Changes to the Campus during the 1990s

- We started with one lunch period, then two and by the 1990s, as we continued to grow, we needed three lunch periods.
- The cafeteria was expanded in 1991 to have more room in the snack bar area as well as the cafeteria (see construction below).



- During the 1991 -92 School year, monitors were placed in every room, and announcements were given in the mornings.
- In 1993 a new fountain was constructed in front of Old Main.



In 1994 a new Art and Ceramics building was constructed on campus.




- FFA and our Agriculture Program began a new Mini Camp where students from across the state came to learn about Agriculture and leadership. It was tremendously successful and was in the spring.
