

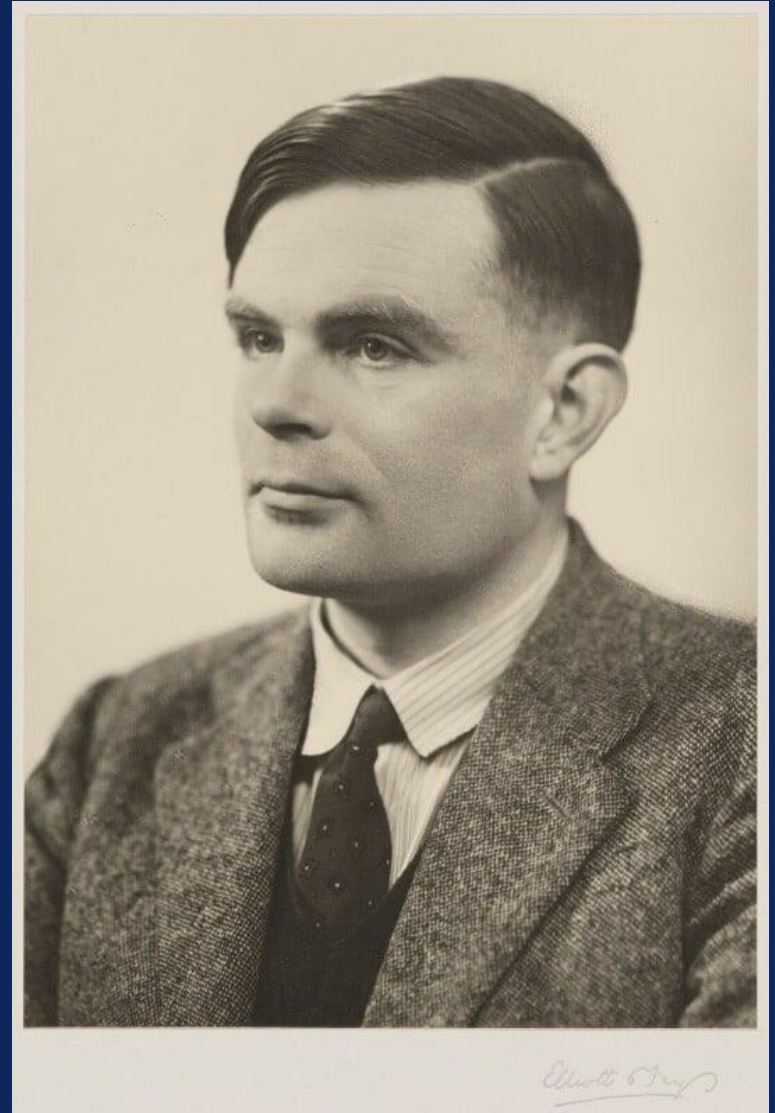
Starter: Discussion

Activity: Alan Turing Museum Exhibition

Using what you have learnt and understood so far, plus the Resource Pack you have been given you are to plan an exhibition about Alan Turing. This could be a museum exhibition, an informative public memorial, an information centre or something similar.

- Think about the discussion we just had about museums to ensure that at least **you** will find your exhibition interesting!
- There is a worksheet available to help you plan, if you need it
- You can include any of the things in the Resources Pack but think carefully about the **theme/s** of your exhibition. What is it that you want visitors to **learn** about? How is the exhibition/memorial/information centre to be **structured**?
- You **do not** need to create the exhibition just **plan what it will have in it, and why**. You can present your ideas in anyway you choose.
- There will be time to look at the other groups' plans and ask questions.
