

Before embarking on furthering his education, he accepted mobilization orders in the Navy, in an active-duty capacity, for 6 months starting in July 2024. He is only authorized to tell us that he will effectively be a uniformed liaison between the joint forces and whatever merchant ship he is dispatched to. He's proud that he can leverage his merchant mariner background in this highly important exercise. For his safety, he will not reveal the nature of his mission or the routes that he may be assigned to further than that. He hopes to reconnect with us and the wider graduate network during the next Pig Dinner in 2025
