



GHC does a majority of its work within western Kenya, primarily in the Kisii, Nyamira, and Homa Bay Counties. We just initiated a new, pilot CHEC in Kajiado County and one on Mfangano Island, on Lake Victoria.

What is a "Self-Sustaining Village? GHC's goal is to empower villages to become self-reliant. Initially, villages receive comprehensive support (active phase). Over time, through capacity building and resource development, they transition to managing their affairs independently (self-sustaining phase), reflecting the success of GHC's empowerment model.



OUR PROGRAMMATIC SOLUTION

24 Week Health Curriculum

Our 24-Week Program covers topics such as WASH (Water, Sanitation, and Hygiene), nutrition, disease prevention, and more.

We train CHEC members on the importance of sanitation, hygiene, nutrition, and disease prevention. To measure behavior change, we compare and analyze data collected through our baseline, midline, and endline survey tools.

Additionally, we focus on building model kitchen gardens, latrines, and tippy tap handwashing stations.



10 Week Economic and Curriculum

Our 10-Week Program covers topics such as entrepreneurship, financial literacy, and business financing.

Each village has its own unique needs and resources. Our team carefully considers existing conditions, terrain, and population to determine which economic programs will best serve each community. As a result, a variety of projects—such as beekeeping, soap making, chicken farming, and Napier grass cultivation may be implemented.

NYAMECHO CHEC: A SUCCESS STORY



- Baseline surveys revealed challenges with clean water, nutrition, and sanitation, but the community demonstrated a strong commitment to growth and improvement.
- Members received training in essential health skills, including making detergent, constructing kitchen gardens, and building latrines and shower stalls.
- 70 members successfully graduated from the 24-week health curriculum and advanced to financial literacy training, ultimately choosing beekeeping as their incomegenerating project.
- The group established a thriving 50hive apiary, with eight trained apiary managers leading sub-groups in hive maintenance, inspection, and honey harvesting.
- Nyamecheo's dedication, resilience, and achievements position it as one of our most impactful and promising CHECs.

APIARY: ECONOMIC EMPOWERMENT

All 70 members of the Nyamecheo CHEC chose beekeeping as their incomegenerating project. Together, they built a thriving apiary on land generously donated by one of their members. We trained eight dedicated apiary managers, each overseeing a sub-group of 8–9 members. These sub-groups are responsible for maintaining, inspecting, and harvesting honey from 6–7 hives each.

GHC has supported ten villages in establishing apiaries and trained 64 apiary managers in collaboration with the National Institutes of Beekeeping. Across these villages, we now have 450 hives and over 670 club members actively engaged in beekeeping.

In our second year, we successfully harvested and sold over 415 liters of honey, and we project a harvest exceeding 1,700 liters in 2025. The revenue generated will offer a sustainable and supplemental income source for these communities.

Additionally, we are fostering native pollinator habitats and enhancing biodiversity to support both honeybees and wild bee species.

GREENER HILLS HONEY

Economic empowerment is a core pillar of the GHC CHEC model. Through Greener Hills, we've created an opportunity for CHEC members to generate income, while contributing to environmental sustainability through beekeeping.

As a supporting organization of Global Health Connections, Greener Hills supports members in:

- Building apiaries and providing beekeeping training.
- Harvesting, processing, and selling honey under the Greener Hills Honey Cooperative label.
- Sharing profits directly with villages.



Our Impact So Far:

- Built 10 apiaries with 460 hives; 4 are now operating independently and sustainably.
- 64 trained apiary managers and 670+ members engaged in beekeeping.
- Harvested over 415 liters in 2024 and estimate more than double that in 2025.

It's a win-win model—sustainable for both people and the planet.

Expanded Our Reach: Launched 4 new CHECs, including 2 remote pilot projects, bringing our total to 19 villages, with 15 actively engaged.

Proven Impact: Endline survey data from 3 villages show significant improvements in health, economic, and social indicators, confirming sustainable behavior change.

Thriving Enterprises: Income-generating projects like beekeeping, rice farming, tailoring, and quarry mining continue to flourish, with members also starting their own small businesses.

Collective Growth: Merry-go-round funding and table banking have helped members purchase goats, mattresses, and household essentials, improving their quality of life.

Strengthening Leadership: 5 villages are now selfsustaining, and active CHEC committees are learning to lead and manage operations independently for long-term success.



ORGANIZATIONAL ACCOMPLISHMENTS

- Launched two pilot projects in 2024, with CHECs led by local instructors trained remotely by GHC on the CHEC model—empowering community leaders to drive change.
- Greener Hills Honey Cooperative currently manages over 380 hives across six apiaries, with four now operating independently and sustainably
- Strengthened governing boards in Denver and Kenya with key new members in 2024. Improved financial sustainability through grants (Rotary, Google), donations, and Adopt-a-Village.
- Developed a CHEC 'product' solution over several months to help other organizations replicate the CHEC model.
- Statistical analysis of CHEC programs shows:
 Significant positive impacts on health behaviors.
 Improved economic stability for households.

 - Empowerment of women at the household and village level.

 Decreased incidence of domestic violence at the household and village level.



2024 FINANCIAL SUMMARY




- Total Operating Expenses: \$ 148,583.57
 - Total Revenue: \$202,347.46
- We keep our operating costs in both Denver and Kenya as low as possible. In Denver, these costs primarily cover extensive village surveys, detailed data analysis, and operational expenses.
- Most grants and donations go directly toward establishing new villages, supporting economic projects, covering ongoing village expenses, and providing direct assistance to these initiatives.
- Adopt-a-Village and Apiary sponsors play a crucial role in sustaining the operations of their sponsored villages.
- A \$96,000 18-month Rotary International Global Grant received in August 2024 is **not** included in our operating expenses and revenue. These funds, kept in a separate account, are designated for four new CHECs. By the end of 2024, we had spent approximately \$27,000 of this grant.









- **Expanding Our Reach:** Offering our proven CHEC model as a replicable package to other organizations, enabling them to implement the approach in their own communities and scale its impact globally.
- Raising Awareness: Amplifying understanding of GHC's impactful CHEC model and its transformative results.
- **Sharing Our Impact:** Publishing data-driven results in a new book, which will showcase improvements in household health, financial stability, and empowerment through CHEC programs.
- Strengthening Leadership: Empowering Sustainable Governance Committees across all CHEC villages to ensure long-term self-sufficiency and leadership continuity.

- Growing Support Networks: Expanding our Adopt-a-Village/Apiary program with 2-3 additional sponsors to support CHEC growth.
- Enhancing Social Enterprises: Advancing incomegenerating projects such as honey processing, poultry farming, and fish farming to boost local economies. These enterprises not only improve household incomes but also contribute to GHC's long-term organizational sustainability.
- Building Strategic Partnerships: Collaborating with leading organizations like Center for Global Health at UC Denver, Organic Health Response, HEART Africa, Rotary International, AquaClara, and National Beekeeping Institute to maximize our impact.
