For those who remember, our EIOS fall show was held at Noelridge Greenhouse and that year our display had a number of coerulea (blue) Cattleanthes; so did the Central Iowa Display. Carson Whitlow from Central Iowa who did pioneer breeding for 'Blues' and I collaborated at the show for unprotected sex between orchids. This cross was flasked 4/15/2015 and deflasked in the fall of

2017. Of the eight different crosses, 6 survived and this was the first to bloom. Both parents were coerulea flowers = POD *Ctt* Portia (*Guarianthe bonringiana* x *Cattleya labiate*) x C. Tanya Duncan (C. Heathii (1) x C. Canhamiana). Now that it has bloomed, I can register with Royal Hort. Society - *Any ideas on a name? Nile*

"You Light up My Life / or / Orchids!"

Orchids are now inside under our new LED lights. The Pictures are of 100R Spec Samsung LED Quantum Board Lights. In September we purchased these LED lights to replace a High Intensity Metal Halide Light to increase better orchid blooming and reduce costs.

The LED lights have a longer life span, high efficiency full spectrum and deep red LED's that provide better light penetration with diffused lighting. They are cool to the touch, have less warm-up time, and lower maintenance cost. We have our orchids outside in the summertime in the gazebo. The orchids were transferred inside October 11th and placed under these lights. We have not had these lights long enough to know how effective they are. However, I have had a few orchids bloom and others are in Bud now. Dorothy Hampton.

for me to bloom as I can't keep them







Learning About Floriferousness!



Andy Coghill-Behrends, our President, presented is final judging presentation to the club at the November meeting. We all learned a great deal about the meaning of this word and how it applies to orchids. Floriferousness basically is the number of blooms per plant; BUT it can relate to number of flowers per inflorescence, number of total flowers per plant, number of flower spikes per growth on the plant and more! Andy presented this at the Chicago Judging Center meeting the Saturday following our session and I think made suggestions that all the judges can consider when looking at orchids with multiple flowers or the potential for multiple blooms. I have no doubt he will be elevated to full accredited AOS judge status in January.
