


To connect, engage, and empower individuals to improve the health and economic sustainability of their community.

Program Details

24 Week Health Curriculum

Our 24 Week Program includes such topics as WASH, Nutrition, Disease Prevention and more.

We train CHEC members on the importance of sanitation and hygiene, given that health only gets better when all of these factors improve. We also spend time on building kitchen gardens, latrines and wash stations.

10 Week Economic and Social Impact Curriculum

Our 10 Week Program includes such topics as Entrepreneurship, Financial Literacy and Business Financing.

Every village has unique needs and resources. Our team takes into account existing conditions, terrain, and population as we determine which economic programs will best serve each individual community. This means a variety of different projects—beekeeping, soap making, millet farming, and more—are implemented.

Village Highlight MOKUBO

Mokubo Village, iin Kisii County, is where it all started for Global Health Connections. We began our first CH&EC in December 2020 and graduated 145 members, 80% of whom were women, in July 2021 from the health training program.


125 of these graduates went on to complete the 10-week Economic Empowerment curriculum and 119 members are currently involved in one of many economic projects.

The Soap Making Group has repaid ¼ of their loan in cash thus far. They have become a registered business in Kenya and have opened their own bank account, giving them the option sell soap anywhere in Kenya. They were just awarded a contract to nd they just got a contract with the Mokubo Secondary School to supply soap for them for the year.

Each member was also able to purchase a chicken from their own savings.







Successes MOKUBO

The Napier Grass Group, comprised of 12 women have surpassed all expectations. With the money from the first two harvests in January and April, they were able to buy 8 goats. Their 3rd harvest will be in July and with this money they will pay for the land lease for next year plus buy 4 more goats for remaining members. They are truly an inspiration.

Successes MOKUBO

The Soap Making Group, comprised of 13 members, has repaid 1/4 of their loan in cash thus far. They have become a registered business in Kenya and have opened their own bank account, giving them the option to sell soap anywhere in Kenya. They were recently awarded a contract with the Mokubo Secondary School to supply soap for them for the year. Each member was also able to purchase a chicken from their own savings.





Village Opportunity BIOMBE

Biombe, a village comprised of 6000 inhabitants, is Global Health Connections 2nd village. We recently decided to make Biombe Village our model Beekeeping community. This region of western Kenya is densely covered with vegetation and has the perfect climate for raising bees. There were also many CHEC members with existing knowledge about bees, thus providing the perfect environment for GHC to start an apiary.

We teamed up with KARI - Kenyan Agricultural Research Initiative – to help assist and provide expertise on beekeeping, apiary construction, and honey and wax extraction. We hired a local KARI expert to help us full-time train the members and manage the apiary as well.

We currently have 80 beehives in the apiary and will start collecting honey and wax for processing this summer.

Operations

GHC's mission is focused on empowering individuals from a health, economic and social perspective. From day one, we've relied on generous private donors to fund our operating expenses. It hasn't been easy, but it's an approach we believe in deeply. And our commitment to maintaining this inspires support from passionate donors, enthusiastic fundraisers, long-standing clubs, and loyal volunteers—a community that believes, as we do, that teaching and empowering is the way towards a sustainable and prosperous future.

Financials

TOTAL BUDGET FOR 2022: \$ 129,383

We do our best to keep our operating costs in both Denver and Kenya as low as possible. Operating costs in Kenya include the extensive surveying we do in all our villages and the data analysis that goes along with it.

We were recently awarded a \$75,000 Rotary Grant and 100% of it will go towards funding new villages and ongoing village costs. We will also use part of it to purchase honey processing equipment.
