Seasonal notes: Tourist season in Wittenberg starts to wind down in September but hits a remarkable peak on Reformation Day (10/31). The very next day (11/1) is notably different: the town is almost completely empty and quiet. November 1st marks the "off-season" for Wittenberg, which is a time to prepare for the cold, dark winter. The Christmas market in the center of town opens at the end of November on the first day in Advent.

DINNER FOR DEMOCRACY

September 2025

On September 12th, 2025 local volunteers organized a community event called "Dinner for Democracy." The idea was to have a potluck dinner in the market square where everyone brought something to share. I volunteered to help organize and run the event with the group pictured below. We had about 80 people register for the event and over 100 people came! The purpose of the event was to bring neighbors together in conversation about democracy and to show solidarity that Wittenberg strives to be a welcoming place for all people. Wittenberg is located in the German state Saxony-Anhalt, which has state-wide elections coming up in September 2026. The largest growing political party in Saxony-Anhalt is the AfD (Alternative für Deutschland), which has been classified as a "right-wing extremist organization" by Germany's Federal Office for the Protection of the Constitution (BfV), declaring that the AfD is working against Germany's free democratic order. The AfD are anti-immigration, anti-European Union, anti-Islam, and anti-LGBTQIA+.



The BfV says, "The AfD's prevailing ethnic and descent-based understanding of the people is not compatible with the free democratic basic order. It aims to exclude certain population groups from equal participation in society, to expose them to unequal treatment that does not conform to the constitution and thus to assign them a legally devalued status." There is a lot of fear in Wittenberg that the AfD will win the elections in 2026, which will threaten democracy and local inclusion initiatives and organizations.

The Dinner for Democracy in Wittenberg was a resounding success, bringing people of all backgrounds together. The community was so excited that such an event occurred, that many asked to be involved in future pro-democracy actions and initiatives. As a result, we planned more events leading up to the September elections. This Friday, January 30th, we will have a "Hot Drinks for Democracy" event in the market square, where we will provide hot chocolate and mulled wine to passersby. We will engage the public with conversations about democracy and inclusion and provide a space for people to get to know each other better. On May 23rd and August 28th, we will again have "Dinner for Democracy" in the market square.

WITTENBERG WEBINAR SERIES

For the 500th wedding anniversary of Martin Luther and Katharina von Bora, we held a webinar series under the title **"Blessed to Be: Exploring Gender, Companionship, and Sexuality."** We had five dynamic speakers present over the course of three 1-hour sessions: Dr. Mary Streufert, Rev. Dr. Themba Mkhabela, Rev. Dr. Kit Kleinhans, Rev. Dr. Elaine Neuenfeldt, and Dr. Elyssa Salinas-Lazarski. Over the course of the three sessions, we had a total of 270 participants from 29 countries/territories!

Each speaker presented on their own context or specific area of study, which included global perspectives and engaging examples. As a learning center of the ELCA, the Wittenberg Center seeks to connect Reformation anniversary themes with our modern context.

At the end of October, the Rev. Dean Bard (left) visited for his 80th birthday! Rev. Bard was the first director of the ELCA Wittenberg Center from 1999-2000. It was great to show him the Center today and look at some old documents and photos. Rev. Bard served as pastor of the ELCA-affiliated American Church in Berlin for several years in the 90s, which helped him envision the numerous opportunities for engagement in Wittenberg. AUGSBURG

November / December 2025

One of my roles in Germany is attending some meetings on behalf of the ELCA. The German National Committee of the Lutheran World Federation (GNC/LWF) is a committee that represents the 11 German member church of the LWF. The main roles of the GNC/LWF include to "support LWF programs and projects in areas such as theological education, health, livelihood initiatives, climate change adaptation, empowerment of women and young people, and to accompany and support the theological work and ecumenical dialogs of the LWF." The ELCA is a partner church that is invited to attend the bi-annual meetings of the GNC/LWF as a permanent guest. Since the meetings take place in Germany and *auf Deutsch* (in German), I am often asked to be the ELCA representative at these meetings.

The last meeting was held from December 1st to 3rd in Augsburg, Germany, where about 50 participants engaged with the topic: "Looking to 2030: the 500th Anniversary of the Augsburg Confession." The next General Assembly of the LWF will take place in Augsburg in 2030, to which the German churches are already planning and preparing. Over the three days, we got a glimpse into what Augsburg has to offer and hear international perspectives regarding the importance of the Augsburg Confession for Lutherans and ecumenical partners today. The last LWF General Assembly took place in 2023 in Krakow, Poland. As such, Bishop Jerzy Samiec (pictured at the podium), the presiding bishop of the Evangelical Church of the Augsburg Confession in Poland, formally handed over the guidebook of LWF General Assemblies to Bishop Christian Kopp (pictured on the far right), the Bishop of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in Bavaria.



As an ELCA missionary, it is important to remember my role as an ELCA pastor and representative in accompanying partner churches, keeping in mind that I am a guest in a foreign land. It is an honor to be part of the conversations going on in our German and international church partners. There is a lot we can learn from each other and learn together as we live out our common call to be the church in the world. Perhaps the most exciting and meaningful part of our time together in Augsburg was hearing from participants from Ethiopia, Togo, Indonesia, Malaysia, and Singapore about the meaning of the Augsburg Confession in their home churches.
