COUNCIL NOTES:

February 13, 2023

- ❖ Council transferred funds from the sewer fund back into the general fund. We had previously transferred funds to cover operating expenses.
- ❖ Discussed outstanding water bills. The residents past due will receive a disconnection notice.
- ❖ Discussed sending letters from the solicitor to disconnected accounts.
- ❖ Tim and Dave supplied general specs for the sewer replacements so we can start looking at projects that need to be completed. This is important because our daily sewer limits are too high per the EPA, and the village council has received multiple notices regarding this. We do have RCAP coming to help us prepare and research possible grants for the upcoming projects.

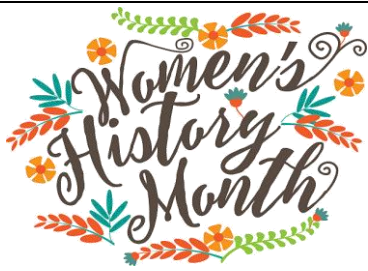

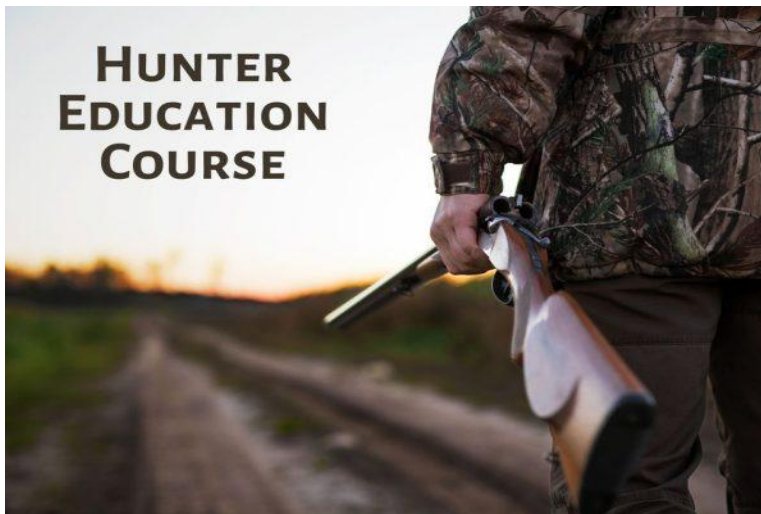
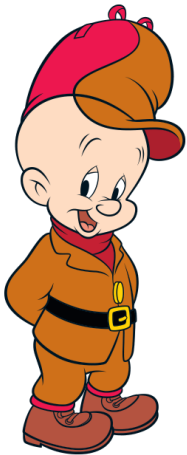

Pistachio and Chocolate Leprechaun Cookies

Whip up a batch of these Leprechaun Cookies full of pistachio and chocolate to make for St. Patrick's Day!

Prep Time15 mins | **Cook Time**10 mins | **Total Time**30 mins

Ingredients

- 1 cup butter softened
- 1/2 cup granulated sugar
- 1/2 cup light brown sugar
- 1 teaspoon vanilla extract
- 1/2 teaspoon almond extract
- 3.4 ounces package instant pistachio pudding (dry mix)
- 2 eggs
- 2 1/4 cups cups all-purpose flour
- 1 teaspoon baking soda
- 1/4 teaspoon salt
- 1/2 cup dark chocolate chips
- 1/2 cup green M&Ms
- 1/2 cup chopped walnuts
- green food coloring *optional

Instructions

1. Preheat oven to 375 degrees F. In an electric mixer with paddle attachment, cream together butter and sugars. Add extracts and pudding mix and eggs one at a time. Beat for 1 minute.
2. In a separate bowl, combine flour, baking soda, and salt. Add to sugar mixture one a little at a time, mixing thoroughly between each addition. Add a drop or two of green food coloring at this point if you want a stronger green color. Stir in chocolate chips, green M&Ms, chopped walnuts, and any other mix-ins you like!
3. Bake for 8-10 minutes or until edges are turning slightly golden. Let cool and enjoy!

Species	Planting Requirements
Arborvitae/ White Cedar	This slow-growing tree is prefers moist soils and full sunlight. It grows to an average height of 30-40 feet but can reach up to 70 feet and 10-15 feet in diameter. It is primarily planted as an ornamental tree and used as a windbreak.
American Planetree	Also known as a sycamore, this large deciduous tree may grow 75-100 feet tall and equally wide with a true diameter of 10 feet or more. It is one of the largest diameter hardwoods in North America and prefers full soil and moist, fertile soils.
American Plum	The fruits of this tree are sweet when fully ripe and make excellent jelly or jam due to their high pectin and acid content. This fast-growing tree will grow as a small tree or large shrub which will readily sucker from the ground up around the root zone.
Black Cherry	Best suited for zones 3-0. This rapidly growing woodland tree is common throughout all of Ohio and commonly found in open fields that were previously harvested. It's beautiful wood make it second only to black walnut as the ultimate choice for fine furniture.
Black Walnut	Medium in size, black walnuts typically mature at 50-75 feet tall with a 2-3-ft diameter. They should be planted in moist, well drained, deep soil rich in organic matter. They prefer full sun and produce a toxin that inhibits growth of nearby plants.
Common Lilac	This old-fashioned, long-lived and well-loved lilac is best known for its fragrant flowers. Extremely hardy, this plant thrives with little care, making it a lovely shrub for specimen planting in masses, screens, hedges, or mixed into shrub border.
Domestic Apple	Domestic Apple prefers to grow in the spring and summer months. It produces a purple flower and a red fruit. It is a moderate grower, maturing at 30 feet. It prefers medium to coarse textured soils.
Elderberry	Prolific in the wild, when planted in a garden these plants are easy to maintain and tolerate a wide variety of growing conditions. These shrubs grow 10-15 feet tall and wide in a rounded shape and are excellent additions to a wildlife garden.
Flame Maple	A selected form of the native red maple tree, this tree is notes for outstanding crimson and scarlet fall color, turning red early in the season and holding well throughout the fall. Rapid growing with a well-formed crown, it is an ideal shade tree choice.
Hull Thomless Blackberry	An abundant producer, these are great for fresh eating or freezing. They are resistant to anthracnose and double blossom. These sweet berries ripen from June to August and prefer loamy, well-drained soils.
Jewel Black Raspberry	Ripening in early July, this plant produces large, black fruit with the same rich flavor as its red counterparts. It begins producing raspberries as soon as 2 years after planting. It does well in the cold and is perfect for fresh eating, canning or baking.
Norway Spruce	Norway Spruce prefers moist, well-drained, acidic soils that may be organic, sandy or loamy. It thrives under seasonal drought once it is established and takes well to city pollution. Its will not tolerate wet soils. It grows in full sun to partial sun in zones 3 to 7.
Northern Red Oak	Red Oak prefers moist, deep, rich, well-drained soils. It adapts readily to dry soils of acidic, neutral or slightly alkaline pH (some specimens develop chlorosis in high pH soils). It thrives in full sun to partial sun (but is shade tolerant in youth).
Patriot Blueberry	Large, fleshy, juicy fruits are exceptionally tasty; requires lots of full sun for growth. Make sure there are no trees or ornamental shrubs in the vicinity if you plan to grow in a garden; also requires plenty of moisture and watering during dry periods.
Redbud	Known as the eastern redbud or Judas tree, this tree is common in the southern 2/3 of Ohio and herald spring with showy, lavender-pink flowers. It grows best in zones 3-7 with a mature height and spread of 20' each. It grows rapidly with a rounded crown.
Sugar Maple	Sugar Maple thrives in rich, moderately deep soils having even moisture coupled with good drainage. Clay soils cause it to struggle more in terms of root penetration. It adapts to shady conditions in its youth, but it must eventually grow in full sun to partial sun.
Sweetbay Magnolia	Glistening dark green leaved with a silver underside and 2-3" creamy white flowers with a light lemon scent are the hallmarks of this tree. It matures at 10-20' with a similar spread and grows best in zones 5-9. It's elegant shape makes it an excellent specimen tree.
White Flowering Dogwood	An excellent landscape choice for all seasons and favorite in many yards and gardens, these white flowers show their beauty in spring. The foliage turns a vibrant red-purple in fall with glossy red fruits attracting winter songbirds.
White Oak	A large, strong, imposing specimen with a short, stocky trunk and massive horizontal limbs. Open-grown trees may produce acorns as early as 20 years, but good acorn crops are irregular and only occur every 4-10 years.
White Pine	White pine grows best in moist, rich, well-drained, acidic soils in full suns. It does not tolerate poorly trained soils. Rapid growth allows a quick result as a harvestable timber tree, a mature landscape tree, or as a cut Christmas tree

- In 2022, Richland Newhope provided services and supports to more than 1,300 people.
- We have not asked voters for additional dollars since 1995.
- Newhope's services are funded through a combination of local levy dollars, state funds, and federal funds.
- Newhope relies heavily on our local levy dollars to account for approximately 40% of our total budget.
- We provide or fund Residential, Early Intervention, Therapy, Family Support Services, and Case Management to those eligible for our services.
- We use a personalized approach to help individuals develop a plan that includes their short and long-term life goals.
- We support families of infants and toddlers, ranging from those with minor delays to those with lifelong disabilities.
- We are a strong partner of the Richland County Youth and Family Council. This council collectively works to improve the service delivery for children and families in need throughout Richland County.
- We help connect parents of children to resources and community activities as they help their children grow and thrive.
- We collaborate with the local schools to support students in identifying their plans after high school.
- We put significant resources towards developing services for our multi-system youth and their families.
- We help individuals with disabilities find and sustain employment.
- We support individuals with disabilities to learn to advocate for themselves and speak up on important issues.
- We work with approximately 110 providers of services in Richland County. We help individuals and families find providers that can best meet their needs.
