

To help you, there's a map of Europe on the next slide...




Journey's to Britain: John and Marion

Tracking their journeys and choices

Now we know John and Marion's stories half of the class will track John's journey to Britain on a map, and half will track Marion's.

Use the categories that we used to highlight the story to track their journey.

- Green Refugee
- o Red − Prisoner
- Blue Migrant
- Yellow Other

Consider – at which points were John and Marion in control of their journey and where they were going?


Routes to Britain: Stories of Survival

- We can see from both John and Marion's journeys that they experienced multiple traumatic and difficult circumstances before they arrived and settled in Britain
- Look at the photo. How might a refugee feel about being greeted by a police officer or armed person?
- What should we consider when refugees arrive to Britain? How should we treat them?
