

Delicious Disasters

I am a Minnesotan AND a pregnant lady, so sweets are an important part of my life ③ Here is one of my favorite ones to bring to a causal get-together and is super kid-friendly. Grab your siblings, kids, or nieces and nephews and get to work!

- 1) Buy a bag of normal pretzels, about 50 rolo candies, and 50 pecan halves (use M&M's if you don't want nuts).
- 2) Preheat oven to 300 degrees and lay a sheet of parchment paper on a cookie sheet.
- 3) Lay out 50 pretzels on the cookie sheet and place a rolo on top of each.
- 4) Put in the oven for about 4 minutes, until the chocolate and caramel are nice and soft.
- 5) Take out of the oven and turn the oven off.
- 6) IMMEDIATELY press a pecan half (or M&M) onto each rolo (this is where many hands is helpful).
- 7) Cool in the fridge or on the counter.
- 8) Enjoy the home-made turtle candies!

Tasty Shrimp Kabobs

With Lent right around the corner, here is a great meatless recipe. Super easy and delicious. Just serve with some mashed potatoes and California veggies for a perfect meal.

- 1) Thaw about 1 pound of pre-cooked shrimp.
- 2) Mix ¹/₂ cup mayonnaise, 1 tablespoon lemon juice, 1 tablespoon garlic, and ¹/₂ tablespoon salt in a small bowl.
- 3) Put the shrimp one pre-soaked wooden skewers. Make them nice and close to each other.
- 4) Spread the mayo mixture on both sides of the shrimp. Put LOTS on. You will probably have some leftover that can be used as a dipping sauce.
- 5) Place skewers on a pie pan or other pan that will hold the shrimp up off of the surface so that just the wooden ends are on the edge of the pan and the shrimp is 'hanging' in the middle.
- 6) Put oven on BROIL and place pan with shrimp on the top rack.
- 7) Cook for about 5 minutes (watch carefully as some oven broilers are extra intense.
- 8) Turn the skewers so that the other side of the shrimp is exposed and broil an additional 3-5 minutes or until it is turning slightly crispy and brown. (You should smell deliciousness at this point.)
- 9) Take them out and let cool a little before serving. Add a sprinkle of parsley to make it a gorgeous meal.

P.S. You may adjust the sauce to your tastes, adding more or less garlic and salt to it. Additionally, you can add a sprinkle of parmesan cheese after you turn them for some added flavors. Lastly, feel free to do these on the grill, because everyone knows things taste better grilled!

Girls, You're Important

So, this chapter in the book is about boys. 
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




Where the Sidewalk Ends


