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Amazing Catasetum Chuck Taylor 'Kat' FCC 90 pts, CCE 90 pts

He received 2 awards, a First Class Certificate for flower quality and a Certificate of Cultural Excellence for his culture. I believe these two awards are the highest scores any member of our club has ever received. I asked him to write a small blurb on how he grows these gems! *Nile*




I grow in my basement under led lights and in sphagnum moss. Usually about 40% humidity and 74 degrees. While the plants are in low water stage I spray generously with a spray bottle three times a week to keep the sphagnum moss damp. Once the plants get to the high water stage I water three times a week. On Monday I water and fertilize at full strength, then I water on Wednesday and Friday. I water with city water that comes out of the Mississippi river. The plants are in small groups under two 100 watt led flood lights. When the plants are small they

will be about 2 feet from the lights. As the plants grow, they may get within 6 inches of the lights. The lights are on for 16 hours a day. Most of the time I don't change the photoperiod. I follow Fred Clark's directions for restricting water to encourage the plants to change to dormancy. You can get these directions from the SVO Orchids web site.



Just for FUN, I asked ChatGPT "How to bloom Catasetums?" Catasetums are known for their dramatic and colorful blooms. To encourage your Catasetum to bloom, you need to provide the right care and understand their unique growth cycle. Here's how to help your Catasetum orchid bloom: 1. Dormancy Period: Catasetums have a growth cycle that includes a dormant period. During this phase, which typically occurs in the fall or winter, the orchid will lose its leaves. This is a natural process and is necessary to trigger blooming. To induce dormancy, gradually reduce watering and provide cooler nighttime temperatures (around 50-60°F or 10-15°C). Keep the orchid in a slightly drier state during this time. 2. Patience: Blooming Catasetums require patience. After the dormant phase, you'll notice new growth emerging. This is the sign that the orchid is transitioning into its active growth phase and preparing for blooming. Be patient and provide the orchid with the right conditions to allow the flower spikes to develop. 3. Transitioning to Active Growth: As the new growth emerges and the plant transitions out of dormancy, gradually increase watering and return to regular care routines. This transition is crucial for the orchid to gather the energy it needs for blooming. 4. Lighting: Place your Catasetum in a location with bright, indirect light. Adequate light is essential for the plant to produce flower spikes. However, avoid direct sunlight during the hottest part of the day, as it can damage the leaves. 5. Fertilization: Once your Catasetum is actively growing, start feeding it with a balanced, water-soluble orchid fertilizer at half the recommended strength. Fertilize every 2-4 weeks during the growing season to provide the necessary nutrients for blooming. 6. Flower Spike Development: With proper care, your Catasetum should develop flower spikes. These spikes will emerge from the new growth. They usually start to develop in late winter or early spring. (oops!) As the spikes mature, you'll notice them growing taller and thicker. 7. Careful Handling: Catasetum flower spikes are delicate and can be easily damaged. Avoid bumping or disturbing the spikes during their development.8. Continued Care: Continue providing your Catasetum with consistent care as the flower spikes develop. Adequate water, light, and fertilization are essential throughout the process. 9. Blooming: Once the flower spikes have fully developed, they will produce colorful and fragrant flowers. The exact timing of blooming varies depending on the specific Catasetum variety and growing conditions. Enjoy the stunning blooms and their unique appearance. Remember that successfully blooming Catasetums requires attention to their growth cycle, as well as consistent care and patience. Understanding the dormancy phase and providing the right conditions during the active growth phase will greatly increase the chances of your Catasetum producing beautiful flowers. Not bad for a computer! When is Skynet coming? And the TERMINATOR! NILE
