



> fungus. We then visited the Smithsonian Greenhouses to see a variety of orchids and











Laynez Ackermann shared his *Phrag. besseae* for the newsletter. Jon Lorence sent photos of Bulb. Sanguineopunctatum 'Alba' and Guarianthe Herbert Oesterreich (Nile's plant divided at last year's repotting party) - so plant to attend, never know what you will get!

When we picked up plants for the Noelridge Showcases which Doc Bannister so generously donated, his private collection was in full bloom in his greenhouse. As summer approaches he will cut off all those blooms to let the



phals revitalize - ouch, that would. hurt I think!. Finally, continuing the theme of unusual dendrobiums from the front page; here are three more from the Dusdieker greenhouse. *Dendrobium densiflorum* forms what I call little pineapple buds that open all at once and last a couple weeks. *Dendrobium hancockii* is a spindly species (at least for me) with bright yel-

low flowers on seemingly dead canes. *Dendrobium parishii* is a true nobile species that will bloom later in the

season even when a very small plant. The Gatton Sunray on the front page is a very old hybrid made by Sir Jerimiah Coleman in England in 1919. It was first awarded in 1936. Named for his country estate.

# Frank Cervera, Monster Island Orchids, NY

Frank is a biologist who has been studying the ecology, biology and taxonomy of the genus *Phragmipedium* throughout natural populations for the past 25 years. His journey with *Phragmipedium* started in the 1980s when one of his ecology professors introduced him to orchids, which led him to buy a plant of *Phrag. longifolium*. After many years of trying to get a sense of which *Phragmipedium* species were which, and why he was killing so many plants, Frank decided to take the matter into his own hands. His 25-year sojourn to the jungles of Mexico, Guatemala, Panama, Columbia, Ecuador, Peru, Venezuela, Guyana and Brazil studying the genus *Phragmipedium*, the taxonomy, ecology and culture has given him unique access to the source material. Along the way, he has met some of the most well-known names and personalities in the *Phragmipedium* community. He has been to some of the most famous, and infamous, orchid nurseries in South America at critical times in the history of the genus and asked them to retell their stories. Frank has had the unique opportunity of going straight to the source and examining plants and flowers through extensive field research. He currently works in the financial services industry and resides, along with his family and his orchids, in New York (email frankrc@optonline.net)

Frank's topics will be "Phragmipedium Culture: What Can Mother Nature Teach Us?" and "The Phragmipediums f Brazil; A Journey to a Strange World".

# Eric Sauer, River Valley Orchids, OH

Eric has been growing orchids for over 30 years under the greenhouse name of River Valley Orchids and specializes in South American Species with a focus on Brassia, Maxillaria and Phragmipedium. He has spoken internationally and across the United States. Eric has had culture chapters published by Guido Braem in his book on Paphiopedilum and in his book on Phragmipedium. He also has a feature article on Maxillaria in Orchid Digest and several of his Maxillaria photos published in Eric Christenson's book on Maxillaria. Eric has received over 100 awards from the American Orchid Society and has four orchids named after him including two species from Ecuador. He is the current president of the Miami Valley Orchid Society and the president of the Mid America Orchid Congress. Eric also serves as one of the award photographers for the Cincinnati Judging Center. Eric's real job is as a registered landscape architect serving as the planning manager for Five Rivers MetroParks in Dayton, Ohio.
