The Chamber will also have a new mailing address, PO Box 54, Tamaqua PA 18252, but the phone number will remain the same, (570) 668-1880.





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# Reading & Northern Railroad supports Tamaqua with platform project

In February 2020, the Reading & Northern Railroad made an agreement with Tamaqua Borough to bring back passenger trains by building a new and extended platform. The borough originally agreed to provide \$36,000 toward construction, but later, Andy Muller Jr., owner/CEO of the Reading and Northern announced that the first payment of \$20,000 would serve as payment in full. Muller and his team went on to complete construction during summer months, adding decorative finishes including Victorian-style lights, bench seating, and decorative fencing.

Muller further committed to borough council a donation of \$10,000 per year over the next two years (\$20,000 total) for the charities of their choice. During the corona virus shut-down, Muller opted to contribute the first donation during the stay-at-home order and the second several weeks later. The Tamaqua Borough Council worked quickly to allocate funds to Tamaqua's first responders: each of the four fire companies along with the ambulance association, rescue squad and fire police.

Meanwhile, the platform is complete, provides an attractive and safe area for walking, and has allowed for a Tamaqua stop to pick up fall foliage tours as well as "Ride and Dine" excursions that bring customers from Reading Terminal to Tamaqua.





**Did You Know?** The first railroad in America to use steam power was the Little Schuylkill, Navigation, Railroad and Coal Company. It was chartered in 1826, construction began in 1829, and it opened in 1831 between the coal mines at Tamaqua and the Schuylkill Canal at Port Clinton, a distance of about 20 miles. A steam locomotive named the "Catawissa" was purchased in England and began service in Tamaqua in 1833. It is also the third oldest rail route in North America.





**Did you know?** In 1817, coal was discovered in the Tamaqua area by while digging the foundation for an outbuilding by Burkhardt Moser, Jr. Coal had been discovered earlier elsewhere in the region, but this was the first discovery of coal in the Tamaqua area.

The effort was to connect employers and organizations across the country whose missions are to provide recovery-supportive employment. Loren Collura, Director of Hope & Coffee and Lisa Scheller, founder, attended the event along with representatives from 10 other organizations across America. They shared about the tremendous impact that Hope & Coffee continues to have in the lives of many people, both those in recovery as well as families and communities within Schuylkill County. Most importantly, they spoke about the amazing successes of Hope & Coffee employees and customers to date.

The Foundation enlists individuals, businesses, corporations, and foundations in charitable resource raising activities to help our students achieve their maximum potential. We also participate in the Educational Improvement Tax Credit program whereby businesses reduce their tax liability by making donations to foundation projects.

## The Foundation is active on multiple fronts:

- Help to fund a yearly summer camp series taught by educators at the Penn State Hazleton Campus. Campers learn things such as basics of electricity and motion as they plan and build their own robots, chemistry basics, and the basics of solar power.
- Providing funding for the visit of the Pennsylvania Agricultural Mobile Lab helping to provide exciting, educational, and interactive program for our elementary school students.
- Administration of the Joseph M. Plasko Scholar-Athlete Fund as well as the Karen Marie Mateyak Award Fund.
- Helping to fund an entry-level college engineering course taught at the high school by faculty from Penn State Hazleton.
- Assisting students in defraying the cost of Advanced Placement Exams.
- Administering the Grants for Teachers Program, a competitive process whereby teachers are awarded money to implement innovative programs in their classrooms.

#### Tamaqua Borough

The Tamaqua Borough is proud to serve more than 7,100 residents and to welcome businesses and visitors to the community. Borough staff work at many levels to support the community: by providing public safety and utility services, responding to public complaints and concerns, by administering projects and programs, and responding to and enforcing quality of life and other code violations.



#### Highlights over the past year:

- Through the generosity of the J.E. Morgan Foundation, provided discounted \$10 season passes to the H.D. Buehler Memorial Pool
- Hired a part-time Code Official to assist Zoning/Code Official
- Completed Owl Creek paving project
- Completed new sewer main on Lafayette Street
- Received donations for mulch at borough playgrounds
- Explored options through Howard D. Buehler Memorial Pool feasibility study to repair vs. replace pool

#### Community Revitalization and Improvement Zone (CRIZ)

Tamaqua is one of only three CRIZ locations in the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania and the only borough in the program. CRIZ works by reinvesting any positive increment in tax revenues within the zone and allowing a local CRIZ Authority to finance approved projects that boost economic impact. Recently, Wheel Restaurant was welcomed to Tamaqua as a CRIZ project.

#### Citizens Advisory Committee (CAC)

Recently, the newly reorganized CAC had their first rehab loan closing since 2014. This program was recently re-vamped and re-instated. The new program differs from programs that were offered in the past. This program offers low interest loans at a set max dollar amount for home improvements that are related to the safety, energy efficiency and liability of a home. There is also a sidewalk program in place as well.






## HONORING OUR HEROES
