 Monet: Known for their high-quality metalwork and timeless designs, Monet jewelry remains popular among vintage jewelry collectors.



 Lockets and Sentimental Jewelry: Antique lockets, often in gold or silver and sometimes containing photos or hair, hold both sentimental and collector value. Sentimental jewelry like 'love knot' designs or pieces with hidden messages also appeal to collectors.



• Charm Bracelets: Vintage charm bracelets are highly collectible, especially those that feature unique or numerous charms. Charms can range from travel souvenirs to family heirlooms, and bracelets that tell a story or represent a particular era are particularly sought after.
