
The 1990s

During the 1990s the agriculture program would quadruple in enrollment as a new greenhouse and nursery were added to the program as well as a facility for teaching biotechnology. More teachers were added, and considerable success followed. Numerous individual and team members won state and national awards.

"Senior AG projects," began in the mid-80s and continued through the 90s, and beyond. These included the installation of benches, planters, and the fountain in the front of Old Main, as well as the construction of the Japanese Friendship Garden. Senior agriculture students annually designed and installed a major project on campus. All materials were donated by local businesses. School maintenance and district maintenance personnel jumped in to help teach students skills in concrete finishing, masonry, and more. Local skilled tradesman like Don Smith and Lou Little lent their expertise as well. Other programs on campus assisted. Tony Bracciale often brought his physical education students out to spread gravel reasoning that shoveling sixty tons of gravel was as good as anything they might do in the weight room!
