off the path in front of the farm horse, behind and around the pond, up the driveway, through part of our rail trail/woods. Riders will have to be experienced and confident to handle possible high stress situations, a great skill to learn and carry with you into other classes!

Mounted Desensitizing

This is our most advanced class that we will be offering this summer. All levels of the advanced HMS program are welcome to take it, but some will be participating more than others due to the advanced skill needed. This class will be all about desensitizing a horse to first party and third party noises, movements that are outside the norm while a rider is on their backs. This will be done with a flag and other outside factors. Riders will learn how to focus horses, and ride them through intimidating obstacles, that may include weird noises, sounds, movement, and smell. This class is also recommended to take multiple times in order to experience full progression.

Western/ English Dressage

This clinic will be based around the riding mechanics of Dressage, an eventing category in both the English and Western world. Dressage is all about body mechanics, and communication to your horse on how you would like their body to move. It's a style of riding that includes many transitions, lateral movement, as well as figures at the walk, trot, and sometimes canter. Riders in this clinic will work on accuracy and precision of the above categories, improving their overall riding equitation and communication to their horse. We have split up the clinics because there are some areas of western dressage that do not correlate with English aside from the saddle, so please make sure you sign up for the appropriate one.

Farrier's Clinic

This new clinic will offer the opportunity for riders to learn all about hoof care, how to handle feet, and eventually how to shape, contour, and correct their feet using farrier tools. Someday's this clinic might work on manners of a horse while getting their feet done, other days may consist of going over how to clip off and round off a hoof with a chip in it.

English/Western Apprentice Clinic

Riders will get the opportunity to experience what it is like to be an instructor in this simulated lesson clinic. Riders will take turns teaching a lesson plan to one another as if they were part of an apprenticeship program. This is a great clinic for anyone who is interested in pursuing horses as a career, or going to college. It is a great skill to have being able to read horse body language when another rider is mounted, as well as pointing out areas of equitation improvement, and coaching someone through an exercise.

Pond Excursion

We are excited to be able to offer one of our biggest hits from last summer! Riders will get to experience walking horses through our pond, something that they never do. This experience will teach riders how to form trust and respect with horses, enough so that they are willing to carry them into a body of water, with funny footing in an unfamiliar area. It is a great confidence builder, and a great way to bond with our equine.



IRONSTONE FARM SAFETY REGULATIONS

PLEASE READ CAREFULLY

The following regulations have been established for your safety and the safety of all involved in the activities at Ironstone Farm. Please make every effort to abide by them during your time on the premises.

SMOKING: There is **NO SMOKING** allowed on the property of Ironstone Farm.

CHILDREN: Ironstone is a working farm. We insist that all children, when not involved in a lesson, remain beside their accompanying adult. Running, yelling, or unaccompanied children can create hazardous situations – for themselves, riders, handlers, staff, and other visitors at the farm. Please observe (or ask about) designated areas for viewing lessons. If children behave in an unsafe manner, we may ask you to remove them from the premises.

PETS & SERVICE ANIMALS: The animals at Ironstone Farm live in harmony with one another and the introduction of a new animal is handled very carefully. Visiting pets will upset this harmony and can be very disruptive, creating an unsafe situation. Please leave your pet(s) at home. With regards to service animals, please check with the office before visiting the farm.

TREATS: Our animals are on a routine feeding schedule. Their daily intake is carefully monitored. Treats may be harmful to some animals, and hand-feeding encourages the animals to bite in search of treats and can be dangerous. Please do not feed the animals.

PARKING: Please park in designated areas only. Observe the "No Parking" signs and spaces allotted for the pick-up and drop-off of clients. Please do not sound your horn/car alarm while on Ironstone Farm property! Sudden loud noises may frighten the animals residing at the farm as well as clients participating in therapy.

UMBRELLAS: Please do not use umbrellas on the property. The odd shape and sudden movement of opening/closing an umbrella can startle our horses.

THE BARN: The upper barn is a staff-only area. If you need to reach someone in the barn office, please call us at 978-475-4056, or ask a present staff member to contact us for you.

OBSERVATION: Our instructors and therapists are trained professionals. Please remain outside the teaching area during lessons. You are invited to watch from designated areas.

PADDOCK: Only Staff, Working Students, and Feeders (all of whom must have Paddock Privileges) are allowed in the Paddocks. *Volunteers and visitors are not allowed to enter the Paddocks for any reason.*
