The Community Participation event on Saturday 11 May at the Village Hall was well attended and showcased the various groups in Eton Wick. I spent quite a lot of time looking through the photo albums of the History Group showing Eton Wick over the last 100 years or so - really interesting stuff! The Allotment Association sold their plants outside and were really pleased with how it all went.

Eton Wick Waterways Group (EWWG) were also at the Community Participation Event answering queries about the wildlife supported by the waterways that surround our village, plus talking to residents about the recent flooding and sewage release issues. EWWG lead, Laura Regazzacci, is working tirelessly with our local councillor Mark Wilson, and others, to address the issues faced by local residents due to effluent dumping by Thames Water and flooding in gardens backing onto our village waterways. Laura and Mark are in constant dialogue with Thames Water and the Environment Agency.

The very successful children's football tournaments are back for another year on Sunday mornings during May and June, and the Youth Club on a Monday night continues to go from strength to strength. We also have the excitement of the forthcoming Corner Café at Bell Lane which will hopefully open at the end of June. Umit and his wife will be living in the flat above the shop with their children and supplying us with coffee and pastries. They are in the shop most days getting it ready so do pop over to say hi.

There is a planned litter pick in the next few weeks and the Bell Lane space will continue to be tidied and kept neat by volunteers.

In the next week or so a survey will be delivered to all homes in Eton Wick. This survey will enable residents to have an input into what is happening in Eton Wick. What is good, what is not so good, and what you would like to see going on. Please do take the time to complete the survey, even if you think your ideas may not be possible, or silly. Date for your diaries - Eton Wick Christmas light switch-on will be Saturday 30 November 2024



The Environment Agency (EA) finally erected an electric fence along the east side of the Roundmoor from the top of the common down to the cattle grid. This was not done to protect the cattle from the poisonous pollution that is still hanging around on the banks and the vegetation in the Roundmoor, but because they have won the legal case with the landowner to restrain cattle from breaking down the banks along this stretch (AKA Cattle Poaching). Note that cattle are still roaming other areas of the common that are flooded with polluted water.

Once again, we are seeing the level of water in our streams rise. This event occurs every spring and explains why we have water holding back on the common, making the lake even bigger than in winter. It is also the cause of the growing marsh on the field north of Colenorton Crescent, which then drains into the Colenorton Ditch and leads to flooding of the Moores Lane footpath. Councillor M Wilson is on the case with Slough Borough Council, who are responsible for this footpath, to find an immediate solution that will allow our residents to access Slough on foot, with mobility aids or bicycles. A team of independent scientists monitoring the rise and fall of water levels across our network for the past two years, using static monitors and visual evidence has shown that our river levels react significantly to the overgrowth of weed from April onwards with an equally significant drop in level after removal of weed in June and September.

We have been making EA flood officers aware of the flooding especially in the gardens of Lower Tilstone Close, Cornwall Close and Queens Road, by taking them to see it for themselves. We have pleaded for an earlier start to the weed pulling but have met with stubborn resistance due to the fisheries policy of not allowing working in rivers until the end of the spawning season (mid-June), even though the local angling association agree that some sections of the river should form the exception to this rule.

Because our group refused to enter the water due to the sewage release in January – March, Thames Water have agreed to undertake the weed clearance along the entire length of both the Roundmoor and the Boveney this year. The first cut will take place from 16 June when spawning season ends, and the second cut late August/early September.

This summer our group of volunteers will be continuing to monitor the streams and remove impediments to flow where we can access from the banks. We will organise litter picking events and take part in the annual 'Plastic Blitz' together with Wild Eton Wick and the Windsor River Watch group. We also hope to resume river fly testing and water testing for pollutants over the summer months once the sewage sediment has had a chance to flow away when the weed is cut.

There has been local concern about the flooding of fields around the village, where marshes have become established this year, notably to the south of the Boveney. The reason for this is to some extent due to the Boveney breaking its banks in January-February, but mainly because ground water levels remain high across all flood plains in the area and are unlikely to drain until a longer spell without rain. Climate change and wetter winters are said to be the cause. In our local catchment this is exacerbated by the high volume of water we receive from Slough Sewage treatment works, a situation which is becoming intolerable. There is some speculation that since the Jubilee was created, the flood plain has altered. This is unproven, but a scan of historic google earth maps from 2003 give some indication of the changes that have been taking place in our locality.

We ask residents to continue to put pressure on Thames Water and the Environment Agency to address the issue of both pollution and flooding and with elections coming up to also direct questions about flooding and pollution to the parliamentary candidates while they are out canvassing or at hustings.

The EA have responsibility to respond to incidents on main rivers, which include the Boveney and Roundmoor, including the following:

- collapsed or badly damaged riverbanks
- damage or danger to the natural environment
- dead fish or fish gasping for air
- flooding from main rivers or the sea

- people taking water illegally from rivers, streams, canals or underground sources such as wells
- incidents at Environment Agency-regulated waste sites
- main rivers blocked by a vehicle or fallen tree causing risk of flooding
- poaching or illegal fishing
- pollution to water or land
- unusual changes in river flow

PCSO Dave Bullock and PCSO Lewis Phillips held a community meeting on Friday 17 May for Eton Wick residents living in roads with frequently reported parking issues. The meeting was attended by residents from Alma Road, Inkerman Road, Northfield Road, and

Haywards Mead. RBWM Cllr. Mark Wilson joined the PCSO's to help facilitate the session.

The PCSO's advised that they have powers to deal with serious obstructions (including pavement parking), non-compliance with traffic signs, and double yellow line parking (although RBWM's parking wardens, NSL actually give out the tickets).

Community members advised that hot spots for parking issues included, but were not limited to :-

- Parking outside No. 3 Inkerman Road obstructing access to Northfield Road
- Haywards Mead particularly on "perfect storm" occasions eg events at Village Hall, Church, and football matches
- Sheepcote Road at school drop-off and collection times

Cllr Wilson and the PCSO's undertook to investigate options to ensure access is maintained, especially for emergency vehicles eg ambulance or fire brigade.

Cllr Wilson advised he would raise all issues with Neil Walter at RBWM Highways, and work to progress proposed improvements to Eton Wick parking that were submitted to RBWM by the Highways & Footpaths working group of Eton Town Council earlier this year.
