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## **People make things happen**

I know you care very deeply for our community and its heritage, and we appreciate your support in our mission at the Historical Society and the Huntington History and Education Center. I have mentioned in previous newsletters the history stories that only you, as an individual or family, can provide. Be aware of the contributions that you can make from your own background and memory.

I have an aunt, Kay Peas of nearby Wabash, who years ago designed a coloring book for her young grandchildren, in which the drawings told the story of their grandparents growing up in a small town in Indiana. Her grandchildren learned early and in a child-friendly way about their most recent ancestors.

With today's computer capabilities, there may be no limit to how a creative mind records and provides personal histories to a younger generation.

Historical Society Board member Lyla Spath has taken her own skill and experience at writing and authored her own book on her years as a child growing to adulthood in Huntington County. The book, "Salamonie Summer," is available locally, and if you contact the History and Education Center, I'll bet we could get a signed copy for you.

My wife Diane has also considered her background and used her ability as a composer to express an interesting part of her history. A century ago, the railroad and automobile made traveling much more commonplace. Many performers took advantage of the new technology, as did entrepreneurs who organized tours for performances in many cities and towns. As a

young girl, Diane's grandmother told her stories of traveling with a string quartet as part of the Chautauqua concert circuit through the Midwest in the 1920s.

Over the past few years, Diane has been working on a musical based on her grandmother's life experiences called "The Schubert Ladies Quartet." It will be presented on the evenings of November 15 and 16 and on the afternoon of November 17 at the Baker Street Centre, formerly C2G, near Parkview Field in downtown Fort Wayne.

As a Board member of the Historical Society, I have become more aware of the many creative and diverse contributions from many people to record history. I am deeply impressed with the creativity and resourcefulness of many who use their talents and skills to record, in their own unique ways, the heritage of Huntington County and its residents. Your efforts make us all proud and inspire us to continue preserving our history.

Photographers may wish to use their talent to record our current heritage for future generations in the Historical Society's History In The Making Photo Contest, sponsored by Frederick's Photography and the History and Education Center. Your photo must have been taken in the last five years and must be submitted by September 18. Winning photographs will be on display at the Forks of the Wabash Pioneer Festival.

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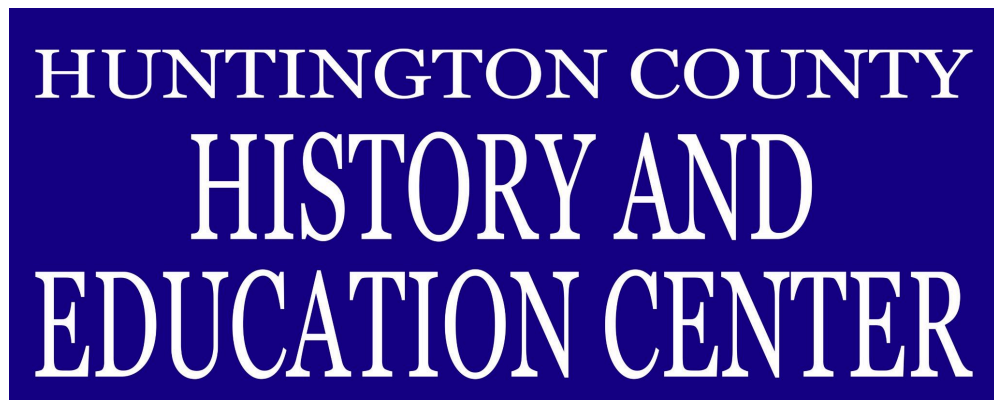
