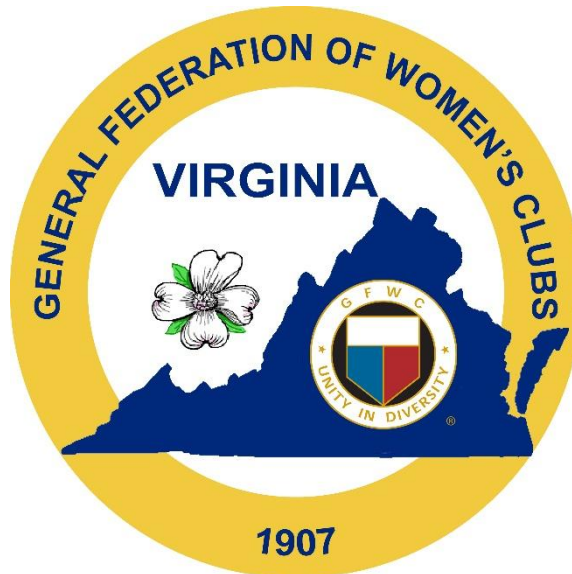

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STANDING RULES GOVERNING RESOLUTIONS

(Revised April 29, 2022)

A. GENERAL

- a. The subject matter of all resolutions shall be germane to the interests or work of GFWC Virginia and must be statewide in scope.
- b. Proposed resolutions shall be submitted to the Resolutions Chairman.
- c. Proposed resolutions may originate within the Resolutions Committee.
- d. Upon adoption, all resolutions become an integral part of the program of GFWC Virginia.
- e. Responsibility for carrying out the intent of resolutions rests upon the President, the Community Service, Standing and Special Committees to whose work it is germane, the Legislation Chairman and member clubs.
- f. General Federation of Women's Clubs resolutions in effect become a part of the program of GFWC Virginia.
- g. An index of GFWC Virginia Resolutions is listed in the Yearbook. A complete copy can be found on the GFWC Virginia website.

B. PRESENTATION OF RESOLUTIONS

- a. Any member wishing to propose a resolution shall first submit the proposal for opinion to the Community Improvement Program Chairman, Standing and Special Committee Chairman to whose work it is germane.
- b. Proposed resolutions shall be submitted to the Resolutions Committee Chairman, accompanied by proper supporting documents by November 1. Only emergency resolutions shall be accepted after November 1. A copy shall be sent to the President.
- c. Any resolution involving legislation or legal document must be accompanied by a copy of the legislation or legal document to assist the Resolutions Committee in interpreting the resolution.
- d. When appropriate, specific methods of implementation shall be outlined in the resolution.
- e. Except for emergency resolutions and resolutions originating under new business, all resolutions to be presented to the Annual Convention shall be included in the Call to the Annual Convention.
- f. A proposed resolution which is not approved by the Resolutions Committee may be introduced by its proponent as a motion at the next Annual Convention as a matter of new business. The President and the Resolutions Committee Chairman shall be notified prior to the start of the Annual Convention.

C. EMERGENCY RESOLUTIONS

- a. Emergency resolutions are those whose subject matter has arisen since the distribution of the previous Call to Annual Convention or those which are governed by a definite time limit and upon which delayed action would be disadvantageous.
- b. Emergency resolutions to be presented at the Annual Convention must have the prior consent of the President.
- c. Emergency resolutions to be presented at the Annual Convention shall be distributed to the delegates prior to presentation.

D. LIFE OF RESOLUTION

- a. Resolutions establishing the program of GFWC Virginia shall continue in effect until their purpose has been accomplished or the resolution has been rescinded by the delegate body.
- b. All resolutions which have been in force for four years shall be automatically reviewed by the

Resolutions Committee.

E. RESCINDING RESOLUTIONS

- a. Intention to rescind a resolution must be included in the Call to the Annual Convention.
- b. Proposals to rescind shall follow the usual procedures for consideration of resolutions.

F. MINORITY OPINION

- a. A Minority Opinion shall be recorded in the Minutes.
- b. When a club wishes to register a minority opinion, it shall send a letter to the President.

G. DISSENT FROM GENERAL FEDERATION OF WOMEN'S CLUBS RESOLUTIONS

- a. Proposals to dissent from General Federation of Women's Clubs resolutions shall come from at least two of those persons or groups eligible to present resolutions: the Executive Board, the Junior Executive Board, a District or Club, a Community Service Program Chairman, Standing or Special Committee Chairman, provided the President has been notified of proposed action ten days prior to the opening of the Annual Convention.
- b. Should the members present and voting at Annual Convention approve a proposal to dissent from a resolution adopted by the General Federation of Women's Clubs, written notice of such action shall be forwarded to the General Federation of Women's Clubs International President and the GFWC Chairman to whom the resolution is germane.
- c. In supporting the action taken, GFWC Virginia members shall state that this is a minority opinion of the General Federation of Women's Clubs.

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Arts & Culture

1. SUPPORT OF THE ARTS IN SCHOOLS AND COMMUNITIES

WHEREAS, The arts enhance life in all its dimensions; and

WHEREAS, Art serves as a vehicle for communication not always achieved by presentation of historical and scientific fact; therefore

RESOLVED, That GFWC Virginia urges that arts in the broadest sense be integrated into curricula of preschools, elementary and secondary schools and as many aspects of community life as possible; and further

RESOLVED, That GFWC Virginia urges its members to encourage promotion and funding for all the arts, both visual and performing, in schools and communities.

1. AFFIRMATION OF WOMEN

WHEREAS, More and more women, due to death or divorce, are heads of single parent homes; and

WHEREAS, The complexities of modern society offer financial, social and educational challenges; and

WHEREAS, GFWC Virginia, since its founding, has endeavored to enlighten the lives of women and has been an advocate of social and economic change for the advancement of women; therefore

RESOLVED, That GFWC Virginia encourages each member club to include in its yearly planning, programs and projects which address financial, social and educational needs of its members.

2. ECONOMIC WORTH OF HOMEMAKERS

WHEREAS, Homemakers provide an invaluable service to their home and family; and

WHEREAS, Laws affecting homemakers, including those dealing with property ownership, divorce, and death, may exclude or understate recognition of the homemaker's contribution to the family, especially because they receive no income; therefore

RESOLVED, That GFWC Virginia works to change existing laws affecting homemakers that undervalue their economic value; and further

RESOLVED, That GFWC Virginia supports legislation that fully recognizes the economic worth of homemaking.

3. FOREIGN OWNERSHIP OF LAND

WHEREAS, There are ever increasing purchases of American land by other than American citizens; and

WHEREAS, Many of the purchasers are unknown with purchase negotiated through representatives with undisclosed intent of the usage of the property; therefore

RESOLVED, That GFWC Virginia urges local and state authorities to exercise more control and to place adequate restrictions on the purchase of Virginia properties by foreign interests.

4. HUMAN TRAFFICKING

WHEREAS, Human trafficking is considered to be a modern-day form of slavery involving victims typically forced, defrauded, or coerced into sexual and/or labor exploitation; and

WHEREAS, Human trafficking is a \$150 billion global criminal enterprise and a fastest growing global crime that cuts across race, nationality, gender, age, and socio-economic background; and

WHEREAS, The International Labor Organization estimates that there are 40.3 million victims of human trafficking globally; and

WHEREAS, In 2023, Virginia ranked +20th in the US for reported cases of human trafficking; therefore

RESOLVED, That GFWC Virginia urges its member clubs to:

- promote awareness and prevention by educating their members and communities about the seriousness, prevalence, and warning signs of human trafficking
- advocate for victims' support, protection and recovery, and support related legislation
- work towards ending human trafficking

5. MANDATORY SENTENCING FOR SEXUAL ABUSE AND MOLESTATION OF CHILDREN

WHEREAS, Sexual exploitation of children causes permanent psychological and physiological damage; and

WHEREAS, Statistics reveal many sexually exploited children, as young as eight years old, are runaways and others even as young as three years old are used by their parents or guardians for sexual exploitation; and

WHEREAS, The present criminal justice system often fails children and society in general in adjudication of child abuse cases, and children are not capable of protecting themselves; and

WHEREAS, The billion-dollar pornography industry's newest growth area is child pornography; and

WHEREAS, There is evidence of an alarming misuse of internet sites by sexual predators; therefore

RESOLVED, That GFWC Virginia demand enforcement of existing laws concerning sexual exploitation of children and actively initiate and support new legislation where needed; and further

RESOLVED, That GFWC Virginia shall encourage and support awareness programs that are designed for a child's understanding of sexual exploitation so that he/she can communicate with a responsible adult if a problem exists and to deal better with the emotional trauma if he/she has been abused; and further

RESOLVED, That GFWC Virginia urges the adoption of laws which will provide that any proven involvement with the production and sales of explicit sex pictures of minor children, or the use of children in live performances exhibiting sexually explicit conduct or for the purposes of prostitution or any other sexual exploitation of children, shall be considered a felony with mandatory minimum prison sentences and fines for convicted individuals.

6. PRISON REFORM AND RE-ENTRY EFFORTS

WHEREAS, The concept of punishment alone as a deterrent to crime has been outmoded by statistics and by modern scientific studies of treatment of criminals which take into account the physical, sociological, mental and spiritual aspects of personality; and

WHEREAS, Use of evidence-based methods often develops reasonable, law abiding citizens with consequent reduction of repeated offenses and recommitments; therefore

RESOLVED, That GFWC Virginia urges its member clubs to continue study, and to urge their legislators to study recent advances in the conservation of human resources through psychological evaluation and wise use of all available methods of rehabilitation, and further, to encourage prison boards and administrators to take advantage of every possible resource in order that prisoners may be provided with and make use of:

- Psychological evaluation and psychiatric treatment when indicated;
- Adequate health standards and correction of physical defects where possible;
- Remedial education;
- Suitable job training;
- Opportunity for substance abuse counseling and education;

Opportunity for religious education and counseling;
Opportunity for development of constructive use of leisure time; and further

RESOLVED, That efforts be made to improve rehabilitative services through raising educational and training standards of prison personnel and to provide adequate follow-up services upon release of prisoners in order to assist them in their adjustment as productive members of society.

7. TEMPORARY ASSISTANCE TO NEEDY FAMILIES

WHEREAS, GFWC Virginia has always been deeply concerned that adequate care be provided for all children; and

WHEREAS, GFWC Virginia recognizes the family unit as basic to our society; and

WHEREAS, There is need for continuing study, reevaluation, and supervision of the temporary aid to needy families to assure wise and proper use of funds; therefore

RESOLVED, That GFWC Virginia urges its member clubs to support legislation that encourages program oversight and fiscal responsibility,-to support efforts that correct inadequacies and inequities where they exist in the distribution and utilization of Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF) funds; and further

RESOLVED, That GFWC Virginia urges that related state/local agencies and community resources be used to maintain a complete family unit and to assist the family to achieve economic independence.

8. HISTORIC LANDMARKS

WHEREAS, The gradual erosion and disappearance of the physical reminders of our cultural and historical heritage through disinterest, neglect or destruction is a nationwide occurrence; and

WHEREAS, The Commonwealth of Virginia is richly endowed with historic sites and homes whose identification, preservation and restoration, in order to prevent the loss of the visible forms of Virginia's heritage, should be a paramount importance to the citizens of the Commonwealth; and

WHEREAS, the Virginia Department of Historic Resources is the State Historic Preservation Office whose mission is to foster, encourage and support stewardship of Virginia's significant historic architectural and cultural resources; therefore

RESOLVED, That GFWC Virginia supports necessary legislation to further develop the program and purpose of the Virginia Department of Historic Resources in establishing and requiring adherence to high standards in historical preservation and restoration; and

RESOLVED, That GFWC Virginia urges its member clubs to enlist the aid of the Virginia Department of Historic Resources as they seek out and authenticate existing historical sites unique to their specific area and that voluntary community resources be marshaled for this effort.

9. SOCIAL SERVICES PROFESSION

WHEREAS, A primary concern of social services should be preventive, protective and rehabilitative services to public assistance recipients and children in foster care, which services contribute to the self-sufficiency and dignity of people; and

WHEREAS, There is a need to attract a sufficient number of well qualified and career minded personnel into the Department of Social Services through adequate professional compensation; therefore

RESOLVED, That GFWC Virginia urges state and local governments to take appropriate action to assure a program of prevention, protective and rehabilitative services to those who need them; and

RESOLVED, That GFWC Virginia urges its members to encourage well qualified persons to enter social service work and related professions.

10. SCAM AND FRAUD TACTIC AWARENESS

WHEREAS, Scam artists and fraudsters perpetuate a variety of creative scams that dupe the trusting, unsuspecting, uninformed members of society; and

WHEREAS, One in ten adults in the United States fall victim to a scam or fraud event annually; and

WHEREAS, Scam and fraud incidents often are not reported due to victims being embarrassed, ashamed, or fearful; therefore

RESOLVED, That GFWC Virginia urges its members clubs to educate their members, the general public, and particularly the elderly, to recognize scam and fraud schemes, avoid and report incidents of scam and fraud; and further

RESOLVED, That GFWC Virginia urges federal (Consumer Financial Protection Board (CFPB), Federal Trade Commission (FTC), Federal Reserve Board, and Office of Justice Programs), state (Attorney General of Virginia – Consumer Protection) and local agencies and community resources be used to publicize the types of scams and fraud to help prevent their perpetuation.

WHEREAS, GFWC Virginia traditionally has recognized that the American way of life has its source in the home; and that the moral and spiritual strength of the nation radiates from the home; and that many families, regardless of religious preference, consider a time during the week to be “family time”; and

WHEREAS, Recent trends in business and social practices have eroded the influence of this day in family life; therefore

RESOLVED, That GFWC Virginia urges its members to strengthen family ties by planning activities during this time of the week around religious and/or social activities in which the whole family can participate.

Education & Libraries

1. BILINGUAL EDUCATION PROGRAMS

WHEREAS, There are many school children in Virginia whose knowledge of the English language limits participation in regular school curriculum; and

WHEREAS, In most cases, bilingual instruction is expensive and there are insufficient funds and a shortage of qualified teachers; and

WHEREAS, Federal mandates in bilingual education foster federal control of local school systems; and

WHEREAS, The Virginia State Department of Education supports the provision of services to students of limited English-speaking proficiency and recommends English to Speakers of Other Languages, ESOL; therefore

RESOLVED, That GFWC Virginia supports the premise that English is the official language of the United States of America and that teaching in another language discourages students from mastering English, and further

RESOLVED, That GFWC Virginia will work to assure that bilingual education is available where needed, and that methods of implementation be left to the individual school districts; and further

RESOLVED, That the members of GFWC Virginia volunteer in their communities to help with implementation of bilingual education where feasible and provide training and tutors where needed.

WHEREAS, The strength and excellence of achievement in the Commonwealth of Virginia will result from the educational level of the young people; and

WHEREAS, Adequate funding is necessary for the development of effective school curricula; and

WHEREAS, Overcrowded classrooms foster a disruptive learning environment; therefore

RESOLVED, That GFWC Virginia urges it members to participate in volunteer programs with the schools in their respective localities.

3. LITERACY

WHEREAS, There are a significant number of adults and children in the United States who are functional illiterates, and reading limitations produce serious dislocations in the economic and social welfare of the American people; and

WHEREAS, There has been increased public awareness of the problem of illiteracy, teaching resources devoted to providing literacy skills are growing slowly while demands for these services are increasing dramatically; now therefore

RESOLVED, That GFWC Virginia urges any necessary changes in the state educational codes, making courses in all approved methods of teaching reading (including the intensive phonics method) mandatory in accredited colleges and universities for the granting of the elementary and secondary teacher's certificate; and further

RESOLVED, That GFWC Virginia supports the improved interpretation of test data to better inform the public regarding the achievement of the pupils; and further

RESOLVED, That GFWC Virginia urges its members to:

Take an active part in their communities to urge schools to institute classes in remedial reading, special services of reading specialists, training of administrators in reading, assistance of teacher aides for individual instruction and projects in improved reading comprehension in grades one through twelve; and

Enter into programs to teach children and/or adults in each community on a volunteer basis in conjunction with the Right to Read Program of the Federal Government; and further

RESOLVED, That to better implement reading programs, members of GFWC Virginia work to reduce the class size where necessary in local schools and marshal and direct our resources to the end that all public school children will develop proficiency in reading commensurate with their abilities.

4. PRAYER IN SCHOOLS

WHEREAS, Article I of the Amendments to the Constitution of the United States provides that ‘Congress shall make no laws respecting an establishment of religion, or prohibiting the free exercise thereof’; and

WHEREAS, GFWC Virginia recognizes and appreciates the fact that our nation was founded upon religious faith and freedom and realizes that failure to perpetuate these ideals will destroy our survival as “One Nation under God, indivisible, with liberty and justice for all”; therefore

RESOLVED, That GFWC Virginia believes the best solution to solving the issue of prayer in schools may be found in returning the decision-making process on prayer in schools to the individual states; and further

RESOLVED, That GFWC Virginia urges every club woman to work actively for the freedom to allow religious observance in all American schools, if participation therein is not made compulsory.

5. CHRONIC ABSENTEEISM

WHEREAS, Chronic Absenteeism is defined by the Virginia Department of Education as missing more than 10% or more of the school year (e.g. 18 or more days) and

WHEREAS, Chronic Absenteeism correlates to low academic achievement, is a powerful predictor of dropout rates, has been linked to poor economic outcomes later in life, and increases the risk of involvement in the criminal justice system, and

WHEREAS, Chronic Absenteeism is worse since the pandemic, with 19.3% of students chronically absent during the 2022-23 school year, and

WHEREAS, Disadvantaged students are the most likely to miss school, furthering their disadvantages, and

WHEREAS, In cases of Chronic Absenteeism assistance is available through intervention of the Juvenile Court pursuant to Virginia Code 16.1-278.1 through 16.1-278.14; and Code of Virginia § 22.1-258; and

WHEREAS, Chronic Absenteeism cannot be addressed effectively without vigorous support of the parents, guardians, public and the complete commitment of the school system; therefore

RESOLVED, That GFWC Virginia urges all Virginia clubs to support local School System programs for chronic absenteeism awareness and prevention, and encourage parents, guardians, and communities to make a concerted effort to combat chronic absenteeism.

WHEREAS, The impact of a teacher on the individual child is invaluable in the development of a sense of self-worth in that child; and

WHEREAS, Retention of good teachers is necessary for quality education; therefore

RESOLVED, That GFWC Virginia declares its continued support of teachers' salaries that are commensurate with ability; and further

RESOLVED, That GFWC Virginia urges the Governor and the Virginia General Assembly to appropriate adequate funding for teachers' salaries.

Environment

1. CLEAN ENVIRONMENT

WHEREAS, Increased population, urbanization and industrial development make the restoration and preservation of a clean environment imperative, and

WHEREAS, The use of biodegradable products and recycling conserves the use of natural resources, helps protect and improve land, air, and water resources, conserves energy otherwise used in the securing, transporting, and manufacturing of products from primary raw materials, and reduces the amount of solid waste; and

WHEREAS, Education alone has failed to alleviate the problem of litter, and illegal dumping along the highways and country roads detracts from the scenic beauty, has offensive odors, presents fire and health hazards, and depreciates real estate values, and constitutes a danger to wildlife; and

WHEREAS Virginia is running out of areas for refuse disposal, therefore

RESOLVED, That GFWC Virginia urges that there be continuous research:

To prevent pollution of the environment, and

To find reasonable and effective means of correcting existing pollution on local, national and international levels, and

To find the most effective means of using local, state, national and private funds, services and initiatives to maintain a clean environment; and further

RESOLVED, That GFWC Virginia urges its member clubs to join their efforts with that of governmental, business and volunteer organizations in a program of research, education and service which will insure a clean environment for all people, as rapidly as possible.

RESOLVED, That GFWC Virginia urges that appropriate state, local and volunteer agencies and institutions commence a concentrated educational program in litter clean-up in Virginia; and further

RESOLVED, That the anti-litter laws be strictly enforced; and further

RESOLVED, That GFWC Virginia urges its membership to encourage the use of returnable and reusable containers whenever possible; and further

RESOLVED, That GFWC Virginia calls upon business and industry in Virginia to continue to cooperate with citizens, localities and the state government in an effort to preserve the environment of the Commonwealth.

2. CONSERVATION OF CHESAPEAKE BAY

WHEREAS, The Chesapeake Bay is an important natural resource, and the confluent of Virginia's four major rivers and it is therefore essential to the water quality of the Bay that these waterways be subject to controls and standards set by law; and

WHEREAS, The run-off from industrial plants, chemicals from farms, homes along the water's edge which fail to incorporate storm water control practices, and use of poisonous compounds from whatever sources interfere with the ecological balance of the seafood chain which is vital to the economy of the state; and

WHEREAS, In addition to providing a habitat for fish, wildlife, and a variety of other organisms, wetlands play an important role in flood protection, prevention of shoreline erosion, and water quality control; therefore,

6. ESTABLISHMENT OF STATE LICENSE FOR RESPITE CARE OF PHYSICALLY DISABLED & MENTALLY DISABLED

WHEREAS, The well-being of physically and mentally disabled and the interests of their families need to be protected, and the best possible care be provided; therefore

RESOLVED, That GFWC Virginia urges the Governor, the General Assembly and appropriate State Agencies to determine the certainty of adequate community care before closing any mental health facilities; and further

RESOLVED, That GFWC Virginia urges the Governor, the General Assembly and/or the appropriate State Agencies to provide adequate licensing expressly for those who will provide respite care for the physically and mentally disabled of all ages; and further

1. ELDERLY ABUSE

2. SEXUAL ASSAULT
