Discussion on Additional Dwelling Units on Single Lots in Residential Districts

The Town Council discussed a request to add an additional dwelling unit to a single lot within the Town. The Town code currently permits a single-family dwelling on a parcel that is 7,000 square feet or greater and a two-family dwelling on a parcel that is 10,000 square feet or greater. Several proposals were discussed including two principal single-family dwelling units on a single lot at currently required or additional lot size, a detached or attached accessory dwelling unit, additional unit by conditional use permit, or reduction of the minimum lot size for each dwelling unit.

Council expressed satisfaction with the current code and decided not to pursue an amendment at this time.

Approval to Hire a Code Enforcement Officer

The Town Council discussed and approved hiring a Code Enforcement Officer up to twenty-five (25) hours per week. The officer will promote order in the Town focusing on safety, animal control, zoning, and property maintenance issues such as inoperable vehicles, dilapidated structures, trash, tall grass, etc.

a. FY26-27 Draft Budget

The Town Manager stated the draft budget will be distributed at the Town Council meeting in March.

- b. Personnel Policy Amendment – Elimination of Benefits for Part-time (less than 40 hours) Employees
 The Town Council reviewed the benefits for part-time employees defined as employees working less than forty (40) hours per week.
 A motion was made by Marcie Hill, seconded by Natalie Harris to eliminate all leave and special pay benefits for part-time employees effective immediately. Motion passed unanimously. No further discussion.

- c. Update on the Blue Ridge Road Historic Corridor
 The Town Manager updated the Town Council on status of public property and events on Blue Ridge Road in the historic commercial corridor. The *Free Market* will take place once a month (May-October) on Thursday when the Food Bank distributes food. Donated items of clothing, essentials, etc. will be provided free of charge.
 The outdoor *Flea Market* will take place the second Saturday of each month (May-October) on public property along Blue Ridge Road in front of the old Presbyterian Church across the street from the Episcopal Church. Everyone is invited to set up free of charge in 2026 and sell their items – farmers, crafters, yard sale, flea items, etc.
 The indoor market at 1015 Blue Ridge Road will sell antiques, vintage, and high-end home décor and consigners will pay a small percentage or flat rate to help offset the cost of utilities. The Town Manager explained that this store will provide an anchor to help the Town encourage economic development.

Council asked when the bell was going to be put back at the old Presbyterian Church/New Town Event Hall. The Town Manager said due to the weight it takes a special piece of equipment and staff planning is underway.

Lisa Rogers said that the softball league will return to Town in Spring 2026. Each team will pay \$150 to participate. A car show is being planned for early May 2026.

Several Council expressed interest in a large annual Spring Fling.

Council requested revamping the Town website.

Natalie Harris said she spoke with a citizen who wanted to discuss an issue with Town Hall. The Town Manager stated she spoke with the citizen who requested snow removal from the alley behind her house. The Town does not provide snow removal in alleys as they are a second means of access to their property and not VDOT maintained right-of-way. She said citizens may remove the snow at their discretion.

Ms. Harris also asked about Town Hall business hours. The Town Manager stated there are other services to pay bills such as online or by phone which enables less frequent walk-ins and many small towns are reducing business hours as a cost savings. In 2025 Glasgow began closing Town Hall on Fridays, which has seemed to be successful.

VI. Public Hearing

- a. **TXT-01-2026 - Amendment to Chapter 15 Subdivisions, to allow the vacation of lot lines by recordation of a deed as set forth in Section 15.2-2275 of the Code of Virginia.**

The Town Manager provided information on accepting deeds versus plat for lot consolidation. Allowing deeds encourages development by lowering the overall cost of projects. Requiring plats provides more information on accuracy of lot lines and improvements.

Questions and discussion ensued.

The public hearing was opened at 7:33 PM. No one spoke. The public hearing was closed at 7:34 PM.

VII. Planning Commission - Discussion and Recommendation

- a. **TXT-01-2026 - Amendment to Chapter 15 Subdivisions, to allow the vacation of lot lines by recordation of a deed as set forth in Section 15.2-2275 of the Code of Virginia.**

X. Public Hearing

- a. **ORD-01-2026 - Disposition of public property: to lease from the Town of Glasgow the Town-owned building at 1015 Blue Ridge Rd. for the purpose of commercial business for a retail operation.**

The Mayor opened the discussion and reviewed the issue with the Town Council. The request is to rent a portion of the building at 1015 Blue Ridge Road for commercial retail use.

XI. Discussion and Decision

- a. **ORD-01-2026 - Disposition of public property: to lease from the Town of Glasgow the Town-owned building at 1015 Blue Ridge Rd. for the purpose of commercial business for a retail operation.**

Natalie Harris expressed opposition to renting the building for a low cost. She stated that the Town is spending money and not recouping the cost. She said that the tenant should pay the utility bills. She said that proceeds

were supposed to benefit the Town. The Town should make better use of the building and whatever is decided should benefit the Town. She would rather have a thrift store. She questioned the purchase of the buildings.

Tom Camden expressed disagreement with Ms. Harris' comments and cautioned her to be careful about assessment.

Brandell Branch stated that things change and move forward. He said the use is not negative, it is positive and the improvements to it are beautiful. He also stated that the Town owned buildings and property is a good investment.

Marcie Hill stated that this would be the current use and if a better idea is proposed the Town has the option to readdress the issue and use the building for another purpose.

A motion was made by Vice-Mayor Tom Camden, seconded by Brandall Branch to rent the building for use as a commercial retail store. The motion passed by vote of 5-1 with Natalie Harris against.

Oversight of VMI cadets who built picnic tables, mulched, and additional lawn work. Loaded a 30-yard dumpster with trash, debris.

A part-time Code Enforcement Officer has been hired for safety, animal control and property maintenance. Staff continue to address existing code violations and concerns. Violation notices are being sent to address issues.

a. Public Safety Report

The March 2026 Call Report submitted by Rockbridge County was provided in the Town Council packet. The mayor noted that Suspicious Activity has declined. No significant issues in April 2026.

b. Parks and Recreation Committee

Mayor Williams stated there was no activity by the Parks and Recreation Committee this month. Planning continues for the two Music in the Gorge events to be held later this summer.

c. Public Works and Utilities

The Public Works report was presented by Mayor Williams.

Daily checks/readings/sample collection performed readings performed for water/wells/wastewater.

Weekly plant maintenance performed.

Monthly water meter report readings, manual readings, notices of delinquent bills, and water cut-offs complete.

Water and sewer line repairs throughout Town completed as necessary.

Repairs and maintenance at the sewer plant were performed and are occupying significant time for the department.

Staff worked with Siphyn Robotics to remove over 400 tons of sludge from oxidation ditches at the wastewater plant. C&S has been part of the project- hauling containers of sludge to the landfill.

Seasonal Lawn Maintenance has begun.

Building maintenance – maintenance and upgrades continue for plumbing, heating/air, painting on the Town buildings.

10 VA811 locate tickets marked.

Hiker's Shelter was opened and cleaned. New hot water heater has been installed.

Painting and other maintenance occurred. A new wood storage box for firewood was built.

VDOT notified of stop signs that were down or leaning.

Drag for baseball field being built.

Bulk Pick-ups – 3 performed for brush and large household items.

Council asked if Allyson Finchum's suggestion to move the location of the Hiker's Shelter due to problems and the Interim Town Manager said the issues have resolved themselves and the new Town Enforcement Officer also checks the shelter on a regular basis.

Council asked about the security for the gated area near the river. The mayor stated he grants access to the area for larger boats to put in but some access without permission.

e. Code Enforcement Officer Report

Mayor Williams provided the report.

g. Town Manager's Report

The Interim Town Manager said the Glasgow Farmer and Flea Market has begun and has received positive response.

A free Mobile Spay and Neuter Clinic will be held in the Town this month. Information was sent in the utility bills and they are full at this time. They indicated they may return at a future date.

The Town met with the pastor of the Natural Bridge Christian Fellowship to discuss their current plans for assistance programs to the community. Natural Bridge/Glasgow Food Pantry has served the community for 30 years and is concerned about the coordination. Vice-Mayor Camden is on the board of Natural Bridge/Glasgow Food Pantry and said there has been no effort from the church to communicate with them.

Lisa Rogers said the two should work together.

Council requested a resolution to honor the years of service of Natural Bridge/Glasgow Food Pantry.

Natalie Harris requested the Free Market be held one Saturday per month as well as current third Thursday and she will provide the assistance.

The Car Show was very successful with 24 cars participating and positive reviews. Others are being planned for the fall. One the same day as Rockin' the Gorge on July 25th.

New water and wastewater operator started last month and improvements are being accomplished. There was a spot inspection by DEQ and there were no issues.

The sludge removal in the clarifier and digester has been complete. Evaluation of the digester is underway within the next month.

The full-time Public Works Laborer resigned effective May 15th.

An ad will be placed for part-time Public Works/Utilities Laborer.
